\$10,000 MacLeod Bequest Received By P.E.I. Hospital

The date of the annual meeting was set for Feb. 25 at 8 p.m. in the nursing school.

The administrator announced the receipt of a cheque for \$10,000 being partial payment on a bequest from the late Miss Christy MacLeod, formerly of Kinross, P.E.I.

The installation of a second elevator in the new wing was discussed and the administrator was authorized to get installed prices and present same to the next meeting of the board.

New furniture for the main lobby, out-patients and x-ray waiting rooms arrived and was inspected by the trustees who expressed their approval.

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Former Resident Dies In Michigan

MONTAGUE — Mrs. M.B. MacKay, Murray River, has received news of the death of her sister, Mary Elizabeth, wife of Dr. William MacKay in Lansing, Mich., on Jan. 13. Mrs. MacKay was the daughter of the late Angus and Mary MacPherson Macdonald of Valleyfield, P.E.I.

In June 1912 she married Dr. MacKay, formerly of Dundas, after his graduation from Marietta College, Ohio, and in 1923 they celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in Detroit. Dr. MacKay was the former pastor of the North Presbyterian Church of Lansing.

Besides her husband she leaves to mourn two daughters and one son: Meriam, Mrs. James Huston of Lansing; Dorothy, Mrs. Edwin H. Steinel of Huntington Woods, Detroit, and David Bruce of San Jose, Calif.

Also one sister, Mrs. M.B. Martin, Murray River, P.E.I.; four grandsons in Lansing, Mich., and three granddaughters in California. A son PO Homer MacKay was killed in a plane accident several years ago.

Churchill, P.E.I. Feels Concern Over Sir Winston

Residents of Churchill, P.E.I., a tiny farming village, are hearing with a special concern reports of the grave condition of Sir Winston Churchill.

The village of about 12 families, seven miles west of Charlottetown, was named for the former British prime minister more than 60 years ago.

John Alan MacKinnon, 81, the only surviving resident who attended the meeting named the community, said "we're all very sorry that the old man's last days should be spent in such a way."

He said the citizens of Churchill received a letter from Sir Winston in 1962 when the village church celebrated its centennial. "We feel very close to him."

"It's too bad that he should have such a hard time in his last days."

Mr. MacKinnon said that about 1900, when the community was to get a post office and was looking for a name, one of the obvious choices was Churchill, then noted for his escape from captivity during the Boer War and much in the news at that time.

"We're mighty pleased that he became such a famous man," Mr. MacKinnon said.
