

# Rex Layne Makes Bid For Heavyweight Honors Against Walcott Tonight

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 — (AP) — Rex Layne, a stout-hearted 22-year-old from Utah, will attempt to vault himself into the heavyweight contention tomorrow night when he tangles with crafty, 36-year-old Jersey Joe Walcott at Madison Square Garden.

On the surface, it looks like the mismatch of the year. But the stocky, army veteran's calm approach to this scrap, the most important of his career, has knocked the price down from 10 to 1 to 4 to 1 and by fight time, it may be 3 to 1.

Walcott, seeking a fourth crack at the world title, appears to be too smart, experienced and too hard a puncher for Layne who has been fighting for only since May of '49. In that time, the handsome, curly-haired westerner has lost but once in 28 fights. He avenged that defeat to Dave Willard and has scored victories over the best heavyweights on the west coast, including Joe Kahut, Grant Butcher and Turkey Thompson. He has 19 knockouts to his credit. In his last two fights he drew with Dale Hall and Andy Walker. He blames lack of condition for the deadlocks.

"I'm ready for Walcott, and I think I can beat him," said the confident youngster.

Most experts who have watched him work, do not believe his style is made to order for the veteran Camman, N. J., boxing master. Others, however, believe Walcott is ready to be taken. They point to Walcott's age and his 20 years of fighting.

## Mousey Dowling To Play With Hawks; Richardson Released

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 23 — (CP) — The hockey trail led back to Moncton today for Maurice (Mousey) Dowling of Charlottetown. Dowling arrived in Moncton today and tomorrow night will line up with the Hawks in a Maritime Senior Hockey League game.

Hawks club officials also announced tonight the release of centreman Murray (Muzz) Richardson of Barrie, Ont., who came to the club several weeks ago from Charlottetown Islanders.

Dowling will be one of three new players lining up with the Hawks tomorrow night. Jim Nickel of Winnipeg, formerly with Glace Bay miners of the Cape Breton League, and Gordon (Butter) Duggan, Halifax, formerly with St. Mary's will also be in the lineup.

## Charlottetown Kennel Club Annual Meeting

Mr. Freeman Eddy was elected as president and Mr. Charles Scranton vice-president of the Charlottetown Kennel Club at their annual meeting and dinner held at the Queen Hotel last evening, presided over by the retiring president, Mr. W. H. Beaton.

The meeting was a highly enthusiastic one with some sixty members of the Club in attendance.

Three new directors, to hold office for a term of three years, were also elected as follows: Mrs. William Beaton and Messrs. Charles Scranton and Sydney Green, Jr. Other standing directors of the Club are as follows: Two year terms, Freeman Eddy, Neil MacLean and W. H. Beaton; one year term, Mrs. J. O. C. Campbell, Art Hogan and Wally Rodd.

In his opening remarks, Chairman Beaton pointed out that one of the reasons that a dinner meeting was held this year was to encourage more people to come and take an interest in Club activities and that it was the intention of the Club to strive for increased membership in the coming year. He stated that it was encouraging to see such a large turnout and hoped all would take an active interest.

### Reports Given

Following the Chairman's remarks, reports were heard from the secretary, Mrs. J. O. C. Campbell, Dr. Gilbert Houston, who headed this year's Field Dog Trials, and Mrs. William Beaton, Field Trials secretary.

Mr. F. A. S. Jones also gave an interesting account of the field trials themselves and called attention to the outstanding achievement of Mr. Ollie Harper in carrying off two leading awards with his Pointer entries against stiff outside competition. He also spoke of the fine work done by the judges during those trials and made special mention of Mr. Dinty Moore, who had to be relieved of his post due to ill health during the trials. Mr. Jones also commended the fine job that Dr. Houston made of heading the Trials committee and of the valuable assistance and co-operation of Mr. Freeman Eddy in aiding Dr. Houston in that capacity.

### Propose Spring Dog Show

One of the chief proposals of the meeting was the suggestion of holding a Bench Show in the Spring of next year, and after wide discussion on the matter a motion was adopted "to hold a Spring Dog Show if it is at all possible." It will be the duty of the new executive to look into the matter and report their findings.

A number of views were expressed on the matter and it was proposed by Mrs. Beaton that consideration should be given to having one of the local Service Clubs sponsor the show. She stated that it had been carried out successfully at Halifax and thought it might be tried here. Other speakers on the subject were Messrs. B. Graham Rogers, Charles Scranton and Dr. Houston, who all expressed their belief that with increased membership and interest they should be able to sponsor the show and were not in favour of it.

But it was left to two Island defences to really turn it on in the way of effective play. George McLagan and Johnny Digchak were the pick of the night. Proving a tower of strength on the defensive the two husky rear-guarders were worth their weight in gold. Checking and clearing well persistently, both boys kept their forward sections humping all night with well directed passes. Following up on the play during gangling attacks they figured prominently in the scoring as well. McLagan led the goal-getting honours by sniping two, Duchak assisting on one of them. Their goal at 9:18 of the third period was an all-defenceman effort, something that doesn't crop up in a game very often.

There has been a lot of rumor of late concerning the folding up of the Cape Breton hockey circuit, and the possibility of at least two of the three existing teams in that league seeking entry into the Big Four. It is not all based on just idle rumor either. President Victor Oland of the Halifax Saint Mary's Club, has already admitted that talks have been going on for a couple of weeks now between his club and that of the C. B. S. H. L. These recent talks have been by no means the first either along such lines. Both leagues have been toying with the idea of amalgamating the two Maritime circuits for a year or more now.

These talks have always seemed to bog down before any decision had been reached. But the present situation has a slightly different keynote. Both leagues were more or less operating on a successful plane during previous talks concerning joining the two Leagues under one heading. Now the Cape Breton division seems to be having their hands forced a bit. The competition this year seems to be slightly lopsided and as a result attendances have been falling off to such an extent that the situation appears critical for existing clubs.

There is no doubt that the addition of Sydney Millionaires and possibly one other team from that circuit to the Big Four would make it a terrific set-up as far as competition in the Maritimes is concerned. It would make it a possible six-team league that would promise much to fandom in the way of top-notch hockey. But there are many factors to be considered, and one of the biggest of these is additional travelling expenses. If such a thing should happen in the current season, there is also the big problem of what to do with the present schedule. Either a new one would have to be set up (that would have to be done in any case with added teams in the league) and the games played to date put down to "experience."

Other systems concerning the schedule could be worked out however—as one local hockey fan pointed out yesterday. They could strike an average of games won and lost by the Big Four teams to date and allow the added teams that average, or set the new teams at one point below the cellar team. Whether such reasoning would be applicable and reasonable is hard to say, and would have to be decided by the league and club executives in any case. All these things are worth thinking about though, and if anything is going to be done this year, it should be done soon, before the season progresses too far.

## Red Wings Suspend Player

DETROIT, Nov. 23 — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings tonight suspended forward Steve Black in the first such disciplinary action in the history of the National Hockey League club.

Manager Jack Adams said Black was sent down to their Indianapolis farm club two weeks ago to help that team, hard hit by injuries.

At the end of two weeks, Black left Indianapolis without permission and returned to Detroit. Black was not available for comment.

## Leafs Defeat Detroit Red Wings 2-1

DETROIT, Nov. 23 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs smashed Detroit Red Wings' streak of 10 games without defeat as they fought their way to a 2-1 decision in a free-hitting National Hockey League game here tonight.

Hockey was almost secondary to the battling which saw two small riots flare in the third period, marked by six major penalties and a half dozen minors.

A crowd of 13,873 — biggest turnout of the season here — saw the Leafs build up a five-point margin over second-place Detroit.

It was the Wings' first home defeat this season.

The red-hot Leafs, backed up by rookie goalie Al Rollins' top-notch performance, grabbed a two-goal lead in the first 15 minutes as Cal Gardner and Joe Kluckay tallied.

Seven penalties were called in the scoreless second period with the action getting rougher all the way. George Gee and Bill Barliko of Leafs touched off a rowdy brawl as they clashed early in the third period with every player except the goalies joining in. The scrap took 10 minutes.

Another battle developed late in the period and even Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk got into that one.

The teams got back to hockey long enough for Gee to poke in a goal at 18:42 to spoil Rollins' bid for his first shutout.

Detroit pulled goalie Sawchuk from the ice in the last minute of play, with Leafs' Morton breaking loose to sink the puck into the unprotected net in the last 20 seconds. However the play was offside.

## Canadian Football Hall Of Fame Seen Possibility

A Canadian Football Hall of Fame, a permanent shrine to honor the immortals of the gridiron, and officials associated with its development, may become a reality in 1951.

Football officials, queried by the Canadian Press on their views about formation of such a memorial, generally favored the idea.

"It is a wonderful idea and it would be an honor and a tribute to the great players of the game and to the people who have fostered it through the years," Eric Craddock of Toronto, president of the Interprovincial Union, said.

Craddock added he would recommend formation of the Hall of Fame to the Canadian Rugby Union board of governors at the C. R. U. annual meeting next February. "Football has developed in popularity at a tremendous rate and I'm sure every official in the country would go for such an idea," he added.

"It's a good thing," C. R. U. president Tom Allison of Toronto said. "I'm in favor of the idea. The Hall of Fame probably would be similar to that set up by baseball (at Kingston, Ont.) and hockey (at Cooperstown, N. Y.)."

Harold Bailey of Toronto, veteran secretary of the Ontario Rugby Football Union, told CP it was a "great idea."

"This thing could be built up tremendously," he said. "There are a great many things to be done. It would take time to figure out, and I would be happy to help in its formation."

Jim McCaffrey, manager of Ottawa Rough Riders of the Big Four, said he had never given the idea of a Hall of Fame much thought "but I believe it would be a good thing if it had the right guidance."

"One thing, there are enough experienced officials in Canada to make it a success," said Lew Hayman, coach of Montreal Alouettes of the Big Four. "It is natural that the idea of a Hall of Fame would find wide acceptance and would do a great deal for sport."

Hayman said it was "the first" he had heard of the "Hall of Fame idea" but added that he was "agreeable in principle to it."

"It would be a great thing if it is on a good, sound basis. Football today is the most rapidly-growing sport in Canada..."

McCaffrey and Hayman will attend the Ross Trimble Memorial dinner at Toronto Friday night, the eve of the Grey Cup, and both said they would talk it over with

other club officials it is expected more than 700 officials and players from nearly every section of the country — many possible candidates for a Hall of Fame—will attend the dinner.

Trimble, who coached Ottawa Rough Riders from 1936 to 1943 and played for Toronto, Balm Beach of the Ontario Rugby Football Union in the late '20s, died suddenly at his Toronto home last March.

For the 1276 paid fans, penalties provided a high-light. Six majors, three misconducts and a fair number of minors were handed out.

## Cold Weather Is Prospect For Grey Cup Game

TORONTO, Nov. 22 — (CP) — The word tonight is that a mighty Yukon cold wave has ripped through storm centre no. 4, a mere dot on the Pacific, and is racing down-field in a south-easterly drive.

In other words, says weather forecaster Fred Turnbull, temperatures in Toronto Friday night "may well drop to a low for the current season" providing at the 1:45 p.m. EDT East-West football final kick-off Saturday "a fast frozen field, a cold northerly wind with the temperatures in the 20s."

Storm centre no. 4 pushed across the west coast Tuesday night but the cold mass "re-mustered" its forces, made a clear break through the line in the Lethbridge-Medicine Hat region dropping temperatures at Lethbridge from 38 above to two below zero in matter of hours," forecaster Turnbull said.

"Odds at present are that the cold wave will meet little opposition in its rapid southward push. For that reason, he feels his original temperature estimate for Saturday of 35 to 40 "would appear to require a downward revision."

The 1:45 p.m. starting time was announced today by the Canadian Rugby Union — a 30-minute advance from Big Four games played during the season.

In event Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Toronto Argonauts are tied at the end of regular time, they will play 20-minute "periods until a winner is declared. There will be a kick-off at start of the extra time and another at the 10-minute mark, with the teams changing ends.
