

Richard Scores 2 Goals As Canadiens Win To Tie Series

DETROIT (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard flashed for two goals Tuesday night while Detroit Red Wings were short-handed and Montreal Canadiens went on to win 3-1 to square their Stanley Cup final with the National Hockey League champions at a game apiece.

Richard's pair came 31 seconds apart, following a goal by Dickie Moore to give Canadiens a 3-0 lead late in the first period, a lead that proved too tough for the hard-fighting Red Wings to crack.

The single Detroit goal went to Alex Delvecchio, who scored unassisted when his sharp goal-mouth passed-out from the corner was deflected into the net off the stick of captain Butch Bouchard of the Canadiens.

Tuesday night's game was harder fought and produced more wide open and sensational play than the opener of the series Sunday night when the Red Wings took by the same score. The teams play the next two games in Montreal Thursday and Saturday, and the fifth game will be back in Detroit Sunday.

It was Montreal's first victory on Detroit ice this season. The home team could do in seven visits during the regular schedule was two ties.

Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal shook up his forward lines at the start and kept juggling them throughout the game.

Richard was the only remaining member of the first or punch line. He had Paul Masnick at center and lanky Eddie Mazur on left wing.

The line of Jean Beliveau, Dickie Moore and Boom Boom Geoffrion was left intact, but there were different fill-ins when Canadiens had manpower advantage and the Rocket was the extra forward when penalties played havoc with the Red Wings.

All the Montreal goals came within 56 seconds, the first two while the Red Wings were short two men and the last when they were one man down.

The sudden setback in the opening period left the Red Wings with such an obstacle that they had to gamble as time ran out in the last period but Montreal struck back on the offensive at every chance and the Detroit attack was kept off balance.

Only four penalties were called on the Red Wings, all in the first period.

Each goalie had 25 saves but Sawchuk had more of the tougher shots to handle than Plante.

In addition to the line shifts there were two changes in the Montreal line-up Tuesday night because of injuries. Calum MacKay replaced Paul Meger who twisted his knee in the first game. MacPherson took over a defence post when Dollard St. Laurent was unable to play because of a

spained wrist, also a first-game injury.

GREENBORO, N. C. (AP) — The world champion New York Yankees received a triple scare Tuesday when first baseman Eddie Robinson went to hospital with a kidney attack and infielder Gil McDougald and pitcher Allie Reynolds were hit by balls in practice.

Everything turned out all right, however, even though Robinson and McDougald spent a short time in the hospital. Both were discharged after x-rays and treatment.

Robinson complained of kidney pains when the Yankees arrived here from Charlotte, N. C., Tuesday morning and was sent to the hospital immediately. The trouble was diagnosed as a kidney stone. He obtained relief a couple of hours after being admitted.

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Tiger Jack Fox, 47, once a top contender for the world's light-heavyweight boxing title, dropped dead Tuesday while entering a theatre.

Fox suffered a stroke in June, 1951, and had been in poor health ever since. The Negro boxer had shuffled around town with a cane in recent weeks, unable to speak, but still had a seat at ringside for every local card.

Fox fought Melio Bettina for the light-heavyweight title in New York in 1939 and was knocked out in the ninth round.

Challenger Beats World Chess Champ

LONDON (AP) — Challenger Vasil Smyslov beat world chess champion Mikhail Botvinnik for a second straight time in the 10th game of their series for the world championship in Moscow Tuesday.

Moscow radio said Smyslov, playing black, won at the 38th move, tying the 24-game series at 5-5. Each player now has three wins, three losses and four draws.

Youthful Toronto Swimming Star Breaks Records

TORONTO (CP) — Virginia Grant, 16-year-old Toronto swimming star, smashed two more Canadian junior records at a meet here Monday night.

She completed the 40-yard free style in 21.4 seconds, beating the old mark of 22 seconds set by Dorothy Kerr of Windsor in 1935. She also swam the 40-yard backstroke in 25.5 seconds, beating the previous best time of 25.8 established by Leonora Fisher of Ocean Falls, B. C. in 1952.

It was the first time that Virginia had competed in a backstroke event since she was 12. She set records for the 100-yard and 50-yard free-style event at the Ontario girls' championships here March 20.

EDMONTON (CP) — City council has awarded a contract for construction of a new concrete grandstand on the west side of Clarke Stadium, raising capacity in the home of Edmonton's football Eskimos to 20,667 from 15,133. All work is expected to be completed in time for the football season.

St. Lawrence River Canals Icebound

OTTAWA (CP) — The transport department said Tuesday there is apparently no hope of opening the St. Lawrence river canals before April 19.

A survey showed 10 to 14 inches of ice in the upper canals, 20 to 24 in the Soulanges area, and 25 inches in Lake St. Louis.

Canadair Delivers 146 Jets in March

MONTREAL (CP) — A record delivery of 146 jet planes were delivered by Canadair Limited to the RCAF in March, the company announced today. The previous record was in February when the air force accepted 90 planes. March deliveries included 64 F-86 Sabre jets, 73 T-33 jet trainers and nine planes that had been overhauled.

More Cheques Cashed

OTTAWA (CP) — Value of cheques cashed in 52 Canadian clearing centres during February rose 14 per cent to \$1,282,000,000 from \$989,000,000 in the corresponding month last year, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday.

Totals during February, with totals for February, 1953 in brackets, included: Atlantic provinces \$330,811,000 (\$302,623,000); Quebec \$2,249,748,000 (\$2,714,424,000).

Ottawa Senators Edge Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) — Ottawa Senators edged Montreal Royals 2-1 in overtime Tuesday night in the first game of their best-of-seven semi-final series.

A small turnout of 2,528 Quebec Hockey League fans saw Red Johnson, referee on Ottawa's weakest line, dribble in a slow goal at 3:49 of the overtime period after Montreal goalie Bob Perreault was crashed out of the nets by Senators' Jack Giesebrecht.

Ernie Roche tallied for Royals and Dusty Blair for Ottawa in the first period.

MONTREAL (CP) — Nicholas Monsarrat, British author and chief of the United Kingdom information office at Ottawa, is to compete in yacht racing in Canada this year.

The former naval commander, famous for his wartime epic, "The Cruel Sea", is bringing a Dragon class yacht, the Valhalla, from Britain this spring, the Canadian Yachting Association announced Thursday.

The yacht will compete in races on nearby Lake St. Louis and Lake Ontario against the royal yacht, Bluebottle.

The Bluebottle, presented to the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh by the Canadian Yachting Association, is due to arrive in Montreal aboard the liner Empress of Scotland, June 4.

Amendments To N. B. Traffic Act

FREDERICTON (CP) — Application for special driver's licence in New Brunswick must be 16 years old instead of the present 15, according to a bill introduced in the legislature Tuesday by Hon. Donald D. Patterson, provincial secretary-treasurer.

The bill also provides for arm signals "in line with a proposal to have uniform arm signals throughout all 10 Canadian provinces."

Another provision is for authorization of only one number plate, instead of two, on vehicles.
