Course in Navigation Planned By Institute

The Provincial Vocational Institute will sponsor a navigation course which will get underway Jan. 13, 1964, and at least 30 people including federal fisheries personnel have enrolled so far. It was learned from J.H. MacLellan, the course will be held in the new Provincial Vocational Institute, the federal department of education in co-operation with the federal department of labor. Due to the success of a last year's course in which out of a total of 21 students taking the examinations 19 received their certificates, this year's curriculum is to be extended to be in three parts beginning with a three week course designed specifically for fishermen and others who wish to be examined for a Temporary Certificate as Master operating in specified local areas. Allowing them to provide safe and efficient facilities for the many tourists who wish to enjoy our coastal waters in Centennial Year. This three-week course is to be initially conducted in conjunc-

tion with the first part of the Section to be followed by a final six-week section dealing with the more advanced Navigation and associated subjects required by the Canada Department of Transport Syllabus, leading to the mathematics section necessary to gain practical experience in terrestrial and celestial observations. The instructor in charge will be Captain John B. Palmer, Staff Officer University Naval Training Division attached to HMCS Queen Charlotte also employed with the CNR ferry services.

Sales Run By Organizations Closely Watched By RMA

The sale of seasonal items during the Christmas season by fraternal and charitable organizations is being observed with interest bordering on concern by the Retail Merchants Association of P.E.I. It was learned yesterday.

He said if the practice grows to "unreasonable proportions" the RMA would consider some sort of action.

The selling of these seasonal items has not reached serious proportions as yet," said a spokesman for the Retail Merchants Association of P.E.I. in Moncton, a letter signed by the association's organization manager, J.C. Kyle, was sent to City Comptroller asking that a by-law be passed controlling such sales.

"This could, if permitted to continue unabated, render a retailer incapable of remaining in business with the redundant loss of tax revenues to the city," Mr. Kyle said. "It is a fact that 'sales made this way bear no responsibility for guarantee or return to the citizen consumer on the part of those engaged in the selling. The retailer normally does bear this responsibility and fulfill his obligations in order to stay in business."

CONTRACT AWARDED

On Monday evening, the Charlottetown City Council passed a resolution awarding the contract for twice weekly garbage collection in the city to Bennett Jenkins, Winslow, and J. David Clarke, Charlottetown.

The chairman of the Parkdale village commissioners, Alex MacLellan, could not be reached yesterday for comment on Parkdale's plans for garbage collection. It was stated at the City Council meeting that villages in the metropolitan Charlottetown area including Parkdale, Sherwood, and probably Southport and Bunbury, would have access to the incinerator if some financial agreement could be reached with the city.
