Two Summerside girls and another from York have been adjudged Provincial winners in an essay contest recently conducted by the Canadian Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society. The winner of the first prize of \$50.00 was Miss Rhoda Ann Baker of Summerside, and the second prize of \$25.00 was awarded to Miss Elizabeth Harper also of Summerside. Miss Gloria MacDonald of York was winner of the third prize of \$15.00. Two other entrants received honorable mention. They were: Miss Norma MacFadyen of 323 Fitzroy Street, Charlottetown and Miss Beryl Woodside of Kensington.

The essays of the first prize winners will be judged for a grand prize of \$100.00. The prize money was donated by a friend of the Bible Society who through this method hoped to encourage young people to read and study the scriptures. The competition was open to all young people from 16-17 years of age and the contestants had a choice of two subjects: "Why a knowledge of the Bible is a necessary part of a sound education" and "What the Bible has done for human progress." The Committee which judged the Prince Edward Island essays was composed of: Mr. George Kilnack, teacher of English at a Toronto Collegiate School, Rev. J. H. Hunter, L.L.D., Editor, The Evangelical Christian and Rev. Neil Smith of the Presbyterian Board of Publications. The Provincial Committee which promoted the contest on the Island was headed by Mr. R. 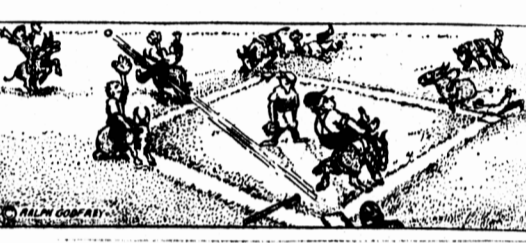

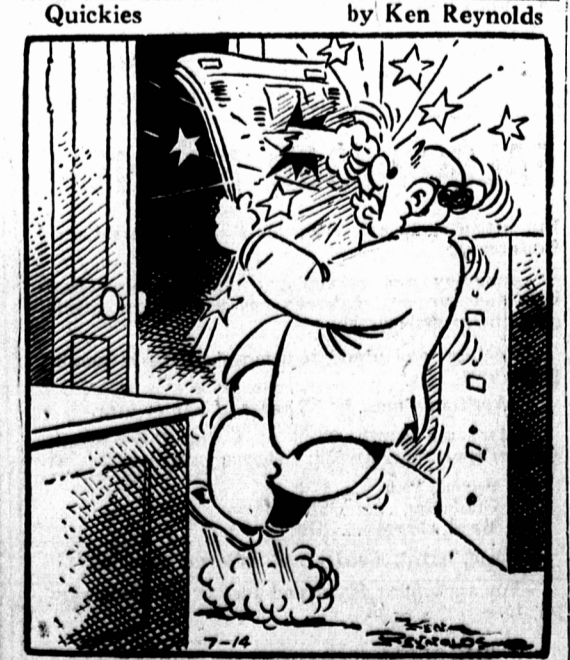
