

And a sum of two hundred and fifty pounds towards the erection of a Breakwater at Campbell's Cove, Lot Forty seven, provided a sum equal to two-thirds of the amount granted be subscribed towards the same object by the people.

And a sum of fifty pounds towards the construction of the Saint Peter's Breakwater.

And a sum of one hundred and thirty-one pounds to the following persons, out of the amount voted for Education, in the proportions respectively as hereinafter mentioned, namely :

To Julia Hunt, Saint Eleanor's, a sum of fifteen pounds.

To James FitzGerald, Lot Five, a sum of five pounds.

To Ellen Walsh, Summerside, a sum of fifteen pounds.

To Elizabeth McKinnon, Charlottetown, a sum of eight pounds.

To James Easton, Georgetown, the sum of thirty pounds.

To the Rev. D. B. Parther, towards the support of the Bog School, Charlottetown, a sum of twenty pounds.

To Thomas Mansfield, Lot Ten, a sum of thirteen pounds.

To Robina Richardson, Summerside, a sum of fifteen pounds.

To Archibald McKenzie, Charlottetown Royalty, a sum of ten pounds.

And a sum of sixty-five pounds to the following Postmasters, in addition to their allowances by Statute, to be paid out of the amount voted for that purpose in the proportions respectively hereinafter mentioned :

The Postmaster at Summerside twenty pounds.

The Postmaster at Georgetown ten pounds.

The Postmaster at St. Eleanor's ten pounds.

The Postmaster at Princetown five pounds.

The Postmaster at Cascumpec five pounds.

The Postmaster at Port Hill five pounds.

The Postmaster at Tignish five pounds.

The Postmaster at Souris five pounds.

And a sum of seventy-five pounds to the President of the Legislative Council, and thirty pounds to each of the members of said Council for their attendance during the present Session, together with their travelling expenses as allowed to members of the House of Assembly in coming to and returning from the Legislative Council, the same to be paid out of the amount voted for the contingent expenses of the Legislative Council

And a sum sufficient, out of the amount voted for the contingent expenses of the House of Assembly, to pay the Speaker of the House the sum of seventy-five pounds, and each member of the House thirty pounds, for their attendance during the present Session, together with their travelling charges in coming to and returning from the House of Assembly.

And a sum of seven thousand six hundred and eighty pounds, at the disposal of the Government, to pay the salaries and allowances provided for by Statute.

And, in consequence of the threatened invasion of the British Colonies by bands of Fenian marau-

ders, that a sum sufficient be granted and placed at the disposal of the Government for the purpose of organizing the Militia and Volunteers, and for such other Military purposes as may be deemed expedient for the protection and defence of the Colony.

SIR ;

IN consequence of the prevalence of Cholera in this Country, Her Majesty's Government have considered it necessary to advise the Queen to exercise the power vested in Her Majesty by the 59th Clause of the Passenger Act of 1855, and to cause an Order in Council to be passed, requiring that, from and after the 20th instant, every Passenger Ship to which the said Act extends, carrying more than Fifty Passengers, shall have on board a duly qualified Medical Practitioner.

I have the honor to transmit to you Six Copies of this Order, and to request that you will cause it to be made public within the limits of your Government, and that you will give such further directions as may be requisite for ensuring the due observance of its requirements.

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 9th day of August, 1866.

PRESENT :

The QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY in Council.

WHEREAS by the Passengers' Act, 1855, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for certain purposes in the said Act specified, and, amongst others, for requiring duly qualified medical practitioners to be carried in passenger ships, in cases where they would not be required to be carried under the provisions of the said Act. And such Order in Council from time to time, in like manner, to alter, amend, and revoke as occasion may require :

And whereas from the prevalence of choleraic disease in certain parts of the United Kingdom, it has become expedient that Her Majesty should exercise the discretion and authority so vested in her as aforesaid :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in her by the said Passengers' Act, 1855, doth hereby order as follows, that is to say :

From and after the 20th inst., and so long as this Order shall continue in force, every passenger ship, carrying more than 50 passengers on any voyage to which the said Act extends, shall, whatever be the duration of the voyage, and subject to the provisions of the 42nd section of the said Act, carry a duly qualified medical practitioner, who shall be rated on the ship's articles.

To prevent all doubts in the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered, that the terms "passenger" and "passenger ship," shall have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said Passengers' Act, 1855, and unless inconsistent with the context words of one number shall import both numbers.

And the Right Honorable the Earl of Carnarvon, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
