Manitoba, 4 Ministerial, 1 Opposition. Northwest Territories, 4 to hear from, who are classed Ministerial. British Columbia, 1 Ministerial, and five to hear from. The 12 seats yet to hear from are undoubtedly Ministerial, and will give Sir John a majority of 40.

One of the most sensible and business-like assemblages that have been reported recently was that of coal operators and miners at Columbus, Ohio, a few days ago. There were present on the part of the operators the following: For Ohio, 82; Illinois, 11; Indiana, 25; Pennsylvania, 20; West Virginia, 1; total operators, 139. On the part of the miners: Ohio, 21; Illinois, 15; Indiana, 15; Pennsylvania, 8; West Virginia, 1; total for miners, 60. The object of the meeting was to devise some plan of operation whereby peace and good will might be established and maintained among the persons interested in getting out coal.
