GENERAL ORDER.

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

THE following DRESS REGULATIONS are published for the information of the Militia:

UNIFORMS OF THE MILITIA;

The Uniforms of the Militia will be Blue with Red facings, as per sealed pattern, to be seen at the office of the Inspecting Field Officer of Militia.

The Mounted Rifles and Militia Artillery will be uniformed according to the pattern sanctioned for those branches of the service.

Officers now Commissioned, and those recently appointed, will provide themselves with the undress uniform of their rank. The furnishing of the full dress is optional until further orders.

FULL DRESS UNIFORM.

The full dress uniform of Officers of the General Militia, will be blue with red facings, the same as that laid down for Officers of the Royal Artillery, with the following alterations:

Silver Lace to be substituted for Gold.

A Pouch and Belt will be worn over the left shoulder; the Belt to be of black leather, two inches and a half wide.

The Pouch of black Patent leather of the ordinary size, bearing the device, a Bugle surmounted by a Crown.

The Cap to be of Blue Cloth of the same pattern as that laid down for Officers of Infantry of the line, bearing the silver Bugle and Crown on scarlet ground and scarlet tuft.

The Sword Belt black, with Snake clasp.

Officers already provided with full dress uniforms, will not be required to change them.

UNDRESS UNIFORM.

The undress uniform of Officers will be a blue Serge or Cloth Tunic, single breasted, rounded in front, to hang loose to about 8 inches below the waist, with 7 plated buttons at equal intervals in front, with 7 rows of black braid as per pattern, the collar to be of scarlet cloth, 1 inch wide, fastening in front with two hooks.

The Cuffs to be of the same material and color, pointed in front, 5 inches in height, surmounted by a Russian Knot of black Braid; shoulder cords of black braid.

Field Officers to wear the badges of their rank on the collar.

The Pouch and Belt to be worn on the left shoulder, under the Shoulder Cord.

Sword Belts to be worn underneath the undress Tunic.

The Trousers to be of blue Serge or Cloth with red Piping down the outer seam.

The Forage Cap to be the Blue Glengarry with Silver Bugle and Crown.

When parading with their Companies, Officers will in variably wear the undress uniform.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council was this day pleased to fix and determine the rate at which the amount of the Invoice of Dutiable Goods imported into this Island from the United States of America, shall, in estimating the duties payable thereon, be reduced into current money of the Island, as follows:—

In all cases where such Invoices shall be made out in Dollars and Cents of the paper currency of the United States, the amount of such Invoice shall be reduced into current money of this Island by allowing for each Dollar the sum of FOUR SHILLINGS, and in the like proportion for any fraction of a Dollar; of which all Collectors of Impost are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
