The party returned home in half-past eleven, well pleased with the manner in which they had been treated by the captain and officers of the St. Lawrence.

The invitations were accepted by quite a number, and all were ready for the departure, anticipating a pleasant voyage. When the admiral discovered that the number who intended to avail themselves of the kindness of the officers was so large, he issued an order to the effect that no person would be allowed on board other than the officers and crew. TRADE IN BERRIES.—The St John Telegraph says: An extensive trade has been done in shipping blueberries and raspberries, chiefly the former, from Welsford, Clarendon, Gasperau and Hoyt stations to the Boston market this season. The berries are forwarded in covered quart boxes, which are returned to be refilled from time to time. It is estimated that from these stations alone (and by far the largest shipments of berries have been from stations on the upper St. John and Aroostook sections) \$5,000 worth of blueberries have been forwarded up to this date. Mr. Wesley Hoyt, of Hoyt station, alone has handled \$1,000 worth.

HENRY M. STANLEY, the African explorer, has satisfactorily established trading stations along the Congo River from its mouth to Stanley Pool, a distance of 1,400 miles by river.
