Of Special Interest to Farmers

RAPE AS A FALL FEED

Opinion of a Practical and Successful Farmer—Information as to Cultivation, Time to Plow, Manuring, Management of Crop etc.

In your Weekly issue of Nov 4th, you ask for an expression of opinion from those who have grown it, as to the value of rape as a fall feed for young cattle, sheep, and hogs. I may say that we have grown rape for six years and we prize it more highly every year; and now we would as soon think of letting spring pass without planting our potatoes or corn as neglecting to sow a piece of rape. We grow it exclusively as fall feed for our lambs although there can be no doubt that it would be a very profitable crop to grow as fall feed for young and beef cattle or hogs, as it is largely grown in Ontario and the Old Country for these as well as for sheep and lambs.

The preparation of the ground for rape should be the same as for turnips as they resemble each other very much, the main difference being that in rape all the strength of the plant goes into the stalk and leaves, instead of into the root as in turnips.

Rape seed is exactly like turnip seed, and can be sown with the turnip seed drill, at the rate of 1 1/4 lbs per acre. It must be sown thinner than turnips as the plants do not need thinning with the hoe. As rape is a gross feeder and grows very rapidly it is fit to turn the lambs on about two months after sowing. The first week of July is about the right time to sow as it is then ready for the lambs by the middle of September by which time they will have the clover aftermath pretty well eaten off.

The scarcity of farmyard manure is no doubt one great reason why more rape is not grown. Generally the farmyard is well emptied of its store for the potatoe and root crops, and none is left for rape. Finding ourselves this year without a supply of manure to apply, we ploughed up a good piece of pasture sod the first week in July—you will notice we had a months good feed off this land before breaking it up—harrowed it well with springtooth harrow till we had at least 3 inches of loose soil. We then drilled it up lightly applying at the rate of 400 lbs superphosphate per acre. The superphosphate gave the plants a fine start and we had the best crop this year we have ever had, some of the plants measuring four feet from ground to tip of leaves.

The lambs after having their tails well docked should be turned in when the rape is dry and then left on it, as if they are turned on when the rape is wet with dew or rain, or turned on with empty stomachs, there is great danger of scouring or bloating. It is best to

have a peice of old meadow grass alongside to let the lambs run over as well.

As to its being a profitable crop to grow we find it very profitable. A moderate estimate is that an acre of rape will support 12 1/2 lambs for two months. When our lambs are running on the rape we give them all the grain they will eat which is about 1 lb per head daily, and on this diet they put on flesh rapidly, the best doing ones fully 1 lb. per head daily, while a flock will average fully 3/4 of a pound increase. If the increase be estimated at the moderate figure of 4 cts per pound, and the grain eaten charged at one cent per pound, you will see that the return from the acre of rape will be \$15.00. Some of your readers may claim that to estimate the increase in weight at 4cts per pound is not justifiable in the face of the low prices current here for lambs but they must remember that the offal from a 100 pound lamb is but a trifle greater than for one of 75 lbs so that 4 cts is quite within the mark. The advantage of growing so profitable a crop and one that has neither to be cut harvested, stored nor hauled, to market as is the case with grain, has only to be tried once to be appreciated. It is hardly necessary to point out that the following crop off the rape ground is most gratifying to the farmer, no other preparation or system of manuring land can compare with this for putting land in condition to grow bountiful crops.

Feed your turnips only immediately after milking and don't feed more than a half bushel at a time to each cow if you value the reputation of your milk and your butter.

Keep the sheep up out of the fall rains as the grass gets killed feed a few roots. Sheep always fret until the snow comes and it pays to give them a little extra feed in the shape of roots and grain.—Co-operative Farmer.

New Steamship Route.

LONDON, Nov 15.—The Canadian Steamship Company's first sailing on the line from Milford Haven to Papebiac, Que., is announced for the 7th of December. A service of fourteen knot vessels is promised till April next, after which seventeen knot vessels will be put on the line. The company expects to establish a mail service, saving two days in the time of carriage between London and Canada.

THE PROVISION MARKET.

Chicago Weaker—Lard in Liverpool Declines—Local Steady.

The Montreal Gazeete reports: The local provision market was quiet again today, the demand being chiefly for small lots to fill actual wants at steady prices. We quote: Canadian pork in barrels, \$16 to \$16.50; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 8 1/2 to 8 1/2 1/2 per pound, and compound refined, at 5c to 5 1/2 per pound. Hams, 10 1/2 to 13, and bacon, 10c to 13c per pound.

The Chicago provision market was weaker, and prices for pork declined 5c to 7 1/2-2c, closing \$7.77 1/2 November; \$7.77 1/2 December; \$8.87 1/2 January. Lard closed 7 1/2-2c lower at \$4.77 1/2 November; \$4.80 December; \$4.87 1/2 January. Short ribs closed \$4.42 1/2 December; \$4.52 1/2 January.

The only change in the Liverpool provision market was a decline of 3d in the price of lard. Pork, 50; lard, 27; boneless long cut heavy bacon, 29-6d; long cut light, 29; short cut light, 30s; and tallow, 19-6d.

Cash quotations closed in Chicago:—Pork, \$7.75 to \$7.80; lard, \$4.87 1/2 to \$4.90; short ribs, \$4.75 to \$4.90; shoulders, 43 8c to 45-8c; short clear sides, \$4.80 to \$4.85.

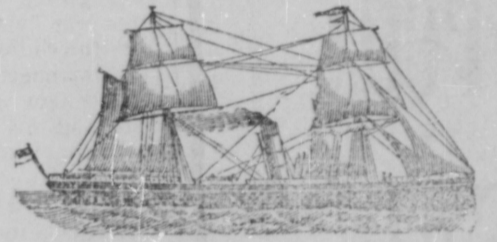


