Eisenhower To Resign Commission If Nominated

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—General Eisenhower by resigning from the army would gain freedom to talk about matters a man in service is forbidden to discuss, and lose financial benefits.

The general said in a press conference at his headquarters near Paris Saturday that he plans to take that course if the Republican convention nominates him for the presidency.

As a five-star officer he could not be retired unless he requested it. He could go into retired status on his own motion, on the basis of either physical disability or length of service.

But a retired officer is subject to military regulations in some degree, lacking a private citizen's freedom to discuss matters which the military still hold under secrecy classification.

Eisenhower said if he is nominated he will get out of "the tree to speak, like any other citizen, on any subject."

Without voluntary retirement or resignation, a five star officer remains technically on duty for his lifetime, available for consultation with the President or the high command, and for other duties such as the European command Eisenhower is quitting.
