## Salary Request Reply Awaited By Teachers

A proposed salary scale for teachers has been presented to the provincial minister of education on several occasions and implementation is expected for the 1966-67 school year, it was announced at the annual meeting of the board of governors of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation held Friday and Saturday. The board is pressing the government for a decision on the proposals by Jan. 31.

On the basis of a plebiscite taken at the local fall conventions when 84.8 per cent of the teacher vote favored "decking" the Canada Pension Plan with the teachers' Superannuation Plan for the present, a motion was passed that the provincial government be requested to accede to the wish of the teachers. The idea of decking means that the teachers would retain their present plan to complement the Canada Pension Plan.

A second resolution supported the consolidation of elementary schools with kindergartens being an added consideration. The resolution was made following a comparison between ungraded schools and larger school units in the future percentages.

A third resolution urged that the government make grants to teachers attending summer school or returning to university with the provision that all such applicants be required to teach in the province for a period of time following the completion of their studies.

With the abolition of the grade provincial exams, the board resolved that the J.D. Seaman prize for English be awarded at the grade eight level.

Retiring president, Charles Campbell, in his annual report urged increased activity at the local level and reminded board members of their responsibilities.

Other reports were: pension commission, David Lidstone; pension committee, Tom Bradley; salary, Francis MacNeil and Tom Hall; research, Alice Fraser; APEB, Sister Mary of Carmel; expansion committee, John Hughes; Canadian Teachers Federation annual meeting, Charles Campbell and educational finance, Francis Blanchard.

## Production Certificates Won By Guernsey Cattle Breeders

A Diamond certificate with seal was among the certificates of longtime production received last week for several Prince Edward Island Guernsey cattle breeders by J. Eric Hurry, West Royalty, who is secretary of the P.E.I. Guernsey Breeders' Association.

The top certificate was the Diamond and seal certificate received by Mr. Hurry himself for Patsie Dorraine's Lassie who produced 140.12 pounds milk, 6,473 pounds fat for breed class averages of 151 milk, 130 fat.

Leigh A. Semple, Winsloe, had Patsie Viola's Violet qualify for a gold medal certificate with production of 73,116 pounds milk, 3,863 pounds butterfat for BCAs of 115 milk, 120 fat in eight lactations.

Violet is Mr. Semple's foundation cow. She was selected by L.W. Roper, Brudenell, when he was fieldman for the Canada department of agriculture in Charlottetown. That was in June 1955, according to J. Eric Hurry who bred her.

EIGHT CALVES  
Violet was a two-year old heifer at the time and she has had eight heifer calves since that time. Two were bull calves.

Mr. Semple had the highest producing 3-year old Guernsey heifer in the Maritimes this month.

Patsie Verbena Silverlock, qualified for a silver medal certificate and seal by her production in seven lactations, and for a gold medal certificate by producing 74,265 pounds milk, 3,969 pounds butterfat in eight lactations. The BCAs averaged 114 in milk, 120 butterfat.

Patsie Roberta qualified for a bronze medal certificate and seal with production of 50,762 pounds milk, 2,656 pounds butterfat in five lactations. The BCAs were 125 milk, 120 fat.

This is the cow that was grand champion at Charlottetown in August. She was second in the inter-breed upper class. Both of the above cows are owned by Mr. Hurry.

Mrs. Mary Palmer and Sons, Kensington, had Emmadale's S. Patricia qualify for a silver medal certificate and seal with 4,257 pounds milk, 2,429 pounds butterfat in four lactations for BCAs of 143 and 145.

Roy Younker, Kingston had June's Lucky Lady qualify for a silver medal certificate and seal with 7,029 pounds milk, 3,816 fat in seven lactations. The

## 'Pownal Centre' Is Progressing

More than a dozen school districts are involved in the development of "The Pownal Centre", a large rink which is now under construction in Mt. Mellick, just outside the Pownal district.

The rink is being erected on land donated by Ed. Wood, Mt. Mellick, and it is directly across the highway from his home. The pump for the centre was drilled Saturday by Norman Coriah, Southport. The work was donated by Mr. Coriah.

The structure is being erected under the supervision of a building committee which consists of Norman Thompson, Vernon River; Finley Drake, Mt. Mellick; George Lawton, Pownal; Harry Fraser, Hazelbrook; Bill Starna, Cross Roads; Ronnie MacInnis, Earncliffe and Mr. Wood.

The amount of \$10,000 which was in the funds of the old Hazelbrook butter factory company is being made available for the centre. Other assistance will be available from the Centennial committee — this will be a centennial project — and from the winter works program which is sponsored by the federal and provincial governments. Many of the people from the surrounding communities are expected to co-operate in the project.

## Maronite Priest Beatified Sunday

VATICAN CITY (AP)—A Maronite priest who lived for many years of the last century as a humble hermit in the mountains of his native Lebanon was beatified Sunday in pagentry and splendor at St. Peter's Basilica.

The newly beatified priest was Rev. Charbel Makhouf, who died in 1896 at the St. Peter and Paul hermitage of Aanya, Lebanon.

Born at Biga Kafra in 1828, he joined the monastery of Our Lady of Maifay at the age of 23. He was ordained a priest in 1850 and for 16 years lived an ascetic life at the monastery of St. Maroun. In 1875 he withdrew to the St. Peter and Paul hermitage.

Local Legion Marks Birthday  
In celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Legion, a special meeting was held at the Charlottetown branch recently with the guest of honor being, Lieut. Gov. W.J. MacDonald, honorary patron of the P.E.I. Command.

## Island Woman Flown To Halifax

HALIFAX (CP)—A Camp Gagetown N.B. soldier and a Prince Edward Island woman were flown to hospital here Sunday by the RCAF.

Edward Merlin, 26, was brought to the Canadian Forces Hospital for treatment of facial injuries. Merlin's rank or how he sustained the injuries was not immediately known.

The RCAF Albatross carrying Merlin landed briefly at Charlottetown to pick up 63-year-old Mrs. Alvin MacLean of Coleman, P.E.I. She was reported suffering from a kidney failure and was taken to Victoria General Hospital for treatment.

## Island Farmers Get \$40,000 In Crop Insurance Benefits

Something more than \$40,000 will be paid out in crop insurance to Prince Edward Island farmers who insured grain and potato crops this year S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, said the department has not separated the total of payments for each crop at the present time.

One potato grower will collect something more than \$1,700 in insurance, it was learned. Others will collect lesser amounts. At federation of agriculture meetings the past few weeks, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said there has been some discussion on the probability of making insurance available to potato growers, for example, on a crop of 400 bushels, or more. But if this were done the policies would have to be sold more or less on an individual basis, and the individual grower desiring that type of coverage would naturally pay a very much higher premium.

Potatoes frozen in the ground are not eligible for insurance benefits if they have been frozen in later than the last of October. This is the time the coverage ends, excepting that there is consideration for damage in storage bins.

If they're frozen in before the end of October they're eligible for insurance payments, it was explained.

There were 2,179½ acres of potatoes insured this year as compared with 666½ acres in 1964. In grain 4,819½ acres were insured this year, and this compares with 1,642 acres in 1964.

In potatoes the farmer pays a premium of \$5.06 per acre and in grain he pays 50 cents per acre. This is not the total insurance cost. The federal and provincial governments pay an additional amount in each case.
