### Sheep Comeback Seen For N.S.

HALIFAX (CP) — Vice-President Victor Aylward of the Nova Scotia Sheep Producers' Association said Tuesday "sheep will come back in large numbers in this province."

Mr. Aylward said in an interview at the Atlantic Winter Fair here that only 27,000 sheep are now in the province in contrast to 400,000 about 80 years ago.

He said lamb prices remained stable this year and with deficiency payments breeders are guaranteed at least 60 cents per pound of wool.

One big improvement in sheep production, he said, is the use of a new drug which kills intestinal parasites.

"But a big mistake is that farmers don't realize how important good pasture is. Nova Scotia is one of the best sheep-producing places in the world... the land is adapted to legumes."

## Counselling Program On Today At Institute

The Charlottetown Rotary Club in co-operation with the National Employment Service and the Provincial Department of Education is sponsoring a career counselling program today at the Provincial Vocational Institute, Malpeque Road, Charlottetown.

The program will involve over 400 students from grades nine, 10, 11 and 12 from Englewood, Central Queens, Rustico and Morell High Schools. The students will be transported by rural High School buses to the Vocational High School where they will be addressed by George Cheverie, chairman of the Rotary Committee on Vocational information, and manager of the Charlottetown Office of the National Employment Service, and by Joseph MacLellan, principal of the Vocational Institute, and Malcolm MacKenzie, Provincial Deputy Minister of Education.

The students will then be counselled in small groups by persons representative of the various courses in which the students have expressed interest.

## Government Officials Look At Housing Sites

Provincial government representatives and officials of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation visited Georgetown late last week in connection with the proposed building in Georgetown of senior citizens housing accommodations.

Georgetown is one of the centers for which tenders were recently called for the construction of a senior citizens home and the welfare committee of the town council is compiling a list of qualified prospective residents for such a housing unit.

The Town Council met several times with the Hon. Leo F. Rosier and officials of the Department of municipal affairs on this question.

It is felt that there is a need for such accommodations in Georgetown and the surrounding area and it is also anticipated

that if senior citizens housing is constructed here that, in common with other centers that have such homes, the demand would increase for such accommodations.

The chairman of the P.E.I. Senior Citizens Housing Corporation recently announced that a massive increase in senior citizens home accommodations will take place. The project provides for the construction of 138 self-contained units in various parts of the province. As a result of

experience gained some changes have been made in the design of such homes and it is anticipated that each home will be built to contain six units, rather than the four units contained in homes already constructed.

**NUMBER OF SITES**  
The officials recently visiting Georgetown looked over a number of prospective sites for locating such a home. It is believed that two of the sites inspected were on land now owned, in one instance by the town and the other site on land now held by the P.E.I. Industrial Development Board.

Two other sites were inspected and reported to be favoured by the officials; one of those is located on Kent Street just north of the rink and the other is on Victoria Street, in an area adjacent to the intersection of Victoria and Glenelg Streets.

### Delay Asked In Probe Of Firm

NEW YORK (AP)—A spokesman for American Telephone and Telegraph Co. said Tuesday the company has asked the Federal Communications Commission to call off its proposed investigation of the firm.

Last week the FCC said it would investigate A. T. and T.'s rate structure with particular regard to rates it charges for commercial distance communications traffic.

Both of the latter sites are on town-owned property. It is expected that a decision will be made soon on the selection of the site and that enough citizens will signify their intention to occupy the home to allow the construction to proceed.

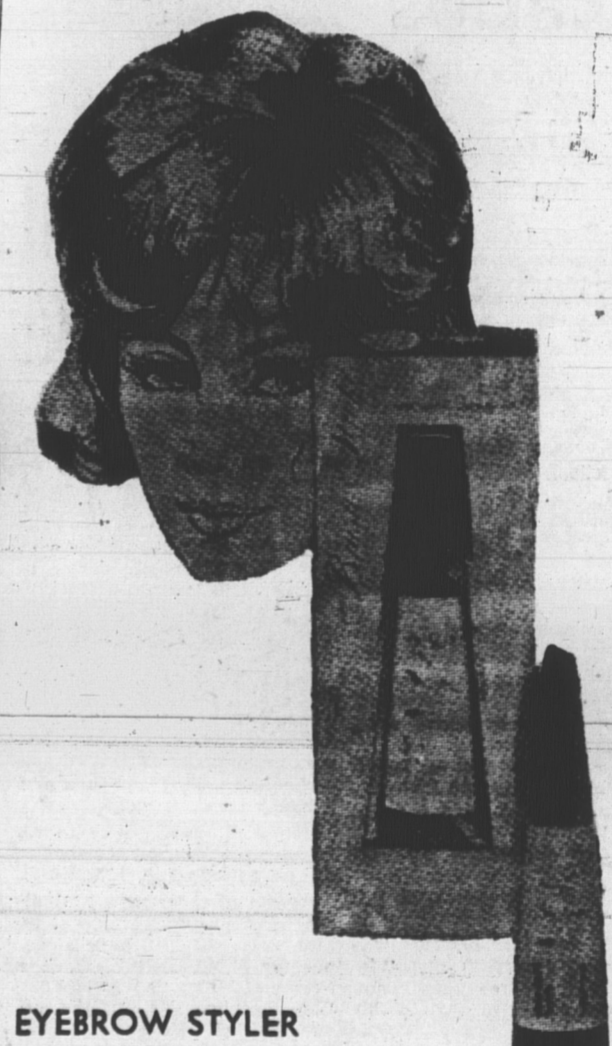

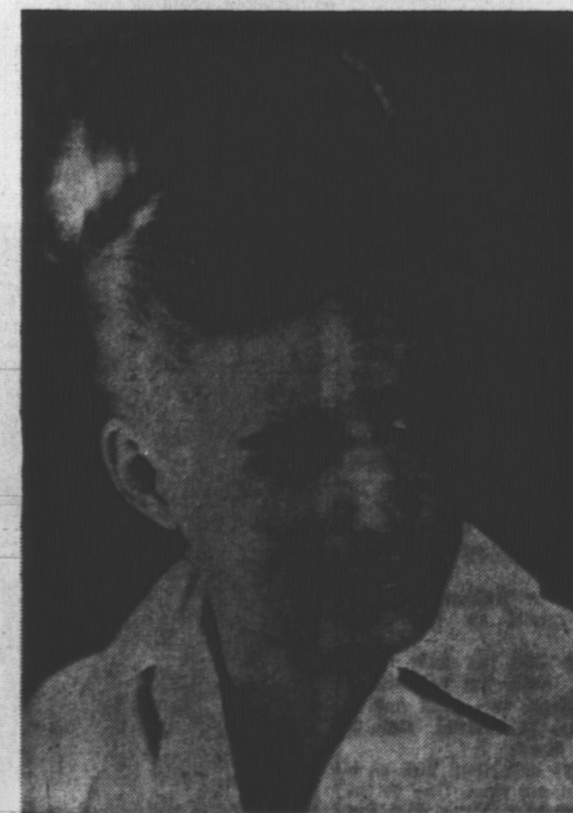
