Unemployment Benefits Paid During January

Unemployment Insurance benefits paid to persons in Prince Edward Island in January totalled \$73,628, according to information released by Mr. C. R. MacNeill, Public Relations Officer for the Regional Office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission at Moncton.

During that month 1596 persons filed claims in comparison with 2239 persons who were registered for employment in the last day of the month. Of these 1901 were males and 338 were females.

The Adjudication Department at Moncton decided that 516 of those who filed claims were not entitled to benefit. All decisions on Island claims are made at the Regional Office in Moncton, and not at the Charlottetown or Summerside Offices. The Adjudication Officers in Moncton consider whether the conditions for receiving benefits as laid down in the Unemployment Insurance Act had been complied with.

They base their decision on the information given by the claimant on the form he fills out when he is applying for benefit, and on his available book. The more information the claimant puts on the form, the easier it is for the adjudicator to make a prompt decision.

From this information, and from the record in the claimant's insurance book the adjudicator decides how long benefits can be paid, the amount of the weekly cheque which is based on the demerit of the stamps used and on whether or not the person has a dependent.

DISQUALIFICATIONS Disqualifications in January were for a variety of reasons. Six persons failed to have their request for benefit granted because it was ruled that they were not available for and capable of work; 17 refused an offer of work or neglected an opportunity to work; 24 were found to be not unemployed under the regulations of the act; 16 had voluntarily left their work without just cause and four others for not having the required number of contributions. There were none who had lost their work due to a labour dispute. This is also reason for disqualification.

In addition to the regular claimant 40 for supplementary benefit were also disposed of during the month and payments totalling \$3,406 were made. The adjudicators passed 235 of these claims for payment while they found that 143 were not entitled to benefit.

Decisions of the adjudicators may be appealed by the claimant who can request that his case be reviewed by the Court of Referees, an independent group representative of employers and employees. If their decision is unfavorable the claimant can request that the Umpire, who is a Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, will decide. His decision is final. In all cases, from the adjudication by the insurance officers to the umpire, the decisions are based solely on the claimant's fulfillment of the conditions of benefit as laid down by the Unemployment Insurance Act.

Liberal Record Reviewed By Provincial Secretary

The following address on the political campaign issues was given on Saturday evening by the Hon. J. Wilfrid Arsenault, Provincial Secretary: "Once again it is election time in Prince Edward Island. And once again the Liberal Party led by Premier J. Walter Jones, is asking you, the voter, for a fresh mandate to carry on the Government of this Province."

"We invite you to examine the record of the Liberal party. We invite you to examine that record, not only in the light of the progress of the past four years, but also in the light of achievements and accomplishments of 15 years of Liberal rule. "When our party took over the reins of Government back in 1935, the economic welfare of this Province left much to be desired. The policies of the party that preceded us were inadequate to cope with the problems of the time with the result that we were in the throes of one of the worst depressions our Province has ever known."

"It was our difficult task to apply the brakes to this runaway depression which threatened our very economic life. Our farmers and fishermen were receiving a mere pittance for the produce which represented their labors. Our young men and women were unable to find themselves jobs and fit themselves into normal living. Risk capital needed to develop our industries and resources was locked up in stringy boxes. Truly, it was an unhappy picture. Truly, "But the Liberal party in this Province, with the support of a newly-elected Liberal administration at Ottawa, set out with vigor and determination to remedy the situation. How we have succeeded in our task is now one of the brighter chapters in the history of this Island Province."

Toronto Interests Seek Site For Summer Hotel In National Park Area

Within a year Prince Edward Island may see an ultra-modern summer hotel under construction in the National Park. Toronto interests, already the owners of three summer resorts, have reportedly expressed a willingness to erect such a building, and are obtaining information about a possible site, beach, golf and transportation facilities and similar details important to tourist promotion. Much of this information had been obtained from literature issued by the Provincial Government, but the interested parties are now gathering the Island story at first-hand.

Premier J. Walter Jones was first consulted, and on his advice, various other members of his cabinet as well as business men conversant with the tourist business. A carefully prepared design of the type of hotel proposed was shown the Premier and others, and it is understood the Toronto interest are prepared to back the project with a considerable financial outlay.

For several years the Provincial Government has favored the building of more and better tourist accommodation. It is known also that the National Park authorities will cooperate in every way to have additional comfortable hotel accommodation provided in the Park area.
