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LET'S EAT

Personalize Frozen Pies To Give Them New Flavor

The Chef took four fragrant fruit pies from the oven. "When I unwrapped those frozen pies, I was a bit skeptical," he remarked. The Chef cut a small wedge of apple pie for each of us. "Very good! If anything, the crust of this apple pie is a little too rich, but nice and tender, Madame."

Then we taste-tested both the frozen blueberry and peach pies. "This blueberry pie is excellent," remarked the Chef. "The peach pie is also good but, in my opinion, more peach is needed. In every case, however, the home-maker gets good value for her money—around 33 cents for a pie that yields four large or six small cuts."

"But, Madame," he continued,

"the pies are always the same in flavor. If served often, they will become monotonous. They will taste like the pies of all one's neighbors. Finally, there will be no more champion home pie bakers."

"Well, Chef," I replied, "I suggest we tell our readers how they can vary and personalize these pies made by automation and satisfy the national desire for new and different flavors."

PERSONALIZED PIES

Frozen Peach Pie: Serve barely warm or cold topped with dairy sour cream dusted with cinnamon. When cold, frost with confectioner's sugar icing and dot with toasted shredded blanched almonds.

Frozen Blueberry Pie: Serve warm with lemon - nutmeg hard

sauce. Or cold spread with confectioner's sugar icing mixed with a little chopped candied ginger.

Frozen Apple Pie: Before baking, dust with ½ tsp. granulated sugar and ¼ tsp. cinnamon. When baked, cover the top with grated Cheddar cheese and finish baking.

Tomorrow's Dinner:
Hot or Chilled Tomato Juice
Broiled Sliced Smoked Ham
Parboiled Potatoes
Broccoli Parmesan
Apple Pie le Vieux Carre
Coffee Tea Milk

All measurements are level. Recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Broiled Sliced Smoked Ham: Partly cooked, rolled, boned tenderized ham, sliced into individual rounds for hearty appetites and into half-slices for small appetites, are easy - do, tasty and easily glamorized.

Broiled: Brush both sides of the ham slices with a little table mustard and melted butter or margarine. Broil 8 to 10 min. 4 inches from the source of heat. Turn once.

COOK'S CORNER

BACHELOR BUTTONS

1 cup of butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
2 1-3 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup coconut (desiccated)
¼ cup walnuts (fine)

Vanilla
Method: Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg, sift in flour, soda and salt. Lastly walnuts and coconut.

Drop by spoonful on a greased cookie sheet. Oven 375 degrees.

MORNING SMILE

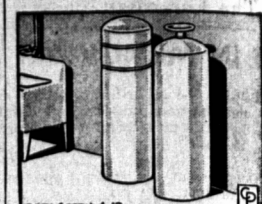

HOUSEHOLD HINT
