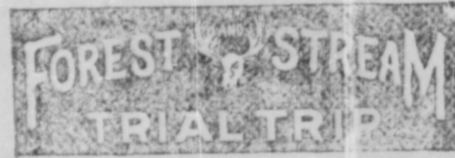

EXTRA SPACE—Canada has been allotted an extra space of 2,000 square feet at the Paris exposition, making 31,000 feet.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.—It is probable that the Dominion Parliament will meet for the despatch of business on or about the 9th March.

SHE'S ALL RIGHT.—The schooner Edna, from Summerside to Demerara, S A, with produce and a large quantity of stock and live turkeys, geese and poultry has arrived safely at her destination, having made a quick passage.

A VALUABLE STAMP.—At a philatelic exhibition, opened at Birmingham, Eng, there are on view the two most valuable stamps in the world—a penny and a two penny Mauritius. The market value of the two on exhibition at Birmingham is \$10,000.

THE FASTNET SOLD.—The steamer Fastnet, which for years ran between Charlottetown and Halifax, has been sold to a syndicate of Mexican shipping men. After being over ailed at Victoria, B C, the steamer will be taken south by her new owners.
