Cubs And Cards Involved In Big Ten-Player Trade

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals completed a 10-player deal Monday involving front line pitchers Sam Jones and Tom Poholsky.

The transaction was expected to set off a chain-reaction of deals which have been hanging fire at the major league baseball meetings.

In what John Holland, vice-president of the Cubs, described as "only the first of several deals we have in mind," Chicago obtained catcher Ray Katt, relief pitcher Jackie Collum and infielder Wally Lammers along with Poholsky.

The Cardinals acquired south-paw Jim Davis, catcher Hobie Landrith and utility player Eddie Miksis along with Jones. In addition, the Cubs will get two players from the Cards' triple A farm clubs by March 1.

BOTH ENTHUSIASTIC

Lammers, a .248 hitting short stop at Omaha last season, was assigned to the Cubs' Los Angeles farm in the Pacific Coast League.

Both Bob Scheffing, who recently replaced Stan Hack as manager of the Cubs, and Fred Hutchinson, field leader of the Cards, were enthusiastic over the deal.

"The best part of the deal so far as we are concerned," said Scheffing, "is that we got a better catcher in Katt than anybody we had last season."

Hutchinson says the acquisition of Jones and Davis definitely improved the Cards' pitching.

The Cub-Card deal was expected to break the log-jam which had developed when several clubs expressed a desire for pitchers Bob Rush and Jones. Now, with Jones out of the market, the Phillies, Pirates, Giants and Braves were expected to turn elsewhere.

LEWIS, HARRIS POT 4 EACH

Aces Take Over Lead By Defeating Parkdale 10-7

The Summerside Aces made it three straight against the Parkdale Flyers at Civic Stadium last night, outscoring the visitors in a free-wheeling game that ended 10-7. The win put the Summerside team on top of the league by 12 percentage points.

For the most part it was fine hockey to watch and kept a crowd of a little over 1,000 in a state of high excitement. Most of the 17 goals were the result of well-angled combination plays, and Mann and Roper, both very busy goalies, stopped a lot of labelled shots.

Brian Lewis and Vance Harris each scored four counters of the winners - the former winning the Holman "Most valuable player award" The line of Hennessey, Grady and Harris was outstanding. Harris doing the sniping with Coke Grady getting five assists, four of them the result of beautiful set-up passes which put his linemate in scoring position, and Vance finished off the plays to perfection, shooting two of the goals and deflecting two perfectly placed and timed passes into the cage.

Lewis' third goal was a stand-out as he deked Roper out of position to slap the disk into the empty side of the net. His last tally was the result of a penalty shot awarded to him with four seconds to go in the game. Again he went right to goal-mouth and scored on a brilliant sleight-of-stick effort.

Parkdale split the Carver line, using Orin with Jim MacLeod and Hurry, and Willie Dunn between Allie and Skip. Orin Carver scored two goals, getting his own rebound on one occasion. He carried a lot of mail, but was relentlessly hounded by Ace forwards and defence-men. Wood also shot two counters, only four minor penalties were handed out during the game by Gord Kelly and Don Whalen, Summerside getting three.

The teams were even at one goal apiece in the first period, Aces drew ahead 5-3 in the second session, and outscored the visitors 5-4 in the final frame.

9th Annual School For Coaches, Referees Begins

The Ninth Annual Hockey school for coaches and referees, sponsored by the P.E.I. Physical Fitness Division, got off to a great start last night at the Charlottetown Hotel when more than 65 candidates were in attendance at the opening banquet, presided over by the school's director Brig. W.W. Reid.

Guest speaker at the banquet was Danny Gallivan, Montreal sports broadcaster.

Mr. Gallivan chose to speak on "Sport as a profession" and "What sport contributes to the community." Mr. Gallivan said that the attitude of society towards the professional athlete has changed immeasurably in the past number of years. There was a time when the people of a community looked down on the professional athlete but today all this has changed and now he is regarded with open admiration.

SPORT LUCRATIVE

Professional sport today is an upright profession and a lucrative one and contacts made by hockey players during their playing days will be of great benefit when they call it quits.

As an example he cited Butch Bouchard of Montreal Canadiens, who when he started out his career had nothing except a pair of skates that were too big for him and today, one year after his retirement, is a big success in business in Montreal.

The N.H.L. he said has one of the finest pension schemes of any business anywhere. A player who has spent 10 years in the N.H.L. can draw as much as \$225 per month when he reaches 65.

COMMON DENOMINATOR

Mr. Gallivan said sport is one of the great common denominators of life. It strengthens democracy for the essential elements of the two are the same. He said the goal of sport and the goal of education are the same.

"Sport broadens judgement, will and character," he said. "It instills discipline," the speaker said, "and some of the most democratic phases of life are sports events."

"Sport is democratic," he said, "because the only qualities needed to partake in sport are a love to play, ability to produce and a will to make sacrifices. There are no other necessities for sport open to all regardless of race, background or religion."

"The lessons taught in sport," he said, "will stand an athlete in good stead for the bigger battle of life."

NECESSITY FOR GUIDANCE

He said there is a necessity for guidance in sport and it is up to coaches and others to see that youngsters get this guidance. He said that only one out of every 500 hockey players ever get as far as the N.H.L. and for this reason the chance of a good education should never be overlooked in favor of a career as a professional hockey player.

He said that a balance between sport and education should be reached, so that on the one hand he will develop citizens of character and on the other both together will develop citizens of character.

PREMIER MATHESON

Premier A.W. Matheson, thanked Mr. Gallivan for his talk and pointed out that in it Mr. Gallivan had given a talk on three subjects, sport, life and education, and had done it excellently.

The Premier presented Mr. Gallivan with a small gift in appreciation for his efforts on behalf of the hockey school.

J. Pius Callaghan, Vice-President of the Maritime Hockey Association, also spoke, as representative of the M.A.H.A.

Seated at the head table during the banquet were Rev. Eric Robin, Neil Matheson, M.P.; Red Storey, Premier Matheson; Brig. Reid, Mr. Gallivan, Buddy O'Connor, Dr. Lloyd Shaw, Deputy Minister and Director of Education and Mr. Callaghan.

SESSION HELD

Following the banquet candidates were given their first lessons of the school with Buddy O'Connor and Red Storey leading a session on the rules of the game. This was followed by a discussion. This afternoon the two N.H.L. representatives will have a class at the hotel starting at 3:30 on offensive and defensive play.

The school will continue through Wednesday and end Wednesday evening.

Etchevery Enters Hospital For Treatment Of Knee Injury

MONTREAL (CP) — Quarter-back Sam Etchevery of Montreal Alouettes Monday entered hospital for treatment of a knee injury that has bothered him since he was injured in a game at Hamilton Nov. 3.

President Leo Dandurand of the Alouettes said Etchevery played in Saturday's East-West all-star football game at Vancouver despite the injury. The knee was drained at a Vancouver hospital before the game.

When he reported to Alouette offices Monday Sam told club officials the knee again was swollen.

"We sent him to hospital and we'll know in a few days whether an operation will be necessary," said Dandurand.

Hal Patterson, chosen the outstanding player in Canada in 1956, suffered a sprained ankle in Vancouver but will not require hospital treatment. Patterson remained in Vancouver for the weekend and planned to leave there Monday for his home in Rozel, Kan.

Dandurand said Patterson was injured on the first play of Saturday's game.

"He caught the opening kickoff and went under a pile of players," said Dandurand. "When he got up he had a sprained ankle."

Will Harridge Re-elected Pres. Of American Loop

CHICAGO (AP)—The American League Monday re-elected Will Harridge president for a 10-year term.

His current seven-year contract still had another year to run.

The Detroit club nominated him for re-election and Cleveland seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous.

Tom Yawkey of Boston Red Sox was re-elected vice-president of the league and also a member of the executive council.

The council consists of commissioner Ford Frick, Harridge, President Warren Giles of the National League and Walter O'Malley of Brooklyn.

Olympic Village Fast Becoming Ghost Town

MELBOURNE (AP)—The Olympic village at Heidelberg was fast becoming a ghost town Monday as one team after another left in a gigantic airlift from Melbourne's Essendon airport.

When the last plane of the night, Americans, soared off, it left only about 1,000 athletes and officials in the village which once housed 4,640.

By Wednesday, the remaining group will be down to 450, including most of the 46 Hungarians who have decided not to go home.

Spokesmen at the village said this core is likely to remain behind until after Christmas because of the difficult transportation situation.

Airline officials said that some 2,000 are besieging all airlines for a connection out of here, but there is little likelihood of the jam easing before Jan. 7.

GUARD HUNGARIANS

The Hungarians, who are guarded closely by Australian security police, and others in the village took advantage of Monday's bright sunshine. They lolled in shorts and swimsuits on the lawn's outside the duplex houses.

The Hungarian group has received many offers of hospitality, but a spokesman for the Hungarian Association here said the athletes mainly want to go to the United States.

Police Looking Through Village For A Cannon

MELBOURNE (AP)—Police and officials were "tearing the Olympic Village apart" Monday in search of a cannon.

It has a barrel four feet long, three-inch bore and is on mountings. It was used as an ornament outside the Sandringham Yacht Club, which was one of the headquarters of the Olympic yachting events in Port Phillip Bay.

The cannon had been in position 34 years until the Olympic yachtsmen arrived.

Soon afterward the cannon was found to be in the "custody" of a British yachtsman, who took it as a joke and hid it in the British quarters at the village.

But the joke backfired. On Sunday night someone removed the cannon from their quarters and it has not been seen since.

Police searched all cars leaving the village.

Calhoun Unable To Make Fight

CLEVELAND (AP)—Fight promoter Larry Atkins said Monday Rory Calhoun, injured while training in New York, will be unable to make his scheduled appearance against Joey Giardello here Friday night.

The Calhoun-Giardello middleweight bout was scheduled for the feature event on the annual Cleveland News boxing show.
