Miss Mabel O'Brien was re-elected president of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation at the annual meeting of the Board of Governors held in the Prince of Wales College on Friday and Saturday.

Other officers elected were, first vice president, Earle Jelley; second vice president, Elmer Pineau; secretary-treasurer, Miss Mabel Auld; recording secretary, Norman MacLeod; public director, Millar MacFadyen, and general secretary, J. A. S. Williams.

In her report, Miss O'Brien dealt with several matters of importance and good will existing among the members of the Board, the executive and the several committees and spoke of the pleasure of working with them for the good of the Federation.

Miss O'Brien expressed her satisfaction at the splendid success of the Canadian Teachers Federation Convention held in Charlottetown from Aug. 6th-10th. She thanked all those who had contributed to the success of the Convention and paid special tribute to the untiring efforts of the General-Secretary, J. A. S. Williams.

The President thanked the Federation for the privilege that was hers in representing the teachers at the State dinner given in honor of Princess Elizabeth at the Charlottetown on Nov. 9th.

Mr. J. R. Murphy in his report on "Research" stated that an exploratory national research committee met in Ottawa on Nov. 16th and 17th, and that Miss Helen Yeo represented the P.E.I. at this meeting.

It was decided that the Publicity Committee meet with the executive to formulate plans for a provincial educational publicity campaign.

Heavy Exports Of Wood Continued During October

Roughwood continues to dominate the exports by rail from this Province as indicated by the figures for carloads forwarded from Borden to Cape Tormentine for the month of October, released by the Office of the Superintendent, Island Division, Canadian National Railways. A total of 404 carloads were shipped as compared to two in the same month in 1950.

Other notable increases in exports were livestock, fish, meats, oats, turnips, Irish moss, and lumber. Decreases were shown in hides, potatoes, 209 in 1951 as compared to 330 last year, hay and straw, and canned goods.

The number of carloads brought into the Province this year and in 1950 were almost equal, 1432 and 1425 respectively. Increases were bags, (empty), barrels (empty), flour and feed, fertilizer, gas and oil, lumber, gravel, 160 this year compared to 13 in 1950 and tractors. Decreases were in autos, coal, livestock, miscellaneous, cement, and asphalt shingles.

Warn Of Political Corruption Danger

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (CP)—The Roman Catholic cardinals, archbishops and bishops in the United States declared Saturday that "moral corruption" in public life threatens the country with the same decay that befell the Roman Empire.

The churchmen in a statement concluding their three-day annual meeting, roundly condemned the principle that "anything goes" in politics, asserting that an official who profits dishonestly from his post is no better than a common thief.

The bishops' statement said the problems besetting the free world today are much like those which confronted the Roman Empire. "Barbarism" on the outside, refined materialism and moral decay within.

By "barbarism," the churchmen plainly referred to Communism, which they often have condemned in the past. They went on to say, however:

"The Roman Empire disintegrated from within; and moral corruption was the main cause of its decline and disappearance. The same fate will befall us if we do not awaken to the danger which threatens from within our own household."

Wants More Money For U. N. Children's Fund

By Norman Altstetter PARIS, Nov. 18 (CP)—Mrs. Adelaide Sinclair of Ottawa isn't a mercenary type but she wants more money for the United Nations Children's Fund.

Executive assistant to Canada's Deputy Welfare Minister, Mrs. Sinclair has just wound up the annual meeting of the fund's executive committee—of which she was re-elected chairman for a second one-year term. She has been a member of the committee for five years.

"We allocated about \$10,000,000 aid during this meeting," Mrs. Sinclair told a reporter, "and we have only about \$26,000 left until more contributions come in."

The fund's full name is United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund—has received contributions and pledges totalling \$162,000,000 from governments and private organizations since it was formed five years ago. Last year the Canadian Government contributed \$20,000,000 half in cash to be spent for supplies in Canada and the other half in cash—most of it used to supplement children's meals in Yugoslavia.

Mrs. Sinclair, wartime head of Canada's Wrens, now is en route back to Ottawa.

The 26-member board has a world-wide job to oversee with U.N.I.C.E.F. supplies moving in 60 countries. The biggest single donation this year—\$1,871,000—went to Asia.

Magistrate's Court At Summerside

A resident from Borden, one from Kensington, from Wellington and one from Summerside appeared before Magistrate R. S. Hinton in the County Court at Summerside last week-end. All four were charged with receiving stolen goods, namely meat tickets from the R.C.A.F. station. Civilian employees at the air station have the privilege of purchasing meat tickets which upon presentation in the cafeteria entitles them to be served.

It was established that the four men mentioned above had used some of these tickets that had been found to be missing.

The four pleaded guilty and were each given six months suspended sentences, and each was ordered to make restitution for the tickets that he had handled.

A resident of Miscouche convicted on a charge of drunken driving was sentenced to seven days in jail. This conviction carries an automatic suspension of the operator's license for a period of one year.

A resident of Alberton, convicted of having moonshine in his possession, was fined \$25.00 and costs of \$7.65 or one month in jail.

A young man from Alberton, charged under the Highway Act with splashing pedestrians while he was operating a motor vehicle, was fined five dollars and costs of \$3.75, and ordered to pay the costs of dry cleaning the clothing of the persons who were splashed.

A resident of Sea Cow Pond was convicted of operating a motor vehicle without proper braking equipment and was fined five dollars and costs. — S.

Vishinsky May Have Received Reprimand

Did Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinsky of Russia get a sharp slap on the wrist from Moscow? It seems more than likely.

Vishinsky's request for a second-thought "Opening" speech before the United Nations Assembly in Paris obviously was dictated from Moscow, and the chances are its aim was to wipe out a bad taste Vishinsky had left in his original speech a week before.

Pravda's treatment of the original Vishinsky speech strongly suggests this. The official Communist Party newspaper published the text of that original speech — but it left out the paragraph in which Vishinsky pictured himself as doubled over with laughter at the West's proposals for a disarmament plan.

The picture of Vishinsky laughing and laughing at a disarmament proposal is not one which would do him any good in the legend of Moscow as the peace centre of the world.

In November 1949, Vishinsky boasted, before the U. N. that the Soviet Union was using atomic energy to move mountains and change the course of rivers and to transform nature. He was premature. Pravda edited him then, 'too, and so far as the official Soviet records go, he never said it.

Pravda toned him down to say, in the text printed in Moscow, that the Soviet Union intended to use atomic energy to transform nature.

As for Vishinsky's "new" proposal, it's old. He called upon the United States, Britain, France, the Soviet Union and Communist China to reduce armaments by a third during the calendar year following the adoption of the Soviet resolution. This is simply another dress for the Moscow peace offensive keynote: A five-power conference including Red China, which would raise Communist Poling to the level of respectable nations.

Says CNR Purchase Of Truck Lines Will Boost Freight Rates

HARRISON HOT SPRINGS, B. C. — (CP)—Truck operators in convention here yesterday were told that the purchase of independent truck lines by Canada's railways will mean "sky high" rail freight rates.

Protest against railway purchase of truck lines was made by members of the Canadian Automotive Transportation Association.

Executive Secretary, John Magee, speaking to delegates representing 18,000 truck operators, said:

"The goal of higher rail freight rates can be achieved if the railways succeed in buying off independent truck lines and making their extensions of their systems."

He said that truck competition drastically limits the freight rate increases the railways seek from the Board of Transport Commissioners.

"If the people of Canada allow the removal of independent truck competition—they will have only themselves to blame if they get their answer in the form of sky high freight rates," he said.
