The R. M. Steamship ACADIA arrived at Halifax, from Liverpool, on Monday last, after a passage of 15 days. The Mail was received in this town by the St. George, from Pictou, on Wednesday last, about 10, p. m. Our London dates are thus brought down to the 17th, and Liverpool to the 18th ult.

Little progress has yet been made in the State trials in Ireland; and if the statement, that one of the defendants alone has 30,000 witnesses to examine, which we observe put forth in some of the papers, be correct, it is very difficult indeed to say when the proceedings may terminate. It is even stated in some of the Dublin papers—and, judging from present appearances, we think such a denouement not at all improbable—that, in consequence of the bungling manner in which the business has been managed, and the informality of the proceedings, the prosecution will be abandoned!

It is said that Mr. O'Connell's health is seriously impaired, and that he has been ordered by his medical advisers to try a change of air.

Trade, we are glad to learn, continues gradually to improve.

The Foreign intelligence is not of much importance.

CANADA.—It is said that Sir Charles Metcalfe has tendered his resignation of the Government of Canada. The reason assigned for this step, on the part of His Excellency, is ill health.

SCOTIA.—The papers of this Province are still occupied with the Elections, the result of which, it is expected, will be in favour of the Liberals.

MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE.—The Royal Gazette of Tuesday contains a Proclamation summoning the Legislature of this Island to meet for the Dispatch of Business on Thursday, the 21st inst. Various conjectures are afloat as to the reasons which have induced the Executive to call the Legislature together so much earlier than usual, and at a season when it must be no small inconvenience to the country members to be absent from their homes. We believe the true reason will be found—if we may hazard a conjecture on the subject—in the circumstance that certain hon. members (including the Speaker of the House) having accepted offices of emolument under the Crown since the last Session, their seats have become jeopardized thereby, and the sooner the question is decided, the better. If this be the object the Executive have in view, in thus calling the House together, we cannot help expressing our entire concurrence in the policy they have, in the present instance, adopted. What will be the ultimate result of this movement, is a mystery beyond our power to solve. Nous verrons!

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—The Sixth Session of this useful institution was opened on the evening of Wednesday last, in Macdonald's Hall, Queen Square, on which occasion, the Hon. Charles Young—after making some prefatory remarks on the present circumstances and future prospects of the Institute—delivered a very elaborate Lecture on Love of Country. The Hall was well filled with a highly respectable and attentive audience, who signified their approbation by repeated bursts of applause.

The following Resolution was proposed by the Hon. Charles Young, and unanimously adopted by the Institute:—

1. RESOLVED, That the Members of the Charlottetown Mechanics' Institute sincerely regret the departure from this Island of the Reverend James Waddell, who was one of the most active and useful members of the Institute, and who always evinced a disposition to promote the objects for which it has been established; that his exertions on behalf of the Institute have ever been duly appreciated by the members, and deserve their warmest thanks; that while the members deplore any occurrence that has caused the removal of Mr. Waddell from this Colony, yet they beg to assure him, that wherever Divine Providence is pleased to place him, he carries with him their best wishes for the future welfare of himself, his lady and his children.

2. RESOLVED, That the Hon. Charles Young, the President, Vice-Presidents and Secretary do compose a Committee, for the purpose of transmitting a copy of the foregoing Resolution to Mr. Waddell.

FIRE.—On Saturday last, about One, p. m., the workshop of Mr. James Maclean, Cooper, in Water Street, was discovered to be on fire. The dwelling-house being immediately connected with the workshop, both were very speedily enveloped in flames. No person being in the workshop at the moment the fire broke out, a live coal is supposed to have fallen upon and ignited the shavings which were lying thickly underneath and around the stove. Although the two town and Mr. Coles' Fire Engines were on the spot within a very brief space after the first alarm was given, and although the buildings were situated on the water side, yet, it being nearly low water at the time, and the nearest well unfortunately dry, the supply of water to the Engines was so scanty, that they were comparatively useless, and both buildings, with the chief part of their contents, were almost totally consumed.

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.—John Johnston, Christy Doyle and Angus Maclean, her son, left Grand River on Saturday last, the 25th ult., for Georgetown, to dispose of some agricultural produce. About dusk the same evening they left the Queen's Wharf, Georgetown, in a small boat, bound for their homes at Grand River. On rounding Burpoint, the boat struck on the reef, which, starting the step of the mast and splitting one of the planks, she began to fill with water very fast, and before they could make Indian Marsh, Launching, they struck on the bar which runs from Boughton Island to De Gross Marsh. The boat being now completely water-logged, Johnston leaped overboard, and desired Maclean to follow, which he did; but on leaping out from the gunwale of the boat, a sea struck her and she capsized. Johnston disappeared, and was seen no more. Maclean succeeded in getting upon the bottom of the boat, and laying hold of his mother, was enabled to keep her above water until assistance came from the shore. James Macormack and Roderick Macphee having heard their cries—it being dark—got a boat out, and arrived in time to save them from a watery grave. Johnston was a native of Scotland, a man of industrious habits, and was known as a Seaman and Rigger. He has left a widow and large helpless family to deplore his loss. Search has been made for the body, but as yet without effect.

DEATH BY FIRE.—The child of Mr. Michael M'Carthy, which, a fortnight since, was so dreadfully burnt by his clothes catching fire, died on Wednesday last, having suffered since the accident much agony.—Gaz.
