## 1st Queens PCs Elect James Coles President

James Coles, Clinton was elected president of the 1st District of Queens Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting held in Breadalbane Hall Tuesday night. It was the largest meeting held there in many years with the hall packed as representatives attended from all parts of the district.

Premier Walter R. Shaw in a brief talk outlined the work being undertaken by the various departments of government and while noting the serious financial position of the province said that under the direction of Provincial Treasurer M. J. McQuaid, Q.C., satisfactory arrangements were underway for the proper funding of the provincial debt.

The Premier dealt with the Island roads, particularly paying attention to the new agreement signed Tuesday by Hon. Alvin Hamilton, federal minister of natural resources, and Hon. Philip Matheson, provincial minister of highways. He said this was a history-making document in terms of development of the services of the province.

Noting the 438 miles to be built in six years, Mr. Shaw said they would be of inestimable value to farmers, fishermen and businessmen alike and with the expansion of other provincial roads would leave this province with a network of highways unequalled anywhere else in Canada.

He concluded by assuring the gathering that he and his ministers were determined to establish government services here which would be of the utmost value to all the population.

manifested themselves everywhere, even in his clashes with governors when he had to defend the prerogatives of the church against encroachments by the civil authorities.

In 1663 Louis XIV. to whom the council of the 100 associates had given New France, established a sovereign council to administer the colony. Organization of the council was entrusted jointly to the governor and the bishop.

Four months after the council was founded Governor de Mesy fired three councillors and the attorney—general. He sought to replace them by four of his friends. He asked the bishop to approve the appointments. Msgr. Javal refused and it was then that the governor made his unsuccessful attempt to have him shot.

In 1684, then 61 years old, Bishop Laval submitted his resignation to the king. A serious fire in Quebec's downtown, a heart condition and frequent bouts of illness had undermined his health. Msgr. Jean Baptiste de St. Vallier, a chaplain of Louis XIV's court, was named to succeed him.

Before his death Msgr. L'Anclen, as his flock affectionately called him, was to know more adversity. There was the siege of Quebec by the British in 1690; differences of opinion with his successor; two fires which destroyed the Quebec seminary he had built; and his temporary banishment to St. Joachim.

Death came to Msgr. Laval May 6, 1707.

FOUND SCHOOLS Settling to work, Bishop Laval founded more parishes, opened in his new surroundings when he had to defend his jurisdiction against Gabriel de Queylus, a Sulpician appointed vicar apostolic of New France by the Archbishop of Rouen.

After a good deal of jockeying for positions, de Queylus was recalled to France and that particular conflict ended. Bishop Laval then set out to make an inventory of his diocese.

The territory of which he was spiritual leader contained 2,500 settlers, about 300 of them in Quebec. There were 25 priests and 10 churches to serve the territory.

The Institute also announced that Joseph Nazaire Arsenault will receive the institute prize, having obtained the highest standing in the uniform final examinations in the Province.

The final and intermediate examinations are uniform across Canada, and the total number of candidates writing were 1,109 and 1,059 respectively. Of these candidates 604 were successful in the finals and 526 in the intermediate.

## Chicken Waste And Fish Said Replacement For Horse Meat

OTTAWA — Chicken waste and fish can be used to replace 66 per cent of horse meat in standard mink rations during the breeding and reproductive seasons.

Dr. C. K. Gunn, of the Canada department of agriculture, Experimental Fur Ranch, Summerside, says comparably good results were obtained in breeding activity of male and female mink; numbers of females pregnant; total kits born; records of body weight; survival of kits to weaning date.

One hundred and forty three kits were born to 36 females on the chicken waste-fish supplemented ration, as compared to 118 on the control ration containing horse meat.
