Plan Intermediate Football At S'side

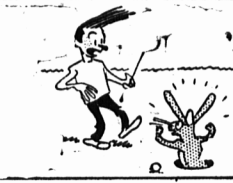

NEW GLASGOW, (CP)—The future of the Maritime Hockey League was still in doubt following a meeting here Sunday.

He said the Halifax executive planned to meet Monday night and following the meeting would give their decision.

The league has given the clubs until Tuesday to make up their minds whether they will enter the league.

Rosen Fails To Capture 3-Way Batting Crown

CLEVELAND, (AP)—Al Rosen's foot missed the first base bag on the last play of the season Sunday.

That kept him from winning the three-way batting crown of the American League—runs batted in, home runs and batting average.

He had the rbi and homer titles in his grasp, but he needed to catch first baseman Mickey Vernon of Washington on the averages.

Vernon ended the season with .3317.

It was the bottom of the ninth, two were out, and it was Rosen's last chance. He had singled in the first, doubles in the third, hit into a force-out in the fifth, and beat out a bunt in the seventh.
