A LITTLE GIRL KILLED

AT VERNON RIVER CHAPEL YESTER-DAY FORENOON.

Her Skull Crushed in by a Falling Ornament and Death Results.

The sad intelligence was brought to the city last evening by visitors to Vernon River that a little girl was accidentally killed there in the forenoon of that day. The little one's name was Fraser, and she was only thirteen years of age. Her father is Mr. Alexander Fraser, of Carroll's Road.

The accident which caused the loss of the little one's life occurred about ten o'clock, just as the worshippers were entering the Roman Catholic Chapel. The child, with her mother and Mrs. Edward Grant, was standing near the church when one of the heavy ornaments in the turret fell from its place and striking her upon the head crushed her skull.

The child lived about twenty minutes after the accident. Dr. Collins, Rev. Dr. Doyle and others did all in their power to save the young life, but nothing could be done.

The sad affair has cast a gloom over the community, and much sympathy is expressed for the parents so suddenly bereaved. The funeral took place this afternoon.
