

Current Notes.

A ladies' fashion paper says that scissors are held with the broad blade uppermost. This information at last settles a point which has long puzzled a good many American editors who at midnight have frequently lost a good item by their inability to decide which blade should take precedence.

The bell of a Massachusetts woolen mill was rung at 5 o'clock every morning except Sunday. It weighed 2,000 pounds, and was intended to awaken every employee, which it did, as well as every one else in town. It was complained of as a nuisance, and a Supreme Court Judge enjoined the owners not to ring it before 6 1/2 a.m. This decree has been affirmed on appeal to the full bench.

Gold.—Favorable reports reach us from the gold field of Fifteen Mile Stream. A new lead has been discovered by the Hall-Anderson Co., which promises to be very rich. Prospecting is being carried on extensively with good results, and rich boulders have been picked up in several places, indicating a richer lead in the vicinity than has yet been discovered.—Eastern Chronicle.

Handicapped by an Alderman.—A foot race has been arranged between Henry Hassemmer, of New York, and Fred Noily of Philadelphia, for \$250 a side and a basket of wine, the conditions being that Hassemmer, weighing 276 pounds, is to run one hundred yards, while Mr. Noily, weighing 150 pounds, runs fifty yards, carrying Alderman B. F. Martin, weighing 205 pounds, on his back.

Lawn-tennis, not being found sufficiently exciting for the French ladies, they are learning fencing. At Deauville there is a fencing room, were numerous ladies wearing the prettiest and most coquetish costumes, already display a certain proficiency with the foils. An assault of amateurs is to take place at Dieppe during the great week. The "bouquet" will be a fencing-match between two ladies.

Oscar Wilde was pleased with the South, but he grew somewhat tired of hearing what it was "before the war." Of this peculiarity of the southern people he tells the following story: "I was once sitting on the porch of a country house," he said, "with a young lady, admiring the beauty of a limpid stream under the rays of the moon, and I said to the young lady, 'How beautiful is the moonlight falling on the water.' 'It is beautiful, indeed,' she replied, 'but ah, Mr. Wilde, you ought to have seen it before the war.'"

Says the London Vanity Fair.—Two well-known and excellent judges of horse-flesh one day last week posted themselves one at each end of Rotten Row, a mile apart, during the time when the Park was at its fullest and filled with riders and horses. They each put a value on each horse as it passed, and after an hour each added up his values and divided the result by the number of horses. On their making comparison it turned out that each had arrived at an identical average of \$17 per nag; and this at the supreme moment of what we call the finest show of horse-flesh in Europe.

The London Daily News praises American oysters, but we are not sure that "better advised Americans prefer the bigger ones," even for luncheon. It is true that the American gourmet like a larger oyster than does his sometimes foreign neighbor, who wants a little, ice cold, deep shell and frequently tasteless one; but through there are oyster lovers among us who taught Thackeray to praise huge Saddle Rocks, it is doubtful that the best discerning oyster eaters go beyond what the experienced boxman known as the "medium." One of the oldest and best oyster-men of Long Island Sound, says—"An oyster is one of those things whose flavor is hurt by too much ice; its eye alone should be touched by the fork; it should be cooked briskly for only a few seconds; requires a good many fellows in a stew, and it injured by the much milk."

According to the annual statement prepared by the Commercial and Financial Chronicle the cotton crop for the twelve months ending with August is considerably less than that for either of the two preceding seasons. The yield was 5,465,845 bales in 1881-82, 6,589,329 in 1880-81 and 5,757,397 in 1879-80. The average weight of the bales is also less for the last than for either of the two preceding crops, being 475.67 pounds in 1881-82, 485.88 in 1880-81 and 481.55 in 1879-80. In aggregate weight the production of the past year is 19.24 per cent. less than that of the preceding season. The Chronicle's figures show a steady increase in the amount of cotton manufactured in the South. In 1879-80 the amount consumed by Southern mills was 179,000 bales, in the following year it was 205,000 and in the season just closed it reached 238,000. This indicates an encouraging growth of the Southern manufacturing industry.
