On January 28th, 1959 St. Mary's Parish Soursis was saddened by the news of the death of one of its oldest and well known residents Joseph A. MacDonald, who passed away at the Soursis Hospital after a brief illness.

Joe Allan as he was commonly known by his large number of friends and relatives at home and abroad was in his 79th year.

He was the third eldest member of a family of eight (four sons and four daughters) of the late Allan D. MacDonald (Big Donald) and Mary MacLean (Hugh Ban) those ancestors could claim their Highland lineage back to Scotland and who settled on a one third portion of a tract of land at Harmony Junction known as "The Big Donald Estate".

Here the subject of this obituary made a success of his achievements. His home became noted for the unexcelled Highland hospitality, true christian, charity, piety, and industry.

These fine principles were full exemplified by his beloved wife, Katie MacPhee, who predeceased him by 10 years and a family of four daughters who will continue to carry on in a true tradition vein.

Possessing musical talent of no meagre standing, he was capable of making innumerable friends on the many occasions at which the strains of his violin could be heard ringing from the old time wedding to lesser functions all over the countryside.

At his home this beautiful type of entertainment, his humorous conversations his cheerful smile combined with the fine traits of his beloved wife rendered their home a mecca for visitors of all walks and levels, ranging from the teenage, who sought laughter and cheer to the class who looked for a real warmth of welcome that was always so genuine and sincere.

The late Mr. MacDonald a devoted Catholic was a faithful member of St. Mary's Church and a loyal supporter of all Parish activities. He was a life long member of the Holy Name Society.

The many Mass cards and expressions of sympathy and the neighbourly acts of kindness at the MacDonald home were much appreciated by and were very consoling to the bereaved family.

The funeral was held from his late residence at Harmony Junction on January 31st, a High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the pastor Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy V. G. Rev. John Cash officiated at the grave in the church cemetery.

The pallbearers were Harry Leslie, Joseph MacDonald, Cyril MacDonald, Basil Bryan, John McCormack, and Bernard Macaulay.

He is survived by four daughters Estelle (Mrs. Blaine McVarish, Soursis Lane Road), Agnes (Mrs. Pius MacPhee, Big Pond), Seria (Mrs. Harold Murphy, Montreal), Patricia (Mrs. John Dunphy, Soursis) also ten grandchildren. There are also two sisters Mrs. Sophia MacEachern, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Margaret Jansen, Oakland California, and two brothers Donald St. Paul, Minnesota and John J. DesMaines, Iowa, a brother Hugh and two sisters Elizabeth and Carmelia (Mrs. Jerome MacDonald) predeceased him.

MRS. AMY E. SHERMAN

There passed away in the early hours of Tuesday, April 7th, 1959, Mrs. Amy E. Sherman in her 88th year.

The late Mrs. Sherman was born at Travellers Rest, Prince Edward Island, the daughter of John and Elizabeth Rayner Waite. She was one of six children all of whom have predeceased her except one sister, Ella, Mrs. B. S. Muttart of Edmonton, Alberta.

At a young girl she went to Boston where she was employed for some time. In 1901 she married Lowinsbury Sherman but this union was severed in 1910 when Mr. Sherman passed away after a lengthy illness during which she was his constant nurse.

Aunt Amy, as she was affectionately known to many, loved all children and endeared herself to all who knew her. She was never idle and when the time came that it was too difficult for her to be about on her feet she kept busy with her knitting and piecing quilts.

Mrs. Sherman was a faithful member of the Anglican Church and was ministered to in her last illness by her pastor the Rev. D. S. A. Minton of St. John's Anglican Church, Crapaud.

The funeral which was from St. Eleanor's Anglican Church on Thursday April 9 was conducted by Rev. D. S. A. Minton. The hymns sung were "How Sweet The Name of Jesus Sounds" and "King of Love My Shepherd Is." 44-Year Mother Regains Memory

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Who am I? Where am I from? Have I a family? What happened? A 44-year-old mother says these questions gnawed at her mind through 2 1/2 years of wandering across the United States and in Manila and Havana.

Her memory regained, Mrs. Mildred Hall of Los Angeles told the story of an unhappy odyssey during which she was a stow-away, a shill, a waitress and a singer.

Once a singer and movie actress, she left her husband and four children Nov. 15, 1956, without explanation. She says she was a victim of amnesia.

Now she is resting at the home of her mother, trying to sort out vague, jumbled memories.

She says her recollection goes back to sometime in 1956 when she took a bus from Meridian, Miss., to New Orleans.

BROKE IN NEW ORLEANS "I wandered the streets," she said.

Citizens of Kinkora and vicinity learned with regret on Feb. 23rd 1959 of the death of Mrs. James J. Smith, who took place in the Chronic Care Centre, Summerside.

Mrs. Smith, who was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Murphy, had been in delicate health for the past three years. During the long illness of her late husband she tenderly cared for him up to the time of his death some three years ago. This taxed her strength and coupled with her advancing age caused her final illness which was prolonged and which she bore with perfect resignation to God's will.

The late Mrs. Smith was of a very kind and cheerful disposition. Anyone who visited her home could not but be touched by the genuine kindness and hospitality which fairly radiated from this good, kind and eminently Christian soul. To know her was to absorb something of her real Christian character and anyone who had the pleasure of her acquaintance realized that she was truly the ideal Christian wife and mother.

HALIFAX (CP)—Mayor I.W. Akerley of Dartmouth said Sunday he and several town councillors feel consideration should be given immediately to an application for a city charter.

STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.
