Mr. R. W. Manning, Commission accountant, suggested the possibility of the rates being increased to a point where consumption declined, in which case rural users of electric power would have to pay more. Mr. L. Hacker, Summerside Town plant engineer, said that the new rates would apply to all users outside the Town excepting three other companies to whom the plant sells electricity.

Higher Returns Possible. Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, manager of the Maritime Electric Company, suggested that it was possible the proposed schedule of rates would produce a much higher income than the brief anticipates. This is possible, he said, because it was worked out on the basis of average use while one consumer might use 550 kilowatt hours and another only 50. Mr. T. Earle Hickey, accountant appearing for Summerside, agreed that perhaps a better "run-down" of the returns might be made.

Mr. Ainsworth agreed with the figure of approximately 30 percent line loss and said this compared closely with the figures of his own company here and other companies in New Brunswick. In this connection he noted that the Town plant differed from the company here in that it serves more villages and fewer farms.

Mr. Allison Proffitt, Freetown, said he found himself in an awkward position from having attended to oppose the rate increase only to find that the Town was planning serious consideration of the rural problems. He told of getting the power line started in his village and how the funds were raised. He had understood from the Mayor of Summerside that the rates applicable in the Town would apply to rural users with the advantage of a small charge for meter reading. He said some of the residents in his area had paid between \$150 and \$350 for the service and some had personally supplied the labor necessary to haul the poles and install them.

He said he did not intend to oppose the new rates as he would leave that to the Commission, but he wondered if possibly there might be some inefficiency in operation.

Labor Expenses. Mr. Frank Jardine, Wilmot, said the residents of his district had also hauled poles and dug holes. He understood that in some districts where this was done the residents were paid for their labor. Mr. Sidney Enman, Enmore, stated people in his district wanted electricity but the area was one where there would be fewer than the required six users per mile. For this reason he asked the
