She gives on an average 40 lb. of milk a day, which yields about 12 lb. of butter a week. The captain has kept careful reckoning and the facts are vouched for.

VANCOUVER, laid in ashes a few days ago, is already showing the instincts of the Phoenix. The "first lesson" of all pioneer towns has been a severe one to Vancouver, but the people are not discouraged, and pluckily made new contracts for rebuilding while yet the debris was warm under foot. Hosts of laborers are clearing away the rubbish. Contracts, amounting to more than half a million dollars are signed, and as prevention is always better than cure, the town with a great future" is being reconstructed with (and by) regular bricks. Fortunately the fire spared the saw mills, and there are two now being worked by their proprietors night and day—they see the city in ashes, they saw the timber to build a new and better town.

The Irish Question.
LORD RANDOLPH CHURCHILL Denounces Gladstone's Scheme.

LONDON, June 21.
Lord Randolph Churchill has issued a manifesto to the electors, in which he says: "The people's dissolution has come upon us. Such is the title given by Gladstone to the most wanton political convulsion that has effected the country in our times, by the aid of an individual elevated to dignity by the people. By the boundless egotism of the Premier the kingdom is to be disunited for the purpose of securing office, if only for a little while, by the aid of a disloyal faction, subsisting upon foreign gold. Mr. Gladstone has reserved for his closing days this great conspiracy against the honor of Great Britain and the welfare of Ireland, a conspiracy which is more base and nefarious than any of those murderous designs and plots that for a quarter of a century have occupied his imagination. No practical responsibility will fall upon his shoulders. He regards with inconceivable frivolity an act that upon his successors will develop the impossible labor of rebuilding the shattered empire. Let the credulous electors give the Premier a majority by the aid of which another Irish revolution may be consummated, and the most moderate of ministers will complacently retire to seek that repose for which nature cries loud, and to whose cries he has so long turned a deaf ear. In concluding he stigmatizes the Bill as insanity, trafficking in treason, exalting disloyalty, abusing loyalty, and a monstrous mixture of imbecility, extravagance, and political hysteric."

Steamer Ashore.
PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 21.
The steamer Miranda, Capt. Benton, of the Red Cross Line, en route for Halifax from New York, went ashore at midnight last night, on Narragansett Sound. The night was clear, the moon shining brightly and the water smooth. Her passengers were safely landed, but her cargo, which is a general one, will likely suffer considerably. If the weather keeps fine the steamer will not be seriously damaged. She now rests in eighteen feet of water, with a depth of nine feet in the hold.
