- 1. Rural school construction grants; last year \$130,000.00; has assisted in modernizing nearly all rural schools in the Province.
2. Increased subsidies to lower cost of school books to parents; now \$40,000 per year. Result: school books now sold approximately at half price.
3. New policy for senior high schools. Grade XI and XII. Result: Establishment of these schools in many rural centers throughout the Province enabling rural students to obtain a complete high school education nearer home.
4. The establishment this year of a new similar program for Grades 9 and 10 is expected to result in rural students from many one-nova schools being accommodated in rural high school and other centers.
5. Several increases in teachers salaries and increased increments. Our Provincial Government only one in Canada directly paying teachers salaries and ranking second among the provinces in Canada in the large proportion paid for education by the provincial treasury.
6. Increased teacher training loans and grants; now \$400.00 per student.
7. Increased scholarships at the Grade 10 level and for the senior high school grades, including rural high schools as well as Prince of Wales College and fairer distribution of scholarships and prizes.
8. Student Aid. Increase in assistance granted to university students and financial need made the basis for such grants. Assistance to date over \$90,000.
9. Increased grants to the School for the Blind which accommodates our island blind students.
10. Improvement in the Grade X examination system.
11. Broadening the base of payments of assistance to rural schools for transportation and tuition of students when necessary to attend schools in another district.
12. Lower fees at Prince of Wales College for rural students in third and fourth years, cut from \$100 in fourth year to \$25.00.
13. Continued expansion of vocational training since 1944. Since establishment this school trained over one thousand war veterans and presently has a student enrollment annually around six hundred.
14. Total provincial expenditure on education increased over three times in ten year period, with percentage of attendance increasing from 73% to 83% among school age children.
15. Library service. Expanded and increased throughout the Province.
16. Physical fitness program continued without federal assistance.
