under control except for the fifth inning when the Wheelers got five of their hits. Thistle also hit a home run.

Elmer Mahar started for the Wheelers and left in the fifth inning with a 7-6 lead. His successor, playing coach Wally Sheppard allowed eleven runs and seven hits in two innings. Sheppard, in addition to being hit hard, was given little support in the field.

Ted Strain, Vern Blanchard, Ivan Connors and Moe Goodwin each had two hits for the Legion. Jimmy Bradley hit two towering home runs for the Wheelers while Jimmy Hughes and Duke MacCallum hit doubles.

Joy LeClair played a sound defensive game for the winners. "Spud" Chandler pitched a brilliant one-hitter as he led the Lions to their win over the Dairy. Angie Carroll got the lone hit as he led off the sixth inning to spoil Chandler's great effort for a no-hitter.

The Lions obtained eleven hits off Art Ballem. Louie Gaudet led all batters with three hits while Merle Longaphie and Cliff Jackson had two.

The Lions raced into a 4-0 lead in the first inning on three walks and two hits and they never looked back. They came up with five runs in the fourth.

One Canadian Survives In Amateur Golf Tourney

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Lyle Crawford, slim 21-year-old golfer from Vancouver, won his sixth round match at the 23rd hole Wednesday and will be Canada's lone representative from here on in the Canadian amateur golf championship.

Crawford battled it out in an all-Canada match with 23-year-old Moe Norman of Kitchener and goes into today's 36-hole semi-final against highly favored Harvie Ward, Jr. of San Francisco, who knocked out Hobart Manley, Jr., steady, experienced player from Savannah, Ga., 3 and 2.

Norman also eliminated an American in the morning round, having things all his own way in defeating John Kraft of Denver 6 and 5.

Canada's lone standard-bearer spent a couple of years at commercial salmon-fishing after leaving school. He started golf "on a bet" when he was only 13 years old.

In a talk about golf Crawford said he could take it up and beat his cousin within a year. The bet was on Crawford won it.

Crawford won the British Columbia amateur and closed this year and was a member of his provincial's Willingdon Cup team—the winning team here last Saturday in the interprovincial team matches.

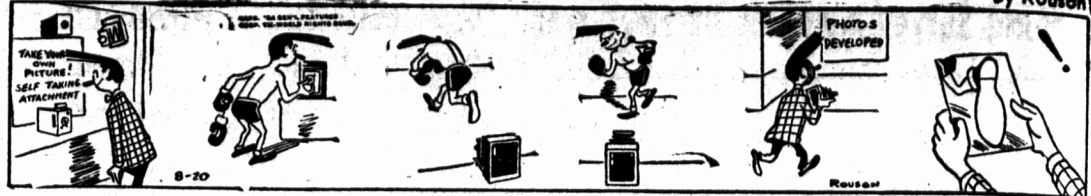

OTTAWA (CP)—A 13-year-old American Thursday knocked the Canadian junior singles champion out of the open singles competition at the Canadian junior tennis tournament, then bowed out of the next round to a fellow countryman.

Gerald Dubie of Hamtramck, Mich., was eliminated from the open singles by David Freisstat of Baltimore, Md., 6-3, 7-5.

Earlier, Dubie, who still is favored to take the boys' open singles title, defeated Guy Duracher of Sherbrooke, Que., winner of the closed junior men's title, 6-4, 6-2.

Mariette Lafrance of Montreal, defending champion in the junior women's open singles, and Eleanor Dodge, also of Montreal, a strong contender, made the final of that event. They meet today to decide the title.

CROWDED COURTS
The juvenile boys' singles, slated to be decided Thursday, was postponed until today, as most of the 17 courts at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club here were used to whittle down large fields in other competitions.

Ray Senkowski of Hamtramck and John Adler of Scarborough, N.Y., will meet in the juvenile boys' singles final. Senkowski defeated David Woodworth of Halifax 6-2, 6-0 to enter the final against Adler, who moved up Wednesday.

Freisstat will meet John McLean of Buffalo, runner-up in the junior men's last year, in the semi-final today.

The final will not be played until Saturday.

Mario Louzon of Montreal, the only Canadian left in the junior men's competition, will meet John Mandel of Astoria, N.Y., today to decide the only vacant semi-final berth. The winner will meet Gerry Schram of Hamtramck.

The Abbies went into the ninth inning sporting a 9-1 lead and appeared as certain of winning by a lopsided score as a gambler cashing in a win ticket at the pari-mutuel wickets.

It appeared even more certain after Donnie MacLean disposed of the first two Summerside batters in the ninth. And then the roof caved in. The Abbies' infield weakened, the Summerside batters started hitting and before the inning was over seven runners crossed the plate to make the score 9-8.

Indeed only for a sensational peg from right field to the plate by Elmer MacNeill the visitors might have gone on to win the game. Joe Bernard was heading home with the tying run when he was caught at the plate by Charlie Ryan for the game-ending out.

Detroit And Cleveland Split; Feller Wins 11th

Detroit broke Cleveland's nine-game winning streak Thursday, setting the stage for the first change in the Indians' league leading margin in nine days.

Second place New York had a chance to cut the Indians' edge to 2½ games in a night contest against the Philadelphia Athletics. The two clubs have remained three games apart since Aug. 10.

The Tigers clubbed three Cleveland pitchers, starting with Mike Garcia, for 14 hits in the second game of a doubleheader and won 8-2 after bowing to Bobby Feller 4-3 in the opener. Feller's victory was his 11th this season and the 260th of his career. He received brilliant relief in the ninth when Ray Narleski struck out the side. Dave Pope hit a two-run homer. Vic Wertz homered in each game.

The New York Giants stayed two games ahead of Brooklyn but moved 5½ in front of the Milwaukee Braves in the National League. The Giants whipped Philadelphia 5-0 on Ruben Gomez seven-hitter. Brooklyn withstood a late Pittsburgh rally for a 7-5 triumph, but the Braves bowled to rookie Gordon Jones of the Cardinals, 2-1 in 10 innings.

Davey Williams, Bobby Hofman and Ray Katt homered as the Giants won their third in a row from the Phillies.

MOVE AHEAD EARLY
Brooklyn piled up seven runs in the first three innings, enough to ward off a Pittsburgh home run attack by Jerry Lynch. Preston Ward and Frank Thomas. All came with the bases empty. Gil Hodges' 32nd home run and Walt Maryn's bases-loaded triple were the big Dodger hits.

A ladies day crowd of 48,857, largest in the history of Milwaukee's county stadium, saw the Cardinals beat the Braves on a triple by Wally Moon and a sacrifice fly by Solly Hemus in the 10th. The Braves had tied the score with two out in the ninth on a double by Joe Adcock and a single by Johnny Logan.

The Chicago White Sox took advantage of Cleveland's lapse and shaded Baltimore 4-3. The White Sox now trail the Indians by 8½ games.

Nellie Fox led Chicago's nine-hit attack with a perfect day at bat, a double and three singles. His fourth hit drove in the winning run in the eighth.

TEB BREAKS SLUMP
Jack Harshman's string of scoreless innings was broken at 34 when Baltimore scored three runs in the fifth. The paid attendance of 3,822 was the lowest of the year for the Orioles.

Boston took over fifth place with an 11-6 verdict at Washington. Ted Williams broke his slump with a double and a single after going hitless in 17 times at bat. Williams also walked four times.

Cincinnati won a pair from the Chicago Cubs, 7-0 on a six-hitter by Karl Drews and 6-3. The double success moved the Redlegs into a
