## George Bernard Shaw Amazes Nurses, Doctors

LUTON, England, Sept. 13 — (Reuters)—George Bernard Shaw sat up in his hospital bed here today, 12 hours after an operation, and complained that patients got too many baths.

He asked his nurse for a certificate saying he had been washed this morning.

"Otherwise," declared the 94-year-old playwright, "someone else will come along in five minutes and give me another one."

Shaw who broke his left thigh-bone Sunday while walking in his garden, has amazed the nurses and doctors by his toughness. For a man of his age he is showing a remarkable recovery from the operation.

Hospital officials said today: "Mr. Shaw's condition continues to be satisfactory."

As this communique was issued, Shaw was sitting up in bed listening to the radio and reading the newspapers.

Nurse Elizabeth Gallagher, who bathed the world's greatest living literary figure this morning, read him letters and telegrams from sympathizers.

"He is a very good patient and does what I tell him — now," she said.

The playwright will not be allowed to see visitors until tomorrow at least. But today his devoted housekeeper, Mrs. Alice Laden, was allowed to take him some of his own blankets.

She had flown from a vacation visit to Scotland to be near his bedside.

"I'm going to do everything in my power to bring him home," she said today as she wandered through the empty rooms of Shaw's red-brick house at Ayott St. Lawrence, near here.

"He loves his house and it is only right he should be here during his illness."

## Swine Population Shows Increase

OTTAWA, Sept. 13 — (CP)—The swine population is growing in Canada.

The number on Canadian farms, excluding Newfoundland, on June 1 rose two per cent over the same date last year. This brought the population to 5,247,100 from 5,122,900, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Increases occurred in all but the Prairie Provinces. The spring pig crop was about the same as last year. Breeding intentions indicate a fall pig crop this year almost three per cent below that of 1949.

Estimates of the number of swine by Provinces on June 1, with the total for June 1, 1949, in brackets:

Prince Edward Island 67,800 (63,500); Nova Scotia 55,500 (49,800); New Brunswick 83,900 (75,500); Quebec 1,249,900 (1,116,300); Ontario 2,213,100 (2,193,100); Man-

itoba 289,400 (303,000); Saskatchewan 700 (647,100); British Columbia 64,000 (55,000).
