The greatest team tag wrestling combinations ever to hit the Maritimes will be seen in action at the Charlottetown Forum tonight, commencing at 8:30.

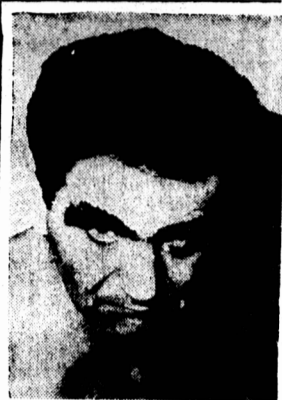

Dodger Scout Plans Schools Here Next Year

Island baseball players and officials will have the opportunity of attending two different baseball schools here next Spring and Summer it was learned here yesterday from Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness.

The shy challenger, who has paid no attention to the hullabaloo which constantly surrounds Sugar Ray, obviously was awed by the reception.

"This is the first time a crowd has bothered to meet me before a fight," he said. "But it does me good. I have never felt better."

Robinson remained the overwhelming 1 to 4 favorite, but manager George Middleton—true to the script of every big fight buildup—disagreed.

"Randy has at least a fifty-fifty chance," Middleton declared, "and can anyone expect more when he's fighting a world champion?"

"We have been told we ought to have waited a year, but Turpin is at his peak and he has won his fights just as easily as Robinson has won his in Europe—and against the same boxers. If I had any doubts, the match would never have been made."

The Turpin camp figures Randy's hopes lie in being able to land a solid punch on Robinson early in the fight.

"He can hit harder than any heavyweight I've ever fought," declared Johnny Williams, a 190-pound Welshman who has been sparring with Turpin.

While the challenger was getting the big hello in town, the champion took it easy in the English countryside at his training quarters opposite historic Windsor Castle.

Robinson slept late, amused himself at the piano during the morning and took a long walk this afternoon.

While here Mr. O'Connor visited Summerside to look over the new recreation centre and confer with officials there, watched the City League Stars-Rovers game at Memorial Field Sunday and conferred with Director of Physical Fitness Bill Reid. As a result of this conference and what Mr. O'Connor saw of Island facilities and players, it was decided that he would return to this Province next April and conduct instructional sessions for umpires and players at Charlottetown and Summerside.

It was also decided that Mr. O'Connor and two of his best instructors would come to the Island in early July next year and run an official Brooklyn Dodgers players school, similar to those formerly held in Halifax.

Brigadier Reid stated yesterday that the announcement of the forthcoming schools is being made now to give Island players a chance to brush up on their playing technique and be prepared for next year when they will have a chance to perform for the big leaguers who are ever on the alert for new talent. Brigadier Reid said there would be no limit on the number of players and officials attending the schools and that all interested are openly invited to attend.

During his stay here the Brooklyn scout was a guest at the Charlottetown Hotel and returned to the mainland by plane yesterday morning destined for Moncton where he will conduct a school there this week.

Garver And Roberts Mound Choices For All-Star Game Today

DETROIT, July 9 (AP)—Casey Stengel today reached into the cellar to pick Ned Garver, sensational St. Louis ace, to start for his favored American Leaguers against the Phillies' Robin Roberts in tomorrow's 18th annual All-Star game.

Roberts, glamor boy of the 1950 National League champions, opted for the National League last year. But it will be the first shot for the 26-year-old Garver from Ney, Ohio.

The youthful righthanders square off in Briggs Stadium at 2:30 p.m. EDT before an assured sellout of \$2,000 fans. Millions more will kibitz by television or radio.

Showers sprinkled Detroit today but the weatherman says it will be cloudy and warm for the big event — part of Detroit's 260th birthday party.

Stengel arrived from Boston where his New York Yankees absorbed three beatings to hear Cleveland was thinking of asking him to go easy on Larry Doby, their star Negro centerfielder who has been bothered by a pulled leg muscle.

"Too late," said Stengel. "He played yesterday, didn't he? Didn't I read he hit a couple of home runs? He can run. He'll play."

Yogi Berra will play nine innings here. He and Ted Williams are going to go all the way.

Stengel said Eddie Lopat, Yankee lefty, probably would be the second pitcher.

"I figure those young guys should be in there at the start," he said. "We can use the older fellows later. I'll probably be Bob Lemon (Cleveland) or Freddie Hutchinson (Detroit) the last three."

However, all eight National League pitchers worked Saturday or Sunday. He hadn't much choice when Brooklyn used two all-stars, Preacher Roe and Don Newcombe, on relief yesterday.

The eight stars picked by vote of more than 4,000,000 fans have to play at least the first three innings. No pitcher can go more than three unless it is another extra-inning game, like last year's 14-inning thriller won for the Nationals by Red Schoendienst's home run.

The managers pick the pitchers and other men to make up the 25-man squad. Here's the way they'll bat tomorrow:

Mel Parnell of Boston (10-5), Bobby Shantz of the A's (7-6) and righthanders Connie Marrero of Washington (6-4) and Randy Gumpert of the White Sox (7-2).

Sawyer has two southpaws to throw against the American's lefthanded power like Williams, Wertz and Berra and later Doby and Eddie Robinson of the White Sox. Preacher Roe (12-1) of Brooklyn's league-leaders and Warren Spahn (8-8) of Boston are the lefties. He also has Newcome (12-4), lanky Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati (8-7), Larry Jansen (11-7) and Sal Maglie (12-4) of the Giants and Dutch Leonard (6-3) of Chicago who was the American league winner back in 1943.

The American league is a 7-to-3 favorite, on the strength of 12-3 edge in previous games.

If the game should be rained out it will be played Wednesday at 11 a.m. and if it still threatens it will be pushed back later and later even if it means playing Wednesday night.
