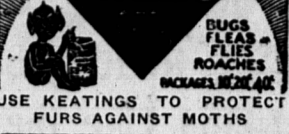

**WOOL MARKET REPORT**

June 8th, 1922

Country buying of wools direct from farmers continues with increased activity. American buyers are reported in Western Canada competing with Canadian buyers. It is reported that contracting offers of 19c, and 20c, are being made for some of the best Alberta clips. In Ontario and Quebec, the general prices offered direct to farmers are 12c. for coarse, 15c. for Medium and 17c. for Fine; about 15c being the best price quoted flat basis. General shortage of wool in the United States is expected to cause further advances in American prices in which case same will in all probability reflect immediately on Canadian prices.

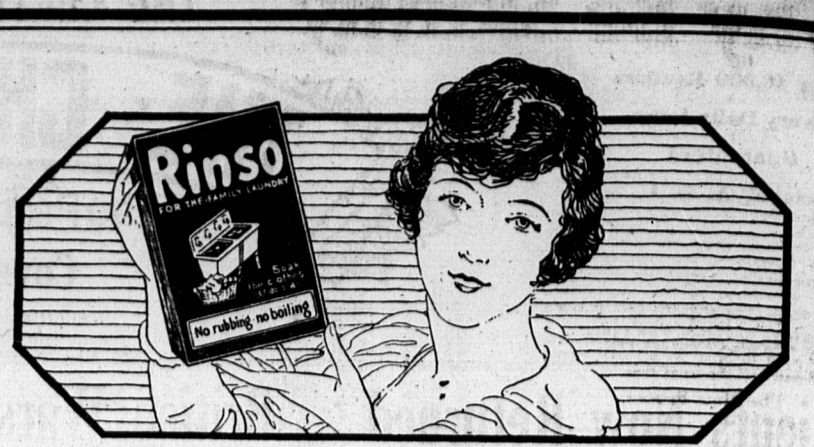
