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CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Several Important Matters up for Consideration.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Warburton presiding. Councillor Lyons, whose illness will not permit his going out at nights, was the only absentee.

After the transaction of some routine business, a letter was read from the Sewer and Water Commissioners regarding the claim of the McKinnon estate for work performed in connection with the water-works by the late firm of McKinnon & McLean. The claim, it was pointed out, had been reduced from \$900 to \$750, and it was suggested that the latter sum be paid as a settlement in full.

The suggestion was acted upon, and on motion of Councillor Whear the Commissioners were authorized to issue a debenture for \$750, provided that amount be accepted as a settlement in full.

Another communication from the Sewer and Water Commissioners asked for a debenture issue of \$30,000 for sewerage construction, to run for 40 years and bear interest at 3 1/2 per cent. It was ordered that the request be complied with.

A communication was read from the Local Council of Women asking that employers be requested to provide better toilet accommodation for females in their employ. Councillors Whear, Horne and Brown were appointed a special committee to enquire into the matter.

Councillor Whear explained that owing to the low amount of the tenders received for the city weigh scales it had been decided that the city should manage the scales, placing a man in charge who would make returns to the City Clerk every Saturday night. He moved that Joseph Wakefield be appointed weigher at a salary of \$250 per annum. Carried.

A report from the police committee recommended amongst other things that the police patrol the city singly instead of in pairs as at present, that the members of the force wear their regular uniforms whilst on duty, and that loafing in the police station be prohibited. The report was adopted.

The resolution recommending the abolition of the ward system in civic elections, passed at the meeting of citizens held in the Market Hall some time ago, was submitted to the Board by Mayor Warburton and referred to the committee on legislation appointed at the last meeting of the council.

The claim of Mrs. John Higgins for damages sustained by reason of a defective sidewalk was referred to the Finance Committee with power to take such action as they deem advisable.

Councillor Tanton moved that the Water and Sewer Commissioners be requested to move the water fountain at Beatz's corner to a location at or near Wheatley's corner or to some place which will be of less annoyance to foot passengers in that locality. The resolution carried.

Councillor Horne moved that a committee of three be appointed to prepare a plan and specification for a new bridge on Brighton Road and report at next meeting.

Councillors Brown and Taylor pointed out that the street committee were moving in the matter and Councillor Horne's resolution was therefore recalled for.

Upon motion of Councillor Taylor Councillor Horne was given leave to withdraw his motion.

Councillor Brown submitted the following resolution, which was seconded by Councillor Taylor:—

Whereas, the present city surveyor holds the dual position of city surveyor and superintendent of water and sewerage and therefore is not only subject to the order of this council but also subject to the directions of the commissioners of sewers and water supply who are wholly independent of this council; and whereas it is expedient that the city surveyor should be under the absolute and sole control of this council;

Therefore resolved, that the services of Charles Dalziel as such city surveyor be dispensed with and Mr. J. P. Nicholson be appointed city surveyor at the salary of six hundred dollars per annum from this date.

Councillors Horne and Tanton spoke strongly against the resolution. Councillors Brown and Taylor said they had

nothing whatever against Mr. Dalziel; they only wanted a man for surveyor who would be directly under the control of the council.

Councillor Horne moved, seconded by Councillor Tanton, that Councillor Brown have leave to withdraw his motion.

The amendment was then put and declared lost on the following division:—
Ayes—Horne, Tanton, Whear.
Nays—Brown, Taylor, Balls, McDonald.
The original motion was then put and carried.

Councillor McDonald moved the following resolution seconded by Councillor Whear:—

Resolved that the city clerk be authorized to advertise for tenders for lighting the City of Charlottetown with electricity at the expiration of the present lease, viz. December 19th next, for the term of three or five years.

The motion carried.

Councillor Whear gave notice of the usual assessment by-laws. He also pointed out, for the information of Councillor Horne, that negotiations were in progress for the purchase of a new crusher. Councillor Brown submitted the tenders for plank. The tender of M. P. Hogan, being the lowest, was accepted.

Councillor Whear, seconded by Councillor McDonald, submitted the following resolution:—

Whereas, in the original laying out of this city, certain places were reserved by the Crown as parks or squares for the free use and enjoyment of the citizens and of all Her Majesty's subjects as recreation grounds or breathing places; namely Pownal and Rochford Squares in the western portion and Hillsborough and King Squares in the eastern portion of the city whilst Queen Square in the centre was reserved for public buildings.

And Whereas, the Government of this Province very many years ago contrary to the original intention for which those squares were set apart, appropriated about one half of Pownal Square and erected a building thereon as a jail for Queen's County.

And Whereas, the appropriation of the said square for the purposes of a jail was an infringement of the rights of the citizens.

And Whereas, the present jail building has become very old and dilapidated in appearance and has been frequently reported by different Grand Juries as in a very unsatisfactory condition, in many respects partially unfit for habitation and virtually a disgrace to the province.

And Whereas, the time has now arrived when a new and modern building is an absolute necessity.

Therefore Resolved that the Local Government be memorialized to at once cause the removal of the Queen's County Jail from its present site or to provide for the construction of a modern building in a more suitable situation.

That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Executive Council of this Province and to each of the City Members of the Legislature and that a committee consisting of His Worship the Mayor and Councillors Whear, Macdonald and Horne be appointed to confer with the Government on the subject of this resolution.

The resolution was adopted.

Councillor Whear also submitted the draft of a bye-law regarding the taxing of persons from abroad (other than commercial travellers) soliciting orders for stationery, clothing, etc. in Charlottetown, which was referred to the Finance Committee who are to act with the Recorder in preparing a bill for submission to the Legislature.

Councillor Whear reported that at a meeting of the Fire Board the repairing of Sibley steam fire engine had been recommended, also the purchase of ladders and rubber coats for the firemen. The recommendation of the Board was approved.
Court adjourned.
