## Program Organizing Nearly Completed

It was stated at a recent meeting that the work of organizing the P.E.I. Centennial Program and integrating this program in the broader national centennial program has very nearly been completed. The statement was made by Donald D. Ross, director of planning for the 1967 P.E.I. Centennial Commission.

Mr. Ross said that communities throughout the province have named chairmen and planning of the 1967 centennial observance on a community level is well underway. Mr. Ross said "The co-operation and the state of readiness throughout the province is remarkable".

He was reporting to a meeting of the P.E.I. Centennial Commission held recently in the Council Chamber of the Provincial Administrative Building under the chairmanship of the Hon. T. Earle Hickey, provincial treasurer and provincial secretary.

### CANADA FESTIVAL

Ronald E. Irving, chairman of the performing arts committee of the commission, reported on plans for the Canada Festival, which he said would be the greatest undertaking of its kind ever organized in North America.

The Canada Festival, he said would be a year long, coast to coast program providing the finest artistic presentations by Canada's professional performers. He also reported on centennial plans of the P.E.I. Musical Festival Association and suggestions re a high school drama festival.

Malcolm MacKenzie, chairman of the Youth Travel Program reported that this portion of the national program was extremely successful. He reported on activities in this program this past summer and outlined plans for 1967.

David Boswell, chairman of the Centennial School Athletic Committee, reported that Ottawa

had developed a four-part athletic program in which 6,000,000 children were expected to participate. He also noted that approximately 200 athletes from P.E.I. would take part in the First Canadian Winter Games in Quebec City in February.

Wendell MacKay, chairman of the Community Improvement and Rural Beautification committee, told of the national program planned for 1967 when it is anticipated that the ground work will be laid for a nation wide beautification plan.

Rev. Francis Bolger, who with co-chairman Rev. Henry Tye of the church activities committee, outlined plans of his committee reporting on inter-faith religious services being planned, a Centennial hymn, a religious proclamation and special New Years, Dominion Day and Thanksgiving services.

Malcolm MacKenzie reported that each school child would be receiving a Centennial medalion in 1967 and J. Frank Gaudet co-ordinator of the Centennial tree-planting program said that this program begun in 1965 would be stepped up in 1967.

Major Orin Simons, of the committee of arrangements that were being made regarding the Centennial train and caravan stops in this province.

G. Lorne Monkley, executive officer of the commission and chairman of the Centennial Plan Capita Grants Committee noted that 20 projects under this plan had been approved for this province.

H. Barry Bugden gave the report of the Visual Arts Committee noting that showings of original painting, sculpture, handicrafts and photography were being planned for 1967. Jack MacAndrew reported on plans for the Centennial Helicopter Visit.

### OTHER ACTIVITIES

Mrs. Frank Ross outlined extensive plans for the participation of school children in the Centennial Year activities and reports were also given on the Armed Forces Tattoo involving 350 personnel which would visit here and the visit of the RCAF's Golden Centennarians (Flying Hawks) planned for next June. Mr. Ross told members that

at 7.30 p.m. on New Year's Eve, the Centennial Flame, a visual symbol of the Spirit of Confederation, which will be situated adjacent to the Provincial Legislative Building will be lighted in an appropriate ceremony. At 11.55 p.m. the same night, Mr. Ross said, bells, whistles, carillons, chimes etc. will sound to mark the opening of Canada's 100th birthday and from that time until the closing out ceremonies it looks like the biggest year in Prince Edward Island's history for residents and visitors alike.

## Assessment Is Being Conducted

An assessment is being conducted with a view to ensuring that sufficient competent Commissioners for taking knowledge of deeds are available to the public throughout the various areas of the province.

The announcement was made by the Attorney General's Department.

Lists showing name, address and date of appointment for the past 30 years will be forwarded to the Registrar of Deeds offices in Summerside and Charlottetown during the next few days. It is requested that the Attorney General's Department be advised of any particular Commissioner who may have left the Province, died, or if non-active for any other reason.

This procedure will then permit an evaluation to be made with a view to determining which areas of the Province may need new appointments. The same assessment is also being done with appointments of Justices of the Peace.

## Premier Announces Representations

Representations have been made to the Federal Minister of Public Works to place immediate priority on the construction of an interchange at Albany it was announced yesterday morning by Premier Alex Campbell.

The present junction of the

All-weather Highway from the West, with the Trans-Canada Highway and the road to Albany, presents a very dangerous intersection, and with the anticipated additional traffic during the construction of the Causeway, it was deemed necessary to recommend the construction of the Albany Interchange as soon as possible.

The new interchange at Albany would also provide for the additional Highway leading from the Causeway.

The Premier and Hon. T. Earle Hickey have stated their satisfaction that the Highway leading through the Summerside Industrial Park has now been paved and that work is commencing this morning on major reconstruction of the Read's Corner intersection, and that improved intersection facilities on the Sherbrook Road at the intersection of Granville and Central Streets are also underway.

Four witnesses appeared for the crown and the case was then adjourned until November 1, when two other crown witnesses will be heard.

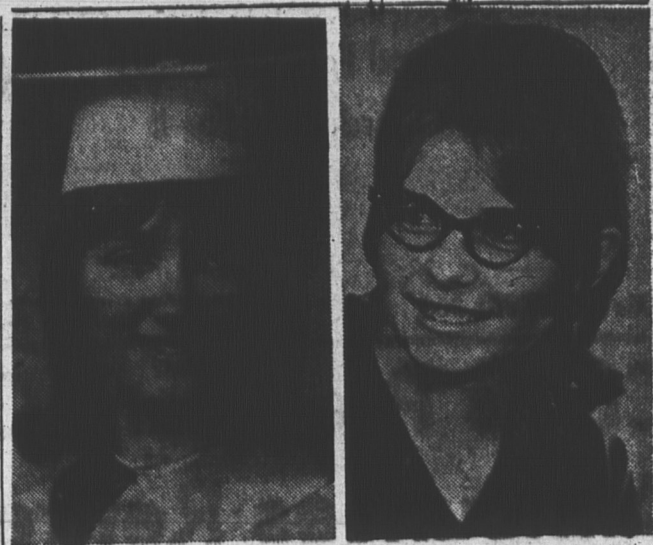

## Opposition Leader Shaw Expresses Keen Pleasure

Hon. W.R. Shaw, leader of the opposition, expressed his keen pleasure yesterday on the action of the government in going forward with the construction of a senior citizens home for special care in Montague.

"The whole program of senior citizens homes, and homes for special care, was one of the first pieces of work initiated by the Conservative government," stated Mr. Shaw.

"Summeret Manor was the first special care home constructed in the province and this unit demonstrates the great value and service of this type of institution.

"Prompt action was immediately taken to locate similar units at Montague and Alberton. Land was purchased at both cen-

ters and the site at Montague close to the senior citizens' home was approved by Central Mortgage and representatives from Halifax. "The plans were also fully completed and on the same basis followed at Summeret Manor."

### PROMPT ACTION

Mr. Shaw went on to say "the prompt action of the government in accepting the works, so well advanced by the previous administration is the type of co-operation in meeting an urgent need that I deeply appreciate, and I trust we may have more of a spirit of acceptance of each government's programs as served the best interests of our people."

"Having furthered the program at Montague, I sincerely trust the government may give

prompt and favorable consideration to the construction of a home for special care at Alberton.

"Here again," stated the opposition leader, "plans were fully completed for the building of this unit. The property was purchased and approved, the plans were a great with, and everything was prepared for prompt action."

"The need in the Alberton area is even greater than at Montague and from a much larger population in the Alberton district, the demand for special care is of much greater urgency."

Mr. Shaw stated: "I strongly urge the government to take immediate action toward the construction of a senior citizens'
