Canoe Cove Notes.

Extensive preparations are being made in
 this neighborhood to prosecute the lobster
 fishing. From fifteen to twenty factories are
 expected to be in full operation along this
 shore in a few weeks, which will give employ-
 ment to hundreds of young men and women
 during the fishing season, and it is hoped that
 this industry will prove more remunerative to
 all concerned, than it did last year.

The farmers are busy preparing their seed,
 grain, etc., for the spring labor.
 The Road Supervisor has made an early
 start this year in looking after the rats.
 What's up? A number of lands and teams
 have been engaged in quarrying and hauling
 stone. Neglected portions of the highway
 will, no doubt, be put in good shape, as con-
 siderable travelling is anticipated during the

 race John McHeron pocketed first money.
 Between his horse and Samuel Butler there
 was a terribly keen scrimmage, much amus-
 ing to the immense crowd.

 Peterson's horse may get a chance, as he
 was too sick to go out on the 25th.

Politics quiet now. However, the indig-

Creamery at Crapaud.

A meeting of the Creamery Company at
 Crapaud was held on Wednesday last,
 and the following directors elected:

 Huwatt, Augustine Cove; Francis Bradley,
 Kelly's Cross; James Iman, Hampton;
 Matthew Smith. The company have a
 building already erected, and will begin
 operations with good prospects of success.

News Notes.

The nickel mines at Riddle's, Southern
 Oregon, have been sold to an English
 syndicate capitalized at \$8,000,000.

The tanners of the New England States
 are organizing a combine with a capital of
 \$50,000,000. The object is to keep the
 leather business in the east.

A Mexico, Mo., dispatch says: George
 Harding (colored) aged 35, convicted of be-
 ing a vagrant, was yesterday sold to a coal
 dealer for \$19 for a period of six months.
 If anything remains of the money after
 paying legal costs it will go to the negro.

It has been decided to petition the
 Ontario and the Dominion Governments
 for \$15,000 each, to be added to a grant by
 the city, as a fund guaranteeing an
 invitation to the British Association to
 meet in Toronto in 1895.

If 7,000 families are camped along the
 Kansas frontier awaiting the throwing open
 of Indian lands, it only goes to prove the
 desirability of Canadians holding their own
 and biding their time. That time must come,
 and the quicker American need for spare
 land develops the sooner our immense
 fertile strips will come into demand.

The California Legislature has passed a
 law to punish the proprietor or publisher
 of any newspaper which misrepresents its
 circulation for the purpose of securing ad-
 vertising or other patronage. If it is en-
 forced some of the most eminent liars in
 the profession will be out of a job. The
 California newspaper that did not claim a
 larger circulation than all rivals combined
 was practically not worth considering.

For a long time the foreign trade alone
 of Britain suffered from depression; the
 domestic trade continued brisk. Now
 home trade is depressed. The railway re-
 turns show this. The gross receipts of the
 23 principal railways of the United King-
 dom for the week ending March 5 amount-
 ed to £1,176,201, compared with £1,317,-
 988, a decrease of £147,787 in the cor-
 responding week of last year. This is no
 special case either.

Now that the athletic craze in colleges
 has run to an extreme, bringing the im-
 portant branch of physical training in
 colleges, in many instances, into disrepute,
 it is gratifying to know that there is to be
 a revival of an old time practice, the public
 discussion of some strong, live topics. Of
 all college centers none are more com-
 mendable than those of this character. A
 good debate yields forth the best mental
 efforts of a young man, and requires that
 he be no mean man physically as well. If
 this plan succeeds, as it undoubtedly will,
 it will most certainly be taken up by the
 other institutions of learning the country
 over, and prove of great value to univer-
 sity men; stimulating them to broad and
 thorough training, and reflecting the real
 purpose and benefit of college life.
