POLICE COURT.—This morning, John Carroll, Richmond Street, was fined \$100 or three months imprisonment, for a breach of the Liquor Regulation Act, and six o'clock against the same person was dismissed. A summons against James Duffy, Dorchester Street, for a similar offence, was dismissed. Mr. J. J. Johnston appeared as counsel for Carroll, and Duffy was represented by Mr. J. H. Good.

PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.—The schr. CORA Morrison, Bell, master, cleared for Glouce Bay to-day with a cargo consisting of 800 bushels potato's, 1,000 bushels oats, 500 bushels butter, 10 tons hay, shipped by Rittenbury Bros. The schr. Laurier and Sangster also cleared to-day—the former for Boston and the latter for Halifax. The Laurier took 4,250 bushels potatoes, and the Sangster 3,250 bushels potatoes. Both cargoes were shipped by Geo. H. Toombs.

ANOTHER BURGLARY.—The store in connection with the Fish Market on Grafton Street was entered by burglars at an early hour on Sunday morning and some small articles were taken. The tills were searched for money, but they happened to be empty at the time as all the money in them had been removed on Saturday night before closing. An entrance was effected by breaking the glass in the show window. Officer Carter and Watchman Merchant saw two persons loitering in the neighborhood of the Fish Market about one o'clock in the morning, just before the burglary was discovered. They were under the shadow of the men, as they thought they were up to some mischief, but before they had time to close in on them they suddenly disappeared.

A LARGE FUNERAL.—The body of the late Mr. John Kelly, Water Commissioner, was interred in the Roman Catholic cemetery yesterday afternoon. The funeral was one of the largest seen here for years, bearing testimony to the esteem in which Mr. Kelly was held by persons of all classes and creeds. The pall bearers were David Laird, Alexander McKinnon, James Byrne, Charles Lyons, P. F. Doyle and Edward Kelly. Besides the large body of citizens in attendance, the Citizens' Band, police force, firemen and fire board, City Councillors, the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Benevolent Irish Society marched in the order named. The floral decorations on the casket included a Celtic Cross from the Ancient Order of Hibernians. The service at St. Dunstan's Cathedral was conducted by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Rev. F. C. Kelly (son of his deceased), Rev. P. Hogan, Rev. D. B. Reid and Rev. A. McAnlay. The Cathedral was thronged with people during the service.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL.—The annual public meeting of St. Vincent de Paul Society was held in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday at 4 p. m. President Caven occupied the chair. The treasurer and secretary's reports were read, showing the good work done by the society during the past year in relieving the deserving poor of this city. The receipts from all sources amounted to \$534, and expenditure \$540—leaving a small balance of \$6 due the treasurer. The money was expended in provisions and coal and various donations in cash. The Society lately purchased a cargo of coal amounting to 110 tons, to be distributed during the coming winter. A collection taken up amounted to \$19.25. There is also in connection a Ladies' Aid Society, which distributes clothing, etc. As the winter will no doubt be a severe one, we would suggest that anyone wishing to assist the Society can do so by sending their contributions to the Treasurer. The election of officers resulted as follows:—Spiritual Director, Rev. D. B. Reid; President, John Caven; Vice-President, P. McCourt; Treasurer, A. A. Macdonald; Asst. Treasurer, Jas. —The names of ex Councillor Byrne and Mr. Charles Lyons are mentioned in connection with the vacancy on the Board of Water Commissioners. Good men, both.

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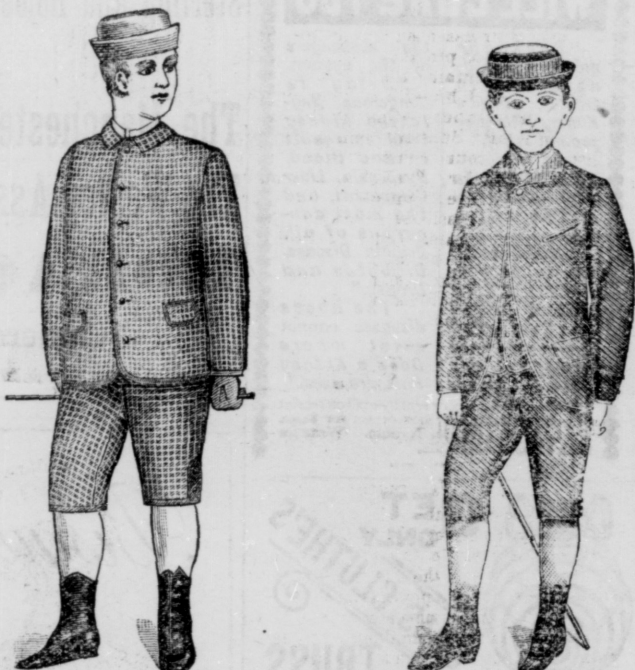
