THE CONSERVATIVES DEFEAT.

The weather is somewhat cool. Not since 1876 have the Liberal-Conservatives of this Province suffered such an overwhelming defeat. Not since 1879—when the Davies-Stewart Government was swept away—has such a notable reverse been sustained. It is needless to detail the results which are made evident in THE EXAMINER'S news columns. One consolation remains to the defeated candidates—the consolation of patriotic men who have done that which they deemed to be right in the interests of their country. They did not delude the electors with money and whiskey. Their agents did not give ten dollar notes for votes. They did not try to get in by means which are not legitimate. They have fallen; but they have fallen honorably, and they will rise again. Upon Messrs. Gordon, the three McDonalds, Shaw, Arsenault and Blanchard, will devolve the responsibility which rests upon the Opposition in the Legislature. We have no doubt that they will act their parts well and that they will be well supported from without. The political wheel of fortune will continue to turn, and it may be that the Liberal-Conservatives will on account of the completeness of their fall rise the more quickly. There is a hand laid before the Honorable Frederick Peters and his big majority.

THE LIBERAL VICTORY.

The result of the *fiasco* of the Leader of the Government appeared yesterday. He has won a great and decisive victory. Since the day that he entered office, he has sedulously devoted himself to the task of legislating and administering affairs to the end that he should be successful at the general election. He has been completely successful. Disfranchisement, Gerymmander, Land Office favors public works' jobbery, with money and liquor *ad libitum*, have done the work. The majority of the electors have not yet personally felt the effects of the Premier's peculiar tactics. But it is rather more probable that they will do so ere long. If they have cut a rod for their own backs, let it be remembered that THE EXAMINER warned them against doing so. Borrowing from the banks cannot go on forever. The day of reckoning must inevitably come. It is possible, of course, that the Premier may turn over a new leaf, and begin now to do something for the good of the country. In that case, he will be greatly hampered by the consequences of his own acts. The big balances at the banks will have to be met. More debentures will have to be sold. The wrecked and ruined Land Office must ere long be closed forever, and the revenues from it must cease. Mr. Peters has promised that the Legislature shall be still further reduced; and he will be confronted by his two-thirds clause as well by the selfish interests of his confederates. He has also promised to make ducks and geese of the Premier's "sinking fund", perhaps, he used to that end! But it seems more than probable that he will have to apply direct taxation. For this his party has not been prepared; and before this lie, himself, must, according to his promise, consult his constituents. Altogether, the outlook for the Premier is not, after the great victory, at all bright. If he should exhibit as great ability in righting the wrongs which result from his efforts to secure the election as he has done in "working" the constituencies, he will do well. The credit of the great victory belongs to him. At once the embodiment of one-man power and a leader of Liberals, the author of the plebiscite vote and a generous donor of whiskey by means of willing agents, it is not, perhaps, after all, so wonderful that he has, for the moment, obtained so large a proportion of the votes of Tories and gits, prohibitionists and drinking men; and that the Gerymmander-Disfranchisement-Mortgage Government has been so strongly sustained. Upon the principle that the end justifies the means, the Leader of the Government has played his cards well. He has won a great victory. But Niagara will come.

THE PLEBISCITE.

It is impossible to-day to obtain returns of the Plebiscite vote. Not even an idea of the extent or character of the vote can be formed from the partial and straggling reports which have been made. In the heat and turmoil of the political fight the Plebiscite question did not receive the attention to which it was entitled by reason of its very great difficulty and its very great importance; and the results have been forgotten or overlooked. In some of the polls the ballots were not counted. The exact result will not be known until declaration day. Most of the electors who were reminded that a plebiscite was being taken voted; and it is presumed that of these a very large majority marked their ballots "For Prohibition."

CANADA AND JAMAICA.

Intercolonial Trade Steadily Increasing—A New Cable Wanted.

The Jamaica Gleaner has the following: Canada has long foreseen the value of a direct cable to the West Indies, while the West Indies themselves have settled that sooner or later such a line must be established. We have never ceased to point out the seemingly irremediable defects in the present service, and to urge upon the legislatures of the various colonies and the Imperial authorities, the necessity of supporting the project to extend the cable from Bermuda to Turin Island, and thence to Jamaica. The cordial cooperation of the British colonies, in all of which the extension is regarded as an undertaking of the greatest importance is a sure. The Imperial Government, however, has treated the matter in the same spirit, and has lost them the complete control of the Pacific cable, and we now see it stated that the company are so disgusted with their dilatoriness and indifference that they are negotiating with the French West India Company to run the line from Bermuda to San Domingo, a proposal which is certainly, will be eagerly accepted, not only as a means to further the commercial interests of that island but also as frustrating the scheme for a British cable touching only on British possessions, and in doing so, to further the interests of the Imperial Government to a sense of the risk it is running in refusing to render that legitimate assistance to the Colony which, in the circumstances, is necessary and which would result in reciprocal benefits of the most important character. Apart from what may be termed Imperial purposes such a cable would be of great value in developing the commercial interests of the colonies. "There can be little doubt," says the Times, "that the development of communications would stimulate a more active trade. We have only to look to the progress made in our trade with the Dominion to find an illustration of the statement. In spite of the great and successful rival trade route to the United States in spite of the fact that telegraphic communication is kept up at high rates with New York and London and New York and London prices are alone despatched, the goods of Canada are steadily gaining ground in the West India Markets owing to increased steamship facilities and they would be pushed to a much greater extent into the United States in spite of the fact that the Imperial authorities it is our duty to look to the future and provide as far as possible against the day of international hostilities when existing friendly relations of commerce and consumption may be closed. Such a contingency may never arise, and all will wish that it may long be averted, but the possibility exists and should not be altogether ignored. Markets within the Empire should be opened up and where they already exist should be fostered as much as possible. Contaminations of country people with our own kith and kin delarred—unlike its neighbor—from growing the products of the tropics. It is a potential market for all we can get, and with its growth, the prime essential to facilitate that end is a direct cable, and it would be a most welcome and humbling experience to gain ground in the West Indies, but an honor, as every article should be approved and the reverse be manifest.
