Georgetown and Vicinity

On Sunday afternoon, Rev. S. J. Boyce, Georgetown, exchanged pulpits with Rev. Maurice Fletcher, Montague. Rev. Boyce held the afternoon service in the Georgetown Baptist Church, while Rev. Fletcher took the service at the United Church in Sturgeon.

Continued prominent press dispatches are once again reviving the hope that Georgetown will soon become a coal assembling and distributing center. Mr. W. N. MacDonald of Nova Scotia, who owns a coal mine at Mabon, N. S., announces that dredging of the approaches to Mabon Harbor will commence this summer. It is Mr. MacDonald's reported intention to transport the coal over the water route from Mabon to Georgetown in barges. From Georgetown it would be distributed to points within the Province. The assurance from the Government that this summer will see the stretch of road from Poole's Garage to Georgetown paved, would facilitate coal movements by truck from here. Fully alive to the importance of such an industrial development our Mayor and Council some time ago wrote Mr. MacDonald offering him every co-operation and concession, if and when he inaugurates this proposed coal industry. The belief is firmly held here that paving of the road will eventually result in a magnificent and ideally located harbour being developed into a busy shipping centre and that Georgetown with its attractions of fishing, boating, beaches and scenery, will attract an ever increasing number of tourists.

Georgetown Welfare League Meets

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Community Welfare League was held on Thursday, March 30 in the Town Hall, with an attendance of 40 members. President, F. J. Solomon opened the meeting and the minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Cullen DeLory and moved adopted. Treasurer, H. S. MacLean gave a detailed report of the League's finances, which were shown to be very satisfactory. The treasurer's report was unanimously adopted.

The secretary in his annual report stated that during the last year, eleven regular and one special meetings were held, with an average attendance of 25. The number of paid-up members during the past year was 50. Two hundred circular letters were sent out to individuals and firms soliciting financial donations towards the new Recreational Centre. Letters of thanks and receipts have been sent out to all donors, as well as the lists being published in the newspapers. Pictures were taken of the opening ceremonies of the new centre.

Mr. Raymond Lavandier, chairman of the Entertainment Committee stated in his report that the activities in the entertainment field had been most satisfactory during the past year and that tentative plans were already laid for functions to be held this coming spring and summer. Reports of the activities of the Rink Managing Committee and the Building Committee were given by H. S. MacLean and J. W. Lavers. The president, Mr. F. J. Solomon gave his annual report on the League's activities.

A vote of thanks to the ladies and other citizens of the town and surrounding districts, who not being members of the League, assisted so generously in the opening night ceremonies of the Centre, was moved by Mr. J. H. MacDonald and seconded by Mr. J. F. Johnstone. The next order of business was the appointing of a slate of officers for the ensuing year:

A Nominating Committee five were appointed to select a list of officers for the meeting's approval. Members of the Nominating Committee were: Chairman, W. J. Fitzgerald, Mrs. F. J. DeLory, J. H. MacDonald, J. F. Johnson and J. W. Lavers. The slate of officers and the Executive brought in by the Nominating Committee and appointed as the officers for the coming year is as follows: President, F. J. Solomon; vice-president, F. J. Lavers; secretary, Cullen DeLory; treasurer, H. S. MacLean; executive, J. H. MacDonald, J. F. Johnson, James MacConnell, Jr., Frank Lavandier and Richard Lavers. An Entertainment Committee was appointed with the following members: Chairman, Raymond Lavandier, Henry Martell, Miss Sally Johnson, Cullen DeLory, J. B. Scully, Mrs. A. H. Stewart, Miss Joyce Jenkins, Mrs. William J. Martell, Mrs. J. H. MacDonald, Mrs. Guy Hemphill, Miss Joan McQuillan and Guy Hemphill.

It was moved that the new Executive be empowered to name all or part of its members to work with the Mayor and Council in matters pertaining to the new Recreational Centre. Mrs. F. J. DeLory moved that a vote of thanks be tendered Miss Mona Wilson of the Nursing Division of the Public Health Department for the splendid work done by the Dental Clinic. It was decided to purchase a set of five of the large size pictures of the opening night ceremonies of the new Recreational Centre and to have them framed and placed in the office of the Centre. The meeting was then adjourned.

President's Report Our first and one of our biggest jobs was the cutting, sawing and eventually landing 30,000 feet of lumber at the site of the new Recreational Centre. A great amount of planning, work and co-operation was necessary to make this undertaking a success and as you know the undertaking was carried through to a successful conclusion. In August we held our annual dance in the Potato Warehouse, which was up to the high standard of other years and was a complete financial success.
