## U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—The bright spot in current steel markets, says the Magazine Steel Sunday, is provided by construction requirements.

"While other products are moving at noticeably slower pace than a year ago, demand for some building items is outstripping last year's pace," Steel says. "Structurals, sheet piling, reinforcing, guard sheets and rope, and galvanized sheets are definitely in the market. And the strong demand extends to building specialties and tubular goods."

"The trade journal also reports bridge and highway needs stand out. Meanwhile, commercial and nonresidential public building continues to contribute surprisingly strong support to expectations of, at least, a near-record in construction during 1954."

Steel production did not snap back very far after the July 4 curtailment, says the report, and last week the national ingot rate was off one-half point to 64.5 per cent of rated capacity.

"The outlook is not too promising for much improvement before last quarter, this being reflected in a 1 per cent to shorten the Great Lakes ore shipping schedule by at least a month," the report adds.

## New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market was whiplashed by conflicting pressures last week, but it scored another high mark despite handicaps. It was the market's sixth straight weekly advance.

Buyers and sellers all week moved from one section of the market to another seeking strong points and searching for weaknesses. They found plenty of divisions and individual issues that were ripe for their attention.

The net result was a gain of 80 cents in The Associated Press average which closed the week at \$131.40, highest mark since Oct. 22, 1953.

## TOOK HURDLE

The cease-fire in Indo-China was a high hurdle for the market to take, but it took it.

Real highlight of the week was the soaring bull movement in steels when the magic word "merger" was mentioned. Early in the week, rumors circulated linking the names of Bethlehem Steel and Youngstown Sheet and Tube—the second and sixth largest companies in the business.

In the latter part of the week those two stocks shot ahead and pulled all of the other steels up with them. But week's end, the merger was still in the rumor stage, and steels had subsided somewhat.

## NEWCOMER

A newcomer to the list on Tuesday was Royal Dutch Petroleum, one of the largest oil companies in the world. It opened at 59 1/2 and closed the week at 60 1/2.

Monday's market was lower and highly selective. Tuesday witnessed the final stages of negotiations in the Indo-China cease-fire and prices fell away. There was, however, a good recovery before the close. Wednesday's market was higher with steels and oil strong but aircrafts weak on profit-taking arising from peace in Indo-China.

Thursday's market really got rolling with steels out in front on the merger rumors. The market on the New York Stock Exchange broke through to a high of 131 1/2, topping the mark established just a week before. On Friday the market showed through a small gain to another high mark.

## ACTIVE ISSUES

The five most active issues this week on the New York Stock Exchange were International Telephone up 1 1/2 at 21 1/2 on 208,800 shares, Curtiss-Wright off 3/4 at 11 1/2, Boeing Aircraft up 1/4 at 51 1/2, Youngstown Sheet and Tube up 7/8 at 54 1/2, and U. S. Steel up 3/4 at 54 1/2.

The five most active issues on the American Stock Exchange were Equity Corp. up 1/4 at 3 1/2 on 121,400 shares, Technicolor up 1/2 at 13, Mediterranean Petroleum unchanged at 2 1/2, Claude Neon up 1/4 at 5 1/2, and Merrill Petroleum up 1/16 at 7 1/16.

Canadian issues were mixed at week's end. Canadian Pacific was up 1/4 and Distillers Seagram added 1/8. McIntyre and International Nickel were both off 1/4.

## Sees Shift Of Red Tactics In Indo-China Armistice

### Interpreting The News

Now that the Geneva conference has given the Communists half of Viet Nam, the puzzling question remains: Why were the Communists willing to make the agreement and end the war?

They had the French on the run in Indo-China when the Geneva conference began last April and were continuing to push them up to the time the armistice was signed.

They may feel confident they can win control of all Viet Nam in elections to be held in 1956. That would be the first time the Communists had won new territory through free elections.

### SHIFT OF TACTICS

This armistice would seem to signal a shift in Communist tactics, at least temporarily. Instead of trying to subvert and at the

same time split the allies by shooting, as in Korea and Indo-China, they may feel they can accomplish both ends better in a period of peace, or at least give it a try. As long as shooting continued they were in danger. If, instead of settling for half of Viet Nam, they had tried to take it all from the French by force, the United States and Britain eventually might have intervened. The result might have been world war.

Just forcing the French to give them half of Viet Nam was a Communist victory over the West which had been too divided to agree on a plan for stopping them militarily.

GLAD TO SETTLE  
This was twice within a year that communism had pushed the West into a position where it was glad to settle for an armistice instead of fighting on to a victory, in Korea in 1953 and now in Indo-China.

It was a lesson which could hardly be lost on the millions of Asians, who for centuries had been forced to regard the West as invincible when dealing with Asia.

This realization and the memory of what happened in Korea and Indo-China may have a weakening effect on Southeast Asians if they have to make a decision on allying themselves with the West against communism.

Since French Premier Mendès-France had promised to resign this week unless he obtained an Indo-China armistice, it might seem that Russian Foreign Minister Molotov would have wanted to prevent an armistice.

WEAKER OR STRONGER  
For resignation by Mendès-France would have forced the French to choose a new government, perhaps weaker than the present one and more of a push over for Communist pressure.

On the surface that might appear logical. But Molotov had to take into consideration that Mendès-France's failure, and resultant French exasperation and frustration, might have produced a strong military leader and bitterness against the Russians.

It was a gamble and Molotov apparently chose to take it. What Russia wants is to prevent creation of the European Defence Community—the single European army.

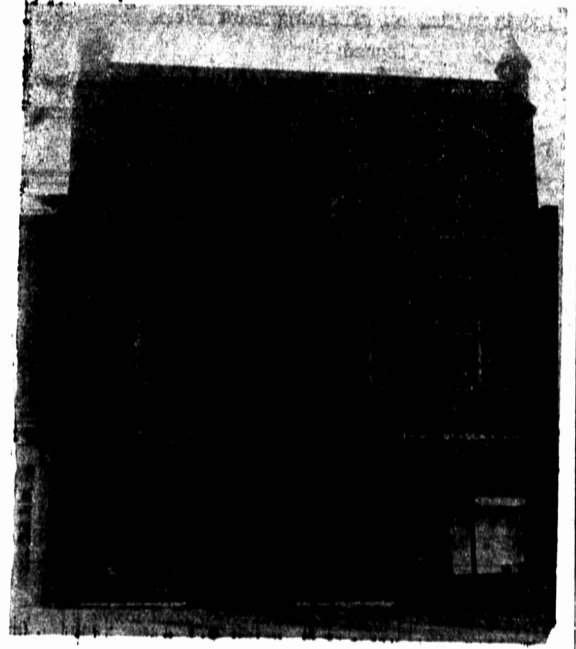

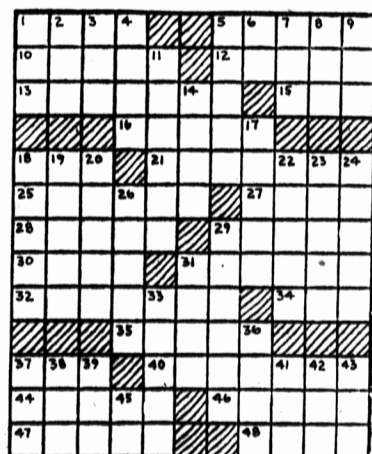
