

Train Crew Exonerated At Coroner's Inquest

A Coroner's Jury last night found that John Archibald MacRae of Eldon, came to his death on September 12 as a result of injuries sustained in an accident involving truck and train at MacRae's Crossing, Grandview. The jury exonerated completely the train crew of Extra 41, and further recommended that visibility on all railway crossings be at least 250 feet in all directions.

The inquest was held at the City Hall and was presided over by Coroner Dr. L. E. Prowse. Mr. J. P. Nicholson represented the crown. Dr. P. S. MacDonald, Eldon, the first witness stated that when he arrived at the accident scene he found MacRae in critical condition. He had the patient removed to hospital but Mr. MacRae died en route.

Alfred Egan, engineer, stated that he had blown the whistle and rung the bell at the crossing. He had seen the truck coming on the highway at what he thought was a high rate of speed and anticipating a collision immediately applied the

cab and over the engine. He and other members of the train crew went to the damaged truck and found the injured man pinned in the cab. After the arrival of Dr. MacDonald, he said, Mr. MacRae was removed from the cab and sent to the hospital by ambulance.

The witness stated that after passing one clear point of visibility of the road, he was unable to see the truck from the crossing. He stated further that after applying the emergency brakes, the train stopped just after crossing the roadway. "The driver should use more caution," he said. "We have had some close escapes down there all this summer."

Mr. Merrill Murphy, Vernon River, returning to the pit, heard the train as he was passing over the crossing. Another empty truck passed him just after he went over the crossing, he said, with the two trucks raising a considerable cloud of dust. Gathering Data Re Fishermen For Unemployment Insurance

During the last session of the Federal Parliament the Unemployment Insurance Act was amended in order that Canadian fishermen under the Act will become operative as of April 1st, 1957. This means that fishermen who qualify will be able to draw Benefits during the winter months of 1957-1958.

In connection with the plan three Federal Government officials have been visiting the Island for the past few days. They are Messrs. George Kieffer, Assistant Chief Coverage Officer of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, Ottawa; Neil Lewis of the Economic and Marketing Division, Department of Fisheries, Ottawa; and Harry MacGregor, Regional Auditor of the Atlantic Region of the Unemployment Commission, Moncton.

These officials have been obtaining details about particular Island fishing operations, to ascertain how the new scheme will be fitted to the local situation. The officials plan to leave the province today.

It is understood that it is the intention of the Federal Government to bring all fishermen under the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act, whether they are boat owners, working on shares or for wages. It is expected that in most cases that fish buyers will act as employers.

It is also understood that Unemployment insurance benefits will only be paid to fishermen during the winter months, that is from January 1st to approximately April 15th. Under the plan some of the fishermen will qualify for the entire period, but it is possible that others may be eligible for only a portion of these winter months. It depends on the number of Unemployment Insurance contributions each fisherman accumulates during the fishing season.

It is estimated that something over two thousand Island fishermen will be affected by the amended legislation.

Island Delegates Prepare For Conservative Nat. Convention

At the National Convention of the Progressive Conservative Party to be held in Ottawa in December Prince Edward Island will be entitled to at least twenty eight members. Three riding delegates are to be selected from Prince and Kings counties and six from the dual riding of Queens. In addition, four delegates-at-large will be chosen from the province. The four P.E.I. members on the national executive are Mrs. W. H. V. Dunbar, Mr. C. S. Delaney, H. Bennett Carr and J. Angus MacLean, M.P., whose status as a delegate is also assured by virtue of his being a member of the Progressive Conservative parliamentary caucus.
