A Steamer and Thirty Lives Lost.

LONDON, Nov. 23.
The iron screw steamer "Winton," loaded with grain from a port on the Black Sea, foundered off the Island of Ibslant, on the coast of France, near Brest, on the 22nd inst. Thirty lives were lost. The "Winton" was 1,247 tons, was built at New Castle in 1880, where she belongs. She was owned by Messrs. Chapman and Millar.

Canadian Canal Tolls.

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.
The Board of Trade, as decided at a recent meeting, yesterday sent a memorandum to the Governor General asking the total abolition of Canadian Canal tolls. The Harbor Commission has also sent a memorandum to the Governor General asking the Government to deepen the Channel at Quebec to twenty-seven feet six inches.

Gendarme Scheme in Egypt.

LONDON, Nov. 23.
The British Government, after much consideration, has given limited approval to the Gendarmerie Scheme in Egypt.

Death of Thurlow Weed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.
Thurlow Weed, the veteran editor and politician, died at his residence yesterday. He had been in delicate health for the past two months. He was eighty years of age on the 15th inst.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 21.
The Queen in conferring decorations at Windsor, to-day, said: "I have called you here to-day to express my best thanks for the gallantry and devotion you displayed in the short but decisive campaign in Egypt and to say how proud I am of my soldiers and sailors, who have added fresh laurels to those already obtained in previous campaigns, and of their devotion to their Queen and country."

At the close of the Queen's address three lines of men retired, leaving the Queen facing the commander of the expedition and the Naval Brigade. The conferring of decorations then commenced.
Admiral Seymour and General Wolsley have been gazetted peers.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 21.

A fire to-day in the Callender building, occupied mostly by jewelry shops, resulted most disastrously. The operatives of Wm. H. Robinson & Co., gold chain makers, on the fourth floor, became panic stricken and rushed for the windows to escape. One jumped, and others were pushed out by those in the rear. Two girls were killed, six others injured—probably fatally—and several other men and women besides these were more or less hurt. The fire did not extend below the third story. The total pecuniary loss will reach about \$50,000. Insured.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

The Commons' committee, investigating the imprisonment of E. Dwyer Gray, at a meeting to-day, reconsidered its report. Sexton's paragraph was rejected, only Sexton, McCarthy and Dillon voting for it. In the Commons, this afternoon, Mr. Gladstone refused to allow Mr. Yorke further opportunity for discussing the Kilmainham affair.

In the Commons, to-night, Mr. Gladstone offered a motion, which was agreed to, that the term of suspension for a second offence be reduced from a month to a fortnight, and that for third offence be for a month, instead of the remainder of the session. The debate then adjourned.

GLASGOW, Nov. 21.

The final meeting of the shareholders of the City of Glasgow Bank was held to-day. The liquidation has been finished, and depositors have been paid twenty shillings on the pound.

PARIS, Nov. 21.

In the Deputies, to-day, the bill ratifying the Brazzas treaty with the Congo Chief Makoko was adopted.

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Nov. 21.

The Parliament has dissolved in consequence of the rejection of the land bill.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

The Daily Telegraph's Vienna correspondent says: When De Giers left St. Petersburg the Czar summoned General Ignatieff to an audience at Gatchina palace, which denotes that Ignatieff has already taken the wind out of De Giers' sails.

The Daily News' Berlin correspondent says: De Giers states the impressions he received at Varzin were most satisfactory. The condition of affairs in France, he says, were especially discussed. De Giers, at an audience with the Emperor, yesterday, informed him that Bismarck and he were agreed on all essential points.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.

De Giers had an audience yesterday with the Emperor and Prince Frederick William. He afterward dined at the palace. It is semi-officially stated that the visit of De Giers to Bismarck at Varzin had no object, but may be interpreted as an expression of intimate relations between Russia and Germany.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

The Daily News says it is understood the government does not intend to deal with the Arrears Act at this session.

The Parnellites will have an opportunity of discussing the administration of the Land Act before the prorogation of Parliament.

In the House last night the discussion of the eighth procedure rule was resumed. Gladstone accepted an amendment providing that the rule should not apply in nominating select committees. The rule as amended was carried then.

Hon. Frederick Dudley Ryder, brother of the Earl of Harrowby, whose death was announced yesterday, is dead. Both died on the same day.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.

The Empress is now well enough to leave Baden. She will go to Coblenz, whence she will return to Berlin early in December.

ROME, Nov. 21.

Cardinal Domenico Sanguigni, Papal Nuncio to Portugal, is dead.

MUNICH, Nov. 21.

A duel with pistols was fought at Wuzburgh between a captain in the army and a student who had served as a one year volunteer. The captain was killed.

CATTARO, Nov. 21.

M. Hovraz, a state functionary, has been arrested at Cettinge, in consequence of the discovery of a plot to murder M. Vretza, the Montenegrin Minister of the interior.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 21.

All Turkish Ministers and high functionaries, yesterday, visited Von Radowitz, the newly appointed German Ambassador here.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

Towards the close of last evening's session of the Commons, Mr. Gladstone moved an adjournment of the debate on procedure rules on redemption of his promise to give Mr. Yorke an opportunity of inquiry into the release of Parnell and Dillon and O'Kelly from Kilmainham jail. Labouchere by opposing the motion for adjournment, talked out Yorke's motion.

Unless the Government give satisfactory assurance on Thursday, with regard to the Arrears of Rent Act, Parnell will move the adjournment of the House, in order to call attention to the threatening failure of the act.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.

John L. Sullivan failed to meet Allen last night at Harry Hill's to arrange for a prize fight. A large crowd was disappointed.

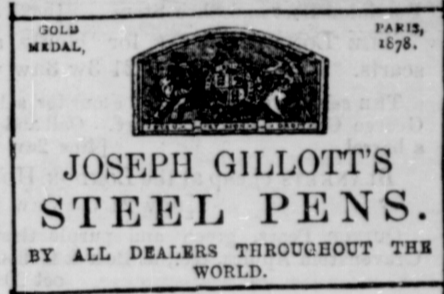

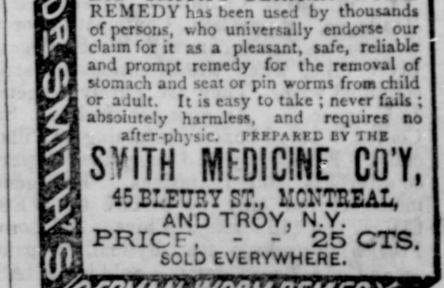
