

Winnipeg's Flying Bandit Has Yen For Fancy Living

WINNIPEG (CP)—A yen for fancy living and a quick wit to work out the angles were the main assets that helped Kenneth Leishman become known as Winnipeg's Flying Bandit.

"He always had a good imagination," on acquaintance said "of the prematurely bald 34-year-old who is among 10 men who

escaped from Manitoba's provincial jail at Headingley Thursday night.

Leishman, always possessing a flair for good clothes and shiny cars, was being held at the jail to await his trial this month on a charge of theft and conspiracy in the \$383,000 gold bullion robbery from Winnipeg's International Airport March 1.

Along with the conspiracy charge, Leishman was also being held as a parole violator—a charge police laid when the trail ended for him in Vancouver less than two weeks after the daring gold robbery was pulled.

Leishman first made headlines in 1958 when he was arrested in Toronto and charged with a bank robbery and an attempted bank robbery.

The two charges netted him 12 years in prison but the evidence that came out of his trial spoke for his imagination and daring.

making plans for his second trip in March, 1958.

He followed a similar pattern on the second try but fell short of success when a woman, a clergyman and two bank employees battered him into submission during the robbery.

While serving time in Stony Mountain Penitentiary, 20 miles north of Winnipeg, Leishman became a "model prisoner."

Always a smooth talker and quick to make friends, Leishman became chairman of the prison's class, on the theme: "How to make friends and influence people."

About 3 1/2 years after he was sentenced, Leishman walked out from behind the tall gates of Stony Mountain with the approval of the parole board in 1961.

Following his release, Leishman returned to being a salesman of everything from pots and pans to aluminum sidings. With his business contacts renewed once again, he was on his way to success he enjoyed previously.

Then suddenly 12 gold bars were whisked away from the International Airport March 1. Twelve days later the trail led to Vancouver where Leishman was picked up and held for parole violation. Although he didn't have any gold bullion in his possession, he did have an airline ticket for Hong Kong and the conspiracy and theft charges followed.

Four other men also have been committed for trial on various charges in connection with the theft, in which two men posing as airline cargo crew signed forged documents for a shipment of bullion bound from a Northern Ontario mine to the mint in Ottawa. All the gold has been recovered.

Chaotic Pattern in China Begins To Take Shape

PEKING (Reuters)—The outwardly chaotic pattern of events in China during the last few weeks began to take shape as the country's leaders marshalled swarms of Red Guard street demonstrators into a disciplined force.

At a gigantic rally in the heart of Peking Wednesday the teen-age demonstrators, who have rampaged through Peking to root out "bourgeois tendencies," were ordered to "behave."

"The main target of the attack is those persons in power who have worked their way into the Communist party and are taking the capitalist road."

This statement of a struggle inside the party was made by Defence Minister Lin Biao, who in recent weeks has emerged as

second to China's leader, Mao Tse-tung.

MAO PRESENT

Mao also was at the rally, attended by 500,000 teachers and students from universities and schools throughout China.

Details of the rally came to light only Thursday since foreign correspondents were barred from it. It was opened by Mao's wife Lin Ping, who has emerged from obscurity to play an important part in the new "cultural revolution."

Prime Minister Chou En-lai, now listed third in the hierarchy, said the Red Guards must be built into a highly-organized, disciplined, militant army and become a reliable reserve force of the liberation army.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH

The bidding:
 West North East South
 1♣ 3♦ 4♠ 5♣
 Pass 3♣ Pass 4♣

Opening lead — king of diamonds.

Let's say you're declarer as four spades and West leads the A-K-Q of diamonds. You ruff naturally, start to worry about the possibility of losing a trump trick.

Of course, this can't happen if the trumps are divided 2-1, as they normally would be. But, being a conscientious declarer, you must consider the possible 3-0 division and prepare to cope with it if it exists.

If West has the Q-7-4 of trumps, the winning play would be to cash the king and then finesse after East showed out.

However, if East has the Q-7-4 you should first cash the ace and then finesse.

You have no way of knowing which defense has the three missing spades, but there is nevertheless a right way of tackling the trumps so as to assure the contract. What you should do is lead a low spade towards dummy at trick four.

In the actual case, West immediately shows out, you have no trouble drawing East's trumps without loss. You take a heart finesse later, which loses, but you wind up with ten tricks.

Now let's look at the other side of the coin and assume that after you led a spade to the ace at trick four East showed out. This would be an unfavorable development, of course, but the contract would still be safe regardless of the position of the queen of hearts.

You would continue with a spade to the king, after which you would cash the K-A of clubs and ruff a club. You would then put West on lead with your K-J-5 or else yield a ruff and discard.

The problem at the start is not so much to guess which opponent has the three spades as it is to play the suit so that you make the contract even if you guess wrong.

PRAVDA SEES U.K. REVOLT

MOSCOW (Reuters)—Ultra-short skirts, "pep" pills, and teen-age hoodlums are all part of a deep-down British revolt against the capitalist way of life, says the newspaper Pravda.

The Communist paper defends British teen-agers against "sensational" American magazine and newspaper articles which have said young Britons are frivolous and don't care about politics.

At heart, says Pravda's London correspondent Oleg Orestov, British youngsters are really "good chaps." He says there was nothing basically wrong with short skirts, sloppy clothes, long hair, beads, tight trousers and barefoot girls, even though Russians might think them strange.

Even many British rock 'n'

roll singers were "good chaps," such as Beatle guitarist George Harrison whose criticisms of the Americans in Viet Nam "considerably influenced" thousands of British teen-agers, the paper says.

Pravda says some young Britons are being "crippled physically and spiritually" by "ugly phenomena which are typical of capitalist society."

Often the manifestations were "nothing but the reflection of unconscious protest against the social system under which youth are forced to live; bourgeois society is unable to give them either aim or ideals."

"The growing revolt of youth against the capitalist way of life is seriously worrying the ruling circles."

OTTAWA (CP)—There are 6,134 federal civil servants making \$11,000 a year or more, the government has disclosed in a Commons report for L. R. Sherman (PC—Winnipeg North).

Of these, 2,682 have been added since Jan. 1, 1964, either through creation of new positions or pay increases.

The return shows that the mine department is where the big money is. There are 683 civil servants in that department making \$11,000 or more annually.
