ISLAND BRIEFS

Death Sentence Is Carried Out

VANCOUVER (CP)—Life will end early today for Leo Anthony Mantha.

The 31-year-old tugboat man will die at 12:01 a.m. PDT (4:01 a.m. ADT) on the gallows at nearby Oakalla Prison farm for the murder of his friend, seaman Aaron Jenkins, 23.

Mantha's last hope for a reprieve was cut off Monday by a telegram from the office of Solicitor-General Balcer in Ottawa. It read:

"The Governor - General in Council will not interfere with death sentence."

FATAL STABBING
Mantha, a native of Montreal, was convicted Dec. 17 of the fatal stabbing of Jenkins, a member of the Royal Canadian Navy from Codys, N.B., in his barrack-room bed at HMCS Naden in Esquimalt, near Victoria.

He was sentenced to be executed March 17 but later was granted a reprieve until April 29 while an appeal was heard. The appeal judges unanimously rejected the appeal without leaving the bench.

Evidence was given at the trial that Mantha and Jenkins were homosexuals and were "going together." Jenkins had wanted to break off the relationship and marry a girl friend.

RANCH DESTROYED

Fire destroyed an old unoccupied fox ranch owned by J. E. Dalton of Summerside Saturday afternoon. The ranch was located east of People's Cemetery in the Sherbrooke area.

The ranch's isolated position prevented fire fighting equipment from going to the scene.

AS THIS CHART shows ice will not be a factor in hindering lobster fishermen when the season opens on Friday. Ice concentration is plotted on the chart in the form of a fraction with the upper half of the fraction signifying total tenths of ice present and the lower figure representing tenths in size ranges: brash and ice cakes, small and medium floes, big and vast floes. Thus 3-110 means the total concentration is two-tenths of which one-tenth is brash ice; one-tenth is small and medium floes and none is big or vast floes.

Ice Will Not Be Hindrance To Lobster Fishermen Friday

Prince Edward Island lobster fishermen have nothing to fear from the amount of ice now left in fishing areas. Captain A. Brown ice information officer of the marine branch of the department of transport, observed yesterday.

All ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence is gone and only a small number of ice floes is left between Tormentine, N.B. and Capraud.

Only ice on the New Brunswick coast extends from Dalhousie to Campbellton. The CGS Ernest Lapointe will soon clear these areas where the ice is still fast.

The Strait of Canso and the area around the Magdalen Islands are clear.

There is heavy ice on the west coast of Newfoundland from Flowers Cape to Port-Aux-Basques. Caribou is obstructed by heavy ice. The schooner Labrador is assisting shipping in that vicinity.

Captain Brown observed that conditions in Newfoundland will quickly improve with favorable weather.

Dairy Head Feels New Prices Will Permit More Flexibility

OTTAWA.—In commenting on the new dairy price stabilization measures announced by the federal government, E. A. Lewis, president, the national Dairy Council of Canada, said it would take several months to determine the effect of the new price levels on production and consumption of dairy foods.

He felt, however, that although it was too soon to praise or condemn the changes, the new policy permitted greater "flexibility" and represented a serious effort by the government to bring total milk production and consumption into better balance.

Mr. Lewis noted that no change in the method or level of butter supports had been indicated and stated that ways and means of increasing butter sales, which slumped 9,000,000 pounds last year, should be given careful study by government and industry. Butter stocks were some 50,000,000 pounds in excess of domestic market for butter which now uses about 50 per cent of the total milk sold off Canadian farms.

Hammer Drill Used To Find Main Break

SUMMERSIDE—An electric hammer drill was called into service last evening to break through the pavement to reach a break in the Summerside water system on Water Street East that has forced water to the surface in a steady stream since Saturday evening.

The break is believed to be somewhere in an abandoned one inch service which at one time served a residence on the site where the present parking lot and auto parts building of F. Earle MacDonald Ltd. is located.

Yesterday a pump was operated for a time and members of the water department were in the area throughout the day in connection with the break.

Large yesterday afternoon an excavation was commenced near Amalgamated Dairy to dig down to the connecting water main, and try to shut off the uncontrolled flow of water from the broken line.

LOCAL FIRM GETS IT Nfld. Wants Subsidy For 'Island' Service

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The Newfoundland board of trade wants a federal subsidy for boat service between this province and Prince Edward Island paid to a Newfoundland shipping company. A P.E.I. firm now operates the service.

The board has made a request to this effect to the Canadian Commission. However, a board official says the commission declined to consider the suggestion until it received the Prince Edward Island Government's views on the matter.

The Newfoundland board contends that Prince Edward Island farmers benefit most from the subsidy since the bulk of the traffic is Island farm produce shipped to this province. Therefore, a Newfoundland company should get the shipping subsidy to help balance things.

The Prince Edward Island government began paying a subsidy to a P.E.I. company to help promote sale of Island farm products in Newfoundland. Later the federal government agreed to contribute and now pays 80 per cent of it. Prince Edward Island pays the balance.

A trade board spokesman said: "Newfoundland is a very good customer of Prince Edward Island, especially in the purchase of livestock, vegetables and dairy products. But trade between the two provinces is pretty well on a one-way basis."

"The board of trade therefore feels quite strongly that any subsidies paid by the federal government to support a shipping service between P.E.I. and Newfoundland at least be given to a Newfoundland shipping company when it is considered that P.E.I. is the main beneficiary to this one-sided trade."

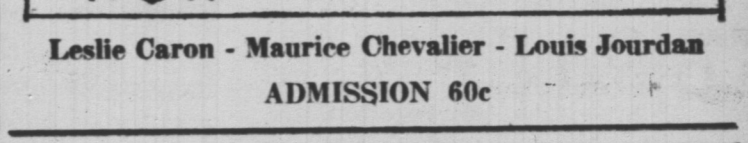
