TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Another Fisherman Captured.

HALIFAX, Sept. 10. Last March the Gloucester fishing schr. Everett Steele, Capt. Forbes, put into Shelburne harbor, where she remained for about three hours, and then proceeded on her voyage to the Banks without reporting at the Custom House. Like several other American vessels, she foolishly boasted how easy it was to hoodwink Canadian customs officials and commanders of the cruisers. To-day the Everett Steele put into Shelburne harbor. Capt. Quigley has long had the Steele on his "little list," and hardly had she dropped anchor before the Canadian tar pounced down and seized her, putting an armed guard on board pending instructions from Ottawa.

Demanding a Refund.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10. Mr. Phelan, United States Consul at Halifax, has demanded that the Dominion Government shall refund all fines imposed on the United States fishing vessels for allowing seamen to land. He says there is nothing in the customs laws, or treaty of 1818 to prevent seamen landing from fishing vessels to visit friends or for any other purpose, and that vessels entering the harbor where such was the object, were obliged to report to the Custom House. The government are considering the justice of the Consul's demand.

Russia and England.

S. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10. The Novoe Vremja says:—"Of all the signers of the Berlin treaty, England alone appears inclined to oppose Russia's Bulgarian policy. Russia must know whether England's intention is serious, in order to prepare herself to take measures accordingly, as Russia will not be brought to a standstill by England's veto."

Attempted Murder and Suicide.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10. Mrs. Frank Comer, a widow 25 years old, made a desperate and perhaps successful attempt to-day to kill her two children and herself. She gave them a dose of corrosive sublimate and drank some herself. The woman is dead but the children may recover. The woman was poor and dependent.

An Unconditional Surrender.

HALIFAX, Sept. 10. The Dominion Government to-day forwarded to the British Ministry at Washington a statement of the Canadian case and a demand for the immediate and unconditional surrender of the vessels seized in Behring Strait's seal fisheries.

St. Petersburg Surprised.

LONDON, Sept. 10. Surprise is expressed in St. Petersburg at the statement in Prince Alexander's proclamation that the Czar had promised to respect the independent liberty of Bulgaria. Such a promise, it is declared, was not made by the Czar.

A Man Missing.

HALIFAX, Sept. 10. One of the stewards of the Red Star Line steamer Miranda, from New York for St. John's, Nfld., is reported to have been missed just before reaching the latter port, and is supposed to have jumped or fallen overboard.

More False Pretences.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10. M. J. Shenan, general merchant of Yarmouth, N. S., who failed with liabilities of \$30,000, will be brought before the court here by Montreal merchants for obtaining \$25,000 worth of goods under false pretences.

Massacring the Christians.

PARIS, Sept. 10. A telegram from the bishop of Tonquin says that 700 Christians have been massacred and 40 villages burned in the province of Menhoa and that 9,000-Christians perished of hunger.

Prince Alexander's Movements.

DAERMSTADT, Sept. 10. Prince Alexander has arrived here. He was received by the Secretary of the English Legation and Burgomaster, and at once proceeded to Jugentriem, his father's residence.

The Winter Service.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10. Dr. Jenkins M. P. for Charlottetown, is here and says arrangements have been made whereby the steamer Alert, with the steamer Northern Light, will be employed in the winter service between P. E. Island and the mainland.

A Murderer Surrenders.

PORT HOOD, Sept. 10. McDonald, who stabbed young McLellan to death, has surrendered himself to the police. The murder was committed during a drunken frolic.

To the North Pole.

TORONTO, Sept. 10. A Winnipeg special says that Col. Glider, of New York, and his companion Griffith, started last night on their way to the North Pole.

Another Colliery Explosion.

LONDON, Sept. 10. An explosion occurred in a colliery near Bristol to-day. Seven persons were killed and ten injured.
