Chief Delighted With Island Visit

Chief MacKinnon of Clan MacKinnon says farewell to the Island when he leaves for St. Anne's, Cape Breton, to attend the Gaelic Mod which takes place there next week.

Yesterday morning he was taken to the Confederation Chamber by the President of the Caledonian Club, Mr. Blair MacDonald, and was deeply impressed with the history of "The Cradle of Confederation" as it was capably explained by Commissioner Robert Craig.

From every side, another MacKinnon would approach the Chief throughout the day to bid him welcome, and on all occasions he had plenty of time to speak to each one. Perhaps his greatest thrill in coming to Canada was when he landed at Sydney, N. S. He had no sooner stepped from the plane than the skirl of the bagpipes met his ears, and over 800 MacKinnons were on hand to greet him. It was a moving incident to the Chief who had no idea that so many of his own clansmen were located in any one place in this country.

One of the most frequent questions asked the Chief, during his visit on the Island was "Have you the Gaelic?" and many were the looks of disappointment when he was obliged to reply in the negative. The MacKinnon explains that although he spoke the language when a child, he started to Naval College as a lad of 12, went into the Royal Navy as a Midshipman at 16 and from then on was home to his native heath on short leaves, thus giving him little opportunity of retaining his former knowledge of the language. He was surprised at the number of people on the Island who were still able to speak it.

Yesterday afternoon the Chief of the MacKinnons made a call at Government House where he was received by His Honor Lieutenant Governor Prowe. Later he was taken by the Hon. Dougald MacKinnon to Green Gables and the North shore of the Island.

Mr. G. P. Fraser will meet Commander MacKinnon this morning at Wood Islands and will drive him to his home in Bondeck, N. S., which is a short distance from where the Mod will be held.

From Cape Breton Commander MacKinnon will go to New York where he will board a private sailing yacht captained by his nephew, and sail for the United Kingdom.

A recent Minute approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council states in part as follows:

Pilot Unharmed In Jet Crash

NORTH BAY, (OP)-An RCAF pilot parachuted to safety Thursday when his automatic ejector seat catapulted him from a twin-jet CF-100 fighter just before it crashed and burned about 25 miles southwest of here.

P.O. G. W. Hunter, 30, of Hamilton was smiling and removing his parachute when would-be rescuers, Dorothy Mae Dunsmond and Wilma Vandortorpe of Toronto arrived on the scene.

The girls, holidaying in the area, saw the smoke when the 17-ton fighter crashed on the densely wooded shore of Lake Restoule. A farmer's wife told them a plane had crashed.

The two girls and a friend drove the pilot to Powassan, 15 miles south of North Bay. He was later brought back to the RCAF base here.

Two Men Killed In Car Accident

DRUMMONDVILLE, Que. (CP) -Two men were killed and two others seriously injured Thursday when the car in which they were riding went out of control and smashed into a tree near this centre 60 miles east of Montreal.

Dead are Wilbrod Yergeau, 50, of St. Joachim de Couval, driver of the car, and his brother, Urgel, 45, of nearby Marcotte.

In critical condition in hospital were Henri Yergeau, 42, of Drummondville, a brother of the two victims, and Walter Gamelin, 35, of St. Neophore. Both suffered severe head and body injuries.

Police said Wilbrod Yergeau had just bought the car at a Drummondville garage and was returning to St. Joachim when the car suddenly veered to the right and smashed into a tree.

Prospecting And Exploring In Quebec North

MONTREAL, (OP) -Far up in Quebec's northland, in the uninhabited region around Clearwater lake, an enthusiastic party is busy at prospecting, exploration, scientific study and sports.

Clearwater lake, the centre of operations, is about 40 miles long. It is roughly 800 miles north of Montreal 130 miles north of Great Whale river and is due east of Richmond gulf on the eastern side of Hudson Bay.

Some of the members of the party are from the United States, interested in the possibility of iron ore locations. When the expedition returns in a month or six weeks there may be important information for Quebec as a result of the scientific research. There likely also be information about giant lake trout, speckled trout, the Arctic charr and the little-known golden-colored trout.

Members of the party all have prospector's licences and the necessary paraphernalia for staking claims. They have formed themselves into a company, Clearwater Exploration, Ltd., which has been incorporated under provincial charter.

Tom Wheeler of Montreal, president of Wheeler Airlines, Ltd., is chairman. Directors are R. D. Cowen, Alexander T. Wood and Morris Bradley, Cleveland and J. V. Rawson, Paintfield, N.J.

Last year several of the members made a 4,000-mile flight, with several stops, around the perimeter of the vast province.

The nearest neighbors to the Clearwater lake expedition are a band of Eskimos at Richmond gulf, where there is also an Oblate mission. Communication with the outside is through Freddie Woodro, radio operator at Great Whale and Nottingham Island. Most of the party went north
