Giant Irrigation Project Lending Name Obsolete

YANGI YER, Uzbekistan (CP) The Meepo called Hungry Steppe will soon be given a new name. A big irrigation project is fast rendering its present one obsolete. This young town 100 miles southwest of Tashkent, capital of the Soviet central Asian republic Uzbekistan, is the nerve centre of the project. It is aimed at bringing to life 2,500,000 acres of semi-desert country in the Yangi Yer, or 'New Land' area. It has a population of 10,000. The first settlers in Yangi Yer in 1958, when the present accepting of the land reclamation program began. Life in tents. Now the inhabitants live in neat, semi-detached homes. Fed by the Syr Darya, one of the great river systems of central Asia, which flows northward here, the operation is designed to bring 750,000 acres under cultivation by 1970. Successive phases will bring a further 1,000,000 acres into production.

The remainder of the ambitious design is being carried out in adjacent areas of Kazakhstan and Tadzhikistan. Uzbekistan, 80 per cent of whose 175,000-square-mile area is desert, semi-desert or arid mountain regions is not without experience in irrigation schemes. The Pergana Valley, 100 miles east of here, is watered by irrigation canals—three main ones total 221 miles in length—using water from the same system. A total of 750,000 acres have been brought under cultivation in the last valley. It produces 1,300,000 and produces cotton, silk, vegetables and vast quantities of fruit. Here in the sun-seared Yangi Steppe, where rainfall is only 12 inches a year, water-bearing canals and troughs to a total length of 450 miles have been constructed. Boss of the project is Alexander Izhimov Nizhamov, a roving, energetic engineer. He directs operations from an office here that has direct radio control over each of the 20 satellite farms, now growing cotton and other producing fruit and vegetables, which have already been established on irrigated land. Nizhamov says that by 1970 32 state farms of 25,000 acres each will have been built. Besides cotton, fruit and vegetables, the crops will include wheat. This year, output of raw cotton in the steppe is expected to reach 80,000 tons compared with 54,000 last year. By the end of the decade, Nizhamov says, the region will produce 20 per cent of the Uzbek cotton harvest. Uzbekistan already accounts for two-thirds of the cotton produced in the Soviet Union. Twenty-five thousand persons are employed in the steppe, a quarter of them women. All told, the region now supports a population of 70,000 of whom 60 per cent are Uzbeks and the remainder from other Soviet republics. There are 14 schools,
