The Life Underwriters Association of Prince Edward Island held the special luncheon meeting yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The main purpose of the meeting was to hear the report of the president R.J. Rupert, who represented the group at the annual meeting of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada, held in Toronto last week.

Mr. Rupert said membership had reached an all-time high of 11,877 and marked progress had been made in the educational programs, aimed at giving professional status to life insurance salesmen who qualify in the Association's training course and the special course leading to the chartered life underwriters degree. He also reviewed a number of matters discussed at the convention of special interest and importance to life insurance men, including the continuing trend toward government operated health and pension plans; pre-licensing examinations for prospective life insurance salesmen, and development in the taxation field as related to life insurance policies.

Mr. Rupert told of plans for an intensive membership campaign throughout Canada. "It is felt," he said, "that too many life insurance salesmen are making a free ride, receiving benefits as a result of the work of the association, but failing to support through membership."

A report on plans in connection with the 1963 convention was presented by Robert Parker, who is chairman of the committee on arrangements. Two internationally known speakers will be in attendance, one whom is Aubrey Oldham, of Ottawa, president-elect of the association.
