## Mill By-products Are Now Valuable

BOSTON (AP)—Mill by-products once burned as waste have been developed into a strong market, a Maine lumber manufacturer said Monday.

Philip H. Chadbourne, president of the Bethel, Maine, company bearing his name, told the 25th annual convention of the Northeastern Lumber Manufacturers' Association the use of tree bark slabs and edgings as wood chips is "one of the most promising innovations in recent years."

Chadbourne said the introduction of wood chips and sawdust for roofing shingles has helped lumber men utilize 80 per cent of the tree log volume compared to 50 per cent a few years ago.

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## Expect Policy Statement Today On Power Offer

OTTAWA (CP)—Resources Minister Lesage is scheduled to make a policy statement today in the Commons elaborating on the federal government's offer to assist in power development in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Reports here say the offer, announced in Finance Minister Harris' March 14 budget speech, will involve a federal expenditure of between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000 over a 10-year period.

Mr. Lesage is expected to:

1. Outline in greater detail the federal offer to help the two Atlantic provinces by building steam power plants and power transmission lines in and between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.
2. Announce that Montreal Engineering Ltd., consulting engineers, will make a survey of power needs in the two provinces to determine logical sites for power plants and other works.
3. Table recent correspondence on the offer with Premier Flem-

ming of New Brunswick and perhaps Premier Stanfield of Nova Scotia.

4. Comment on recent requests by Premiers Fleming and Stanfield for generous subventions on Maritime coal so that it can be used economically by any thermal power plants to be built.

After the March 14 budget offer, power officials from the two provinces met in Ottawa with federal government representatives. Mr. Lesage reported to cabinet about two weeks ago on these talks.

On March 26 he informed the Commons that he had received an engineering report from Premier Fleming on further proposed John River basin. He replied by letter the same day.

**ADDITIONAL EXCHANGE**

There was an additional exchange of correspondence last week between Mr. Lesage and the Premier which also is expected to be tabled by the resources minister.

A spokesman in Mr. Lesage's office indicated today's statement will set the stage for actual implementation of a program of assistance.

## Suspend Eight Convent Students

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The 400 convent students had been asked to pledge not to attend the rock 'n' roll performers' appearances last Wednesday.

Not all of the eight suspended for members of this term signed pledges, the mother superior said. There also were other students who didn't sign the pledge but did not attend the shows.

But the students knew that, if they went to the Presley show they would have "to sacrifice attendance at Notre Dame," she said. "This is a private school."

It was possible that the eight could be reconsidered for readmission next fall.

## N. B. Motor Vehicle Act is Amended

FREDERICTON (CP)—The New Brunswick legislature Monday approved amendments to the Motor Vehicle Act and considered a new Motor Carrier Act.

Treasurer Patterson said the only major change in the motor vehicle legislation is a section making it possible for persons owing money to the unperfected judgment fund to pay it by instalments.

Other sections make it illegal to operate a motor vehicle equipped with a television set and to open a door of a vehicle on the side of moving traffic "unless it is reasonably safe to do so."

The new legislation also provides for a penalty to parents if no action is taken after children have been warned by an officer against playing in the street.

Mr. Patterson said the new Motor Carrier Act brought wording of the old act up to date and incorporated regulations on registration with the motor carrier board.

## Comments On

POTATO CONFERENCE

Mr. Shaw stated further that his committee of council have finalized plans for an all-Canada Potato Conference to take place at the Ontario Agricultural College Guelph, for four days August 19th to 22nd. This will follow the pattern set by United States authorities during the past few years and which have been of great value to their industry. The conference program will cover production practices, science, merchandising and marketing and the latest information on the whole industry. It is expected that top men from Canada and the United States will participate and that a large attendance from all parts of Canada will be attracted. A full report of this program will shortly be available.

Mr. Shaw also conferred while in Ottawa with representatives from New Brunswick who were applying for an assistance for their growers of 75 cents per bushel as at June 15th. In view of the fact that federal authorities feel that such a policy should cover all of Canada, a project of this kind presents many difficulties. It is just possible that a starch program may be considered instead.

Mr. Shaw expects to present a full statement on the tariff issue and other phases of extension at a meeting of the Potato Producers Association to be held in the Clover Club, Charlottetown, on Wednesday of this week.

pool and at the beaches was presented in the form of a brief to the Council. Mr. Earl G. MacLeod read the brief and answered the questions of the Councilors.

In the brief it was shown that of a total operating expense for these services the Red Cross paid \$1,460; the Kiwanas \$1,259 and the City \$300. It was stated that the program has increased the debt of the Kiwanas Club to the extent of \$2,000 and has tended to jeopardize the swimming and water safety program of the Red Cross in other parts of the Province.

The brief went on to show that the per capita expenditure for such services in other Maritime Cities was considerably higher than in Charlottetown.

**LOWEST PER CAPITA**

The actual cost with per capita costs in brackets as contained in the brief are as follows: Fredericton \$20,000 (\$1.30); Truro \$15,050 (\$1.45); Woodstock \$10,402 (\$1.45); Moncton \$30,811 (\$1.10); Charlottetown \$2,400 (\$0.15). The Charlottetown figure includes \$2,100 for playgrounds and \$300 for life guard service.

Continuing the brief said, "If this swimming and water safety program as presently being carried on in Charlottetown is to be continued and improved, as a community service, we feel that a more equitable distribution of the costs should be made and that the City should bear a share of the burden."

Coun. Johnstone said he was in favor of giving a grant of \$1,500 to the club to aid them in carrying out their program. He pointed out that in all communities throughout the Province where this program is carried out by the Red Cross that the particular area pays for it. Charlottetown, he said had a great many more children involved in the program and was paying less than a number of the smaller villages or towns.

**MONEY QUESTION**

Mayor Stewart asked Coun. Johnstone whether he had included such an amount in his estimates. The Mayor said it was a case of finding the money. "We might be short \$40,000 that we have estimated as a grant to the City," he added.

Coun. Gaudet felt it would be setting a precedent for the Council to make a grant to a service club. He said it was usually the other way around. He reminded the Kiwanas delegation that the City had given them the concession of running the Dairy Bar at Victoria Park from which a net profit of \$1,600 had been realized last year.

On question of Coun. Gaudet, Mr. MacLeod said the only other income of the Club during the past

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
