OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—(Special)—So widely renowned are Malpeque oysters, that H. J. Robichaud, Liberal M.P. for Gloucester, N.B., mentioned and praised them in the House of Commons Friday last. He spoke of the fact that oysters from the waters of his own riding are in direct competition with Malpeques. It was hence with a red face and slightly sheepish expression that Mr. Robichaud stood up in the House of Commons today and asked to make a correction in Hansard. The line he wished to have changed, reads, "and we must not overlook the famous Malpeque and Shippigan oysters." Said Mr. Robichaud: "I do not think the honourable members from Prince Edward Island would like me to advertise the Malpeque oysters. This line should read, 'we must not overlook the famous Caraque and Shippigan oysters.'" Smiles appeared on the faces of the island members, all of whom were in the House at that time. The broadest grin lit up the countenance of J. Watson MacNaught, Parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Sinclair, whose constituency of Prince is the home of the delectable Malpeques. Mr. MacNaught remarked afterwards that he was delighted to have any member of Commons or Senate praise Malpeque oysters. They are well worth any tribute that may be paid them, he added.

Let's Talk It Over

The circumstances surrounding the unexpected defeat of an English soccer team by an Hungarian team from behind the Iron Curtain should be carefully noted, particularly by people who believe that Communism may not be as black as it is being painted. The defeat was a bitter experience for the English as it tended to spoil an anniversary celebration, and it was the first defeat they had ever suffered. Yet the English applauded the Hungarians for their fine play. In contrast to this the Iron Curtain countries were boorish and offensively boastful after the victory. They had not a word of praise for the defeated team. It would be difficult to find anywhere such striking examples of a good loser and a poor winner. These attitudes are closely associated with the ideologies which each country, England and Hungary, represents. Should Russia and her satellites conquer the free world, we should all have plenty of time to become acquainted with this arrogance and bitter animosity. Displays in moments of triumph. On the other hand, should the free world bring the Communists to their knees, the intrinsic sense of fair play and justice which is a part of our ideology would save the conquered races from being treated with undue harshness. The holocaust of atomic power loomed before any victor, Capitalist or Communist, could be established, however, would leave few of us alive to feel the force of the conqueror's heel.

Continued from page 5 developed railway interests and in a short time several railway lines were routed in and out of the city. The Commission finds this web of railway lines one of the most pressing problems with which they are confronted. More than 150 level crossings within the city limits had to be dealt with and the Commission has succeeded in arranging a bypass line approximately five miles from the downtown district whereby all the through east-bound wheat traffic and west-bound general traffic is diverted from the city proper. This became effective last week. The area entrusted to the Commission for improvement covers about 900 square miles and under the Greber plan, which they are following with the hope that within a few decades the city will assume the status of a beautiful capital of which all Canada may well be proud. Already more than twenty miles of beautiful driveway edged with well kept lawns, fine shade trees and shrubbery has been developed and each spring nearly a million crocuses, hyacinths and tulips add to the natural beauty of this development. "It is the hope of the Federal District Commission to make the great dream of City Planner Jacques Greber a reality and I consider my association with the Commission a privilege and honour as representing this Province in the work that is now in progress", Dr. Blanchard concluded. The speaker was introduced by chairman Jim Montgomery and thanked for his informative talk by co-chairman Art MacPherson. Inspector Nevin of the R. C. M.
