

**Local and Other Items.**

**THE GOVERNORSHIPS**—Sir Robert Hodgson's term is up this evening, 4th July. The name of his successor is not yet announced.

**THE body of the unfortunate boy**—Brown—who was accidentally drowned at the North River on Wednesday, was recovered yesterday evening.

ALFRED HOENE and his oldest son, William, appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate, this forenoon, charged with stealing a wheelbarrow, a quantity of flour and several other articles from Mr. H. Palmer's burned premises. The larceny of the wheelbarrow was clearly proven against William, and he was sentenced to six months imprisonment, with hard labor. Alfred, his father, was acquitted.

THE steamer "Worcester" sailed for Boston on Thursday evening, with a cargo consisting of 1,367 boxes, 262 bags potatoes, 477 cases and 16 barrels eggs, 6 barrels calfskins, 405 hides and 80 barrels alewives, valued at \$9,207. Sales were lively at the following prices: Beef, (small) per lb., from 6 to 12 cents; do., per qr., from 5 to 8 cents; mutton, from 5 to 10 cents; veal, from 3 to 8 cents per lb.; lamb, per lb., from 5 to 10 cents; butter (fresh) 14 to 16 cents; do. (tub) from 12 to 13 cents per lb.; chickens, from 35 to 40 cents; potatoes, from 32 to 33 cents; oats, from 34 to 36 cents; eggs, from 9 to 11 cents per doz.; hay, from 35 to 40 cents; strawberries (per qt.) 8 to 11 cents.

DOMINION DAY was a gala day in Rustico. At an early hour flags were to be seen floating in the breeze. By 10 o'clock a large number of ladies and gentlemen had arrived at Oyster Bed Bridge, determined upon enjoying themselves. A straight course of 175 yards was measured off upon the Bridge, and a barrel filled with sand set at each end of the course which the walkers had to round—five rounds or laps making a mile. Six competitors having entered, made a start at 10.20 to walk for four hours. The day was everything that could be desired. At 2.20 the score was as follows:—

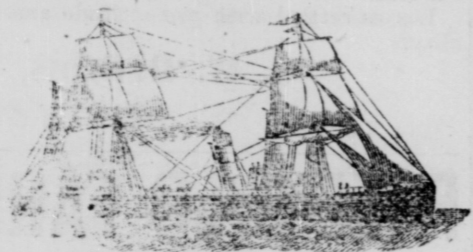
