

## Photo Club: Profit or Loss?

Budget discussions highlighted last Sunday's Council Meeting.

A decision on the proposed Photo Club budget was postponed until the next Student Council meeting in order to give Larry Green, this year's President, a chance to study budgets from other Atlantic Universities and possibly revise ours. The budget presented totalled \$1618.95 and included the purchase of three new cameras at an estimated cost of \$400.00.

Green justified these purchases by saying that the cameras were necessary to use for instruction. This resulted in a discussion of whether or not the Photo Club should be used for instruction or as a number of misguided councillors believe merely a club for those who already have cameras and know how to use them.

It was also proposed that the Photo Club be given a minimal budget and the pictures for

the Cadre, the Yearbook and other Student Union needs be purchased from individual members rather than supplied free of charge as is now the case.

A motion was passed allotting the club \$100.00 in order to purchase film to cover events until a final decision could be reached.

The Student Directory should be into the printers this week and delivered to us by next week reported Elisabeth Burke, Communications Officer, at Sunday

night's Council Meeting.

The directory which was promised last semester will list the local address and phone number of all full time students at UPEI.

Burke also reported that the 1975/76 Yearbook is near completion and will be sent to the printers shortly. It is expected to be back by the end of March.

## Preview: Winter Carnival '77

There will be a meeting for anyone interested in working on the Carnival Committee on Fri., Jan. 21, 3 p.m., in the basement of Memorial. The meeting called for Jan. 16 was cancelled due to the storm. A meeting was held on the following day, but due to it being poorly advertised, not as many people showed up as we had hoped. There were about a dozen people present and the Carnival Executive discussed the plans they had already drawn up and asked for any new ideas.

The executive is happy to report that a lot of progress has already been made on Winter Carnival.

We have looked into buying Carnival buttons, beer mugs and T-shirts. We will be able to report by next week if we decide to order any. If we do the price range will be about 40-50¢ for the buttons; \$1.20-\$1.30 for the beer mugs; and \$3-\$4 for the T-shirts. If we decide to order any or all of the above, each one will have this year's Carnival theme and design.

The executive has also booked the gym for the afternoon pubs and beer bashes, and the Confed. Centre for the Carnival Ball, although no contracts have been signed yet.

We have also applied to the Liquor Control Commission for licences for each event. Al-

though we have not yet received word, we are hopeful that by next week we will have their O.K.

Dates and major events that have been decided on by the Committee are the following:

Wed., Feb. 9; Hockey game 7 p.m. against U. de Moncton followed by a pub in the Barn.

Thurs., Feb. 10 starts with a pub in the barn from 2-4 and a Beer Bash in the gym from 8:30-1:00, featuring "Grey Owl", followed by a suicide skate from 1 a.m.-3 a.m. in the rink.

Friday's pub in the gym from 2-4:30 will feature a Fashion Show, Chugging Contests, etc., "State of Mind" in the gym from 8:30-1 a.m., followed by "midnight to dawn" movies, hopefully (we're still working on this).

Saturday starts with a Car Rally from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., a pub in the barn and "Standing Room Only" playing at the Carnival Ball at the Confed. Centre.

Sunday, Feb. 13, has both the male and female basketball panthers playing in the afternoon, Interfaith Services and movies in Duffy.

We have many other events planned but time and dates haven't been decided yet. Some of these are ice sports in the rink, push ball and football on MacAdam field, scavenger hunt, Deathrace '77 (bar crawl), tournaments (chess, crib, checkers, bridge, etc.), chugging

contests, raffle of Carnival passes, American Graffiti night in the cafeteria, tug-of-war on ice, etc.

We hope that anyone interested will show up at the meeting on Friday at 3:00 in the S.U. Office and present any ideas they might have. The Carnival Executive has also approached the Faculty Association and requested that no mid-term exams be scheduled between Feb. 8 and 16, thus freeing many people of excess cramming.

We have also approached Student Services and Bernadine Residence Committee and requested an extension of open-hours for Carnival Week (hope to know by next Cadre).

Certain members of the Athletic Association have also been approached to see if the Moncton hockey game might possibly be held in our Campus Rink, instead of the Forum downtown. The Committee feels that this would be a great way to start Carnival Week.
